

It is that transitional time of year—the time in which you know that plans for Fall need to be in place, but Fall is in the air and the Women's Committee (and a few advisors) once again met to plan for QALCW over the next six months. There is no requirement that you have to help execute the ideas. While we are discussing planning, start planning now for the Tenth Triennial Gathering. The Tenth Triennial Gathering will be held July 13–16, 2017, in Minneapolis, Minn. "All Anew" is the theme. While the planning continues, think about ways in which God is calling our organization to new ventures

Come join us during Adult Forum (9:15 in the Fellowship Hall; banana bread will be served) **on October 11** for making up kits for LWR and tying fleece blankets. Sometimes one wants to say, "Okay, we all know the routine: quilts on the pew, kits on the altar, offering envelopes for special offering, ENERGETIC arms and legs needed for folding and packing quilts after the second service." Many of the quilts will have a less puffy look this fall. The Bellevue Hyatt Regency gave away mattress pads to any quilting group that would pick them up. Thanks to Rich Mathes for making 2 trips to Bellevue for the pads. They make great filler for the quilts. We also want to thank Shirley Flory and Alice Twelker for taking on the challenge of learning to make LWR backpacks. Rich says we will need 75 backpacks for school-kit packing in October.

Thankoffering: Thankoffering will once again be collected in November. We share in a tradition dating back to the 1800s, when Christian women formed "mite" or "cent" societies to fund mission. 

Bishop's Message

When All Hail Breaks Loose

Be merciful to me, O God, be merciful to me, for in you my soul takes refuge; in the shadow of your wings I will take refuge, until the destroying storms pass by.

Psalm 57:1

It was a first for me. I encountered a significant hailstorm while plying the waters of Puget Sound. I was on board Gratitude with my dear friend Joe Johns. The rains had returned for the first time this summer. We awoke to a beautiful morning after a stormy night on the anchor. The water was mirror-like as the Northwest fog was clinging to the trees.

We set off slowly to go around Herron Island, eventually hoping to spend some time off Eagle Island to enjoy a seal colony of mothers and young pups. The winds began to gather and the sea took on a bit of chop - but nothing to be alarmed about. The steady rumble of the diesel motor was reassuring as we crossed over the north end of the island and headed back south.

Heading south we could see a storm forming as the clouds filled with blackness. Just as we were about to point the bow of the boat past Devil's Head, five bolts of lightning jagged down from the darkest cloud. I said to Joe, "It must be pretty far away I don't hear any thunder." Just as I got those words out of my mouth the lightening turned into a concussion that literally shook the boat. This meant a whole lot of water beneath us was absorbing the shock.

I could see on my radar that it was raining to the east of us. The dark cloud was moving much faster than my six knots and I figured it would pass by us before we caught up with it. Meanwhile I was hugging the shoreline because you don't really want to be on the water when lightening is striking.

We made it past Devil's Head and into the open water when all hail broke loose. Pea size pellets of ice bombarded the boat. Visually I could no longer see the land on my port side. Visibility was reduced to a few feet. The radar screen turned a total magenta color. All it was seeing was the hail. The pellets were relentless. The storm had still more to offer.

Joe looked at me as if to say, "I hope you know what you are doing?"

All I could think was, "Thank God for GPS, radar and my depth finder." A person gets completely disoriented on the water when you lose your ability to set your eye on a fixed object. Boaters have been known to head in the exact opposite direction of their intent.

Using the GPS, I relied upon my electronic charts to keep me as close to Devil's Head as I could while at the same time watching my depth finder so that I did not run aground. Off a point you can encounter shallow water for several hundred feet. It is also common to find large rocks in such places.

My other fear, of course, was running into another boat. Fortunately I was able to fine tune the radar so that I could eliminate the hail detection while at the same time being able to get an image of the boats in the area.

Time is completely lost in an event like this. It seemed to last far longer than the actual occurrence. I slowed down the boat to 4 knots and relying totally on my instruments made my way around Devil's Head into Filucy Bay where the storm bid us farewell and the calm was restored.

Later we made a pass by Eagle's Island and spotted the mother seals and their pups enjoying the after storm wallowing on the beach.

It is no wonder that the Bible makes multiple references to the power of the storms that rage about creation and in our lives. They represent a power that humbles the human bones. One knows how small one truly is. My rightful place in the world that day was but a cork bobbing in the waves.

Storms teach us why it is so important to have in our lives someone we can rely upon when we lose our orientation. When our best intentions can take us in the wrong direction.

I said to Joe on the way down. "I always keep my instruments on because I want to learn from them in good conditions so that I can know I can rely on them when I have to."

For me this is who our God is.

Hearing God's word, honoring Sabbath, living the seasons of the church year may not mean much at the time. But I assure you when you need to place your total trust in them it is a huge relief to have already learned they can be trusted.

One of the great benefits of the hailstorm I had not expected was that it power washed the boat so that it was sparkling clean of the salt that had crusted during the week. Gratitude was baptized in the storm.



GETTING THE MOST FROM MY 1972 FORD PINTO RADIO

I often listened to KSJN Radio in my college days in Minnesota. It was good music that I liked, and no advertisements . . . except for two weeks each year, which were known as Pledge Weeks. Many of you know how this works. That time was dedicated to raising from the listening public the contributions that would sustain the programming for the next six months or so. We would all put up with challenges, dire explanations of bad consequences to not giving, special gifts for giving at a certain level, and all kinds of pleading, begging, and a few minutes out of each hour for a short piece of music.

I was able to remain steady, being a poor college student for a while, until one day, knowing that I needed to pay for what I had enjoyed in the past, I called in and said yes. I was feeling a bit guilty for taking something wonderful for nothing. I immediately felt a sense of relief.

But something strange happened when I got in my car the next day. When I turned on the radio, expecting to hear KSJN, instead I heard <u>MY</u> radio station. It was mine. I was a part of all those who gave something to make it possible. It was more than just sound to fill the silence while I drove, it was news, it was music, it was interviews and information that I had participated in putting out over the airwaves. Some small thing that I had done that seemed to come out of the speakers as something much more than I could ever imagine. There was comfort and joy from my simple gift (tax deductible, no less!)

It is no secret that we are experiencing a financial shortage in our General Fund. Some suggest that the answer is to approach some our members who might seem to have more than others of us do. We all know that this is the way of life, that some have more than others of all kinds of blessings, and for all kinds of reasons. I also know that they are generous people who will give as they are led by the Spirit.

But we are still the Church. We are a body of believers, each of us a part that belongs to and needs the others. Comparative size makes no difference at all. The Hypothalamus in our brain is quite small, but this tiny thing regulates so much of the processes of life. Paul reminds us that "if one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it." When Jesus watched the poor woman place her small coin in the treasury, he did not try to find someone else to put the same amount in so that she would not have to. She was commended for her own generosity, and she received the blessing of her own giving.

We, as Queen Anne Lutheran Church, need to look at this <u>together</u>, as the body of Christ. As all give, all will receive the blessing of making this congregation their own. It is a matter of each of us following Jesus, with our gifts large and small, and knowing that together, we are putting out a message of God's love across the airwaves of the world to reach the ears of those longing to hear what we already know.

May we all know the blessings of generously following Jesus together. Turn your radio on and tune in to God's music of the heart.
