Call Committee Update:

The Call Committee spent October refining our focus of what we believe the congregation wants the newly-called pastor to give special attention to during the first year of his/her ministry. In addition, we considered and focused our recommendations for ways that the congregation will support and encourage the new pastor during the first year in order to help him/her accomplish these areas of attention. We look to the congregation to welcome our new pastor and be open to the gifts he/she brings. We know the congregation will prayerfully consider ideas and be flexible and adaptive to new possibilities.

We are working with the council to understand what we can offer in compensation and benefits as we look at the experience we want in our new pastor. In November we will also begin reviewing and updating the section of the Ministry Site Profile (begun by the Transition Team), that describes the trends in our community as well as other sections of the MSP.

Becoming Part of Queen Anne's Endowment Fund

You may be only vaguely aware of it, but Queen Anne Lutheran Church has had an Endowment Fund since 2002. You may want to consider becoming part of it.

What is the Endowment Fund, and how does it work?

Put simply, the Endowment Fund is a base amount of invested money, from which a distribution is made each year to support the church's General Fund. The General Fund pays for our staff, programs, building, etc., financially underpinning our mission of "Proclaiming God's Love in Christ for Every Person."

The base Endowment Fund amount will remain in perpetuity, growing primarily by new donations. The larger the base, the better the prospects for General Fund support over time. A gift to the Endowment Fund is another way to be generous with all God has entrusted to your care—for tomorrow as well as today.

What kinds of gifts are possible?

There are many ways to contribute to the Endowment Fund:

- Donate cash, stock, real estate, or personal property at any time;
- Set up a charitable annuity or charitable trust;
- List the Endowment Fund as a beneficiary in your will or trust, IRA or 401K, or life insurance policy.

OK, I may be interested. Now what?

The Endowment Fund Committee has prepared a brochure that provides some additional explanation and detail. It is available in the narthex and church office, and on the QALC website.

We encourage you to work with a professional advisor of your choosing to determine the gift options best suited for you.

A great resource available to Lutherans—*free of charge*—is the professional Gift Planner on staff at the ELCA's Western Region. Her only interest is in helping those who ask. She doesn't sell anything nor have any financial stake in people's decisions. Her name is Beth Adams, and here is her contact information:





Gratitude

Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

—2 Corinthians 4:15

I am a "Wannabe Mr. Fix It". I hold in high regard people who, no matter what it is, possess the knack to figure it out. I have learned I am really good at taking things apart, but not so good at putting them back together again. Back in the good old days I took great pride in maintaining the mimeograph.

We seldom had to call on the technician. Nowadays I just watch in awe when the copier technician shows up. They get tired of me peering over their shoulders and asking questions.

For years I was able to maintain my own cars. My handy dandy Sears Testing Unit and Timing Light made it doable. The advance of technology soon put my backyard garage out of business.

I had to resort to taking my car to a mechanic who had the gall to charge me \$90.00 an hour to do one thing I once could do on my own. One day I was complaining bitterly to my father about how much I had to pay. He stopped me cold in my tracks with the question, "Just who do you think you are? Do you think you are the only person who deserves to earn a living wage? Rather than whining about what you have to pay why don't you feel good knowing that not only do you help the mechanic to put food on the table for his family, you are helping all of the employees that work there."

My father had an uncanny way of reminding me of my rightful place in the universe. Equally important, he taught me how life-giving it is to learn to be grateful. I have to tell you this one painful incident really turned me around and I began to understand my money and possessions in a whole new way.

Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

-2 Corinthians 4:15

Being willing to give of our resources and possessions with joy can become an act of grace. It has the power to stir up in our lives the wonderful experience of gratitude.

When I began to look back over my father's life I realized this is how he lived it.

Again I remember resenting him when he sold our family home to a young family just starting out for what I thought was under market value. When I pressed him on the issue, he went on to tell me the story of how my parents were able to buy our family home. My grandparents loaned them a portion of the down payment and the realtor went without charging a commission. My dad was just paying it forward.

He said, "I will get far more joy out of knowing I helped a young family get a start than the few thousand dollars that placed it below market value."

We are living in a culture where money holds so many of us hostage. Maybe we need to see it the way my dad did. A gift first received, which becomes a gift of gratitude when given away with a measure of grace.



WHAT I DID ON MY LATE, LATE, LATE SUMMER VACATION

I am long past Mr. Woods' 5th grade class at Lakeview Elementary, but it may still be good for me to collect my thoughts from my recent trip to Dallas. It was not officially a vacation, more of a reading session, with no sightseeing or family visits or recreational pursuits on the agenda. While my wife, Gretchen, attended workshops and heard speeches, I stayed in the hotel, with an abundance of things to bring enlightenment. I must have ADD, since there were a number of things that were all on the list, all of many subjects, and they all gave me much to think about.

Some of it was Television, mostly news, and of course Thursday Night Football. Some of it were videos connected with organizations that I filed in my "when I have time" file. YouTube has some great stuff if besides cute cats and funny dogs. I watched Rabbi Jonathan Sacks and Yair Lapid, an Israeli Politician discussing Judaism and Zionism in the $21^{\rm st}$ century. I saw the entire history of the earth from the big bang to the present age in about 90 minutes. I learned about Anne Boleyn. I read essays on religion, and philosophy, and science, and scientism, and what is going on in the public square. I did binge watch a tiny bit, squeezing 3 episodes of "Downton Abbey" into the mix.

I did bring books along. I now have way too many books downloaded to various reading programs, waiting for me to open them up. I also brought some print books. One is a book from our Library, called *The Reformation: Faith and Flames* by Andrew Atherstone. (Have I ever mentioned how wonderful our Queen Anne Lutheran Church Library is? For it's size, it has a very impressive collection of books.) I also brought along Richard Dawkins' *The Magic of Reality: How we know what is really true*, Phyllis Tickle's *The Great Emergence: How Christianity is Changing and Why*, and a book by Thomas Cahill, *How the Irish Saved Civilization: The Untold Story of Ireland's Heroic Role from the Fall of Rome to the Rise of Medieval Europe*.

Inside the hotel was a wonderful collection of art. After walking with Gretchen to a variety of meeting rooms, I would return, stopping at each piece I found, and marveling at the skill and creativity of people in painting, in needlework, in metal work, in carving various stones and gems, and ceramics. (You can see much of it for yourself at Anatoleart.com). For few minutes, I even stepped outside to see how creative a brick wall can be.

Some of my time was spent noticing the goings on of the hotel. Various receptions and meetings for all kinds of groups, in engineering, or in the financial industry, or health care, or education, or fundraising for a private school, or an exercise and weight loss program. All this was supported by people with a gracious smile, with a more relaxed pace to their speech, and a Texas-sized welcome for all their guests.

I did learn lots of items of information that I had never come across before. Sometimes I came to reframe some of the questions that I ask myself when I have the time to think about some issue. But most of what I gained was to learn again, how wide and wonderful the world can be, to be astonished at what can be done as a person or as a group of people, and how God has loaded the world with gifts, if I only have the wisdom to see it.

It is good to be back. May God bless us all, no matter where we lay our head at night.
