Saint Paul LWR Warehouse Visit:



While visiting in the Midwest, Candy and I toured the LWR warehouse in Saint Paul, where the quilts and kits from the Midwest are sent to be repackaged before being shipped overseas. The Saint Paul warehouse is smaller than the Baltimore—actually New Windsor—warehouse, where items from the Seattle Ingathering are shipped. Interestingly, Saint Paul has six full-time staff while Baltimore uses 36 volunteers, on top of some full-time staff to repackage

the kits and quilts. At one time, there were several more warehouse locations in the U.S. Now, LWR is sharing warehouse space in Dubai with several other non-profit organizations to help improve the response time to those in need.





The warehouse's "quilt packing machines," are unique to Saint Paul. The machines were built around 1980 by an engineering graduate student as an engineering project. After packing and binding, the quilts are double-wrapped in plastic. All the kits are repackaged into uniform boxes for shipping. The outgoing containers/ quilts are bar-coded, similar to the barcode method we use at QALC.

Holden Village, Summer 2016

Do you want a chance to get away? Do want to be able to disconnect? Do you want a way to escape? A chance to sit outside and look at gorgeous mountains while reading a book? Maybe you want to be the one hiking or fishing in those mountains while someone else does the cooking? Holden Village is the place for you!



If you are not familiar with Holden Village, it is a Lutheran Lay Retreat center, in the Glacier Peak Wilderness on the east side of the Cascades, at the pleasant elevation of 3,200 feet. Despite its isolated setting in the wilderness, Holden still affords guests the comforts of three nourishing meals a day, a warm bed, hot shower and caring community. A teaching staff presents topics that are usually 4-5 days in length, in 50-minute sessions; while most sessions are in the morning, some are in the afternoon or evenings after Vespers.

In the mornings there is school with a variety of activities for younger children. Activities include Bible studies, art classes, games, etc. There are group activities for teenagers as well.

If you like to hike or fish, Holden Village is in the Glacier Peak Wilderness, only about four miles from the highest non-volcanic peak in the Cascades: Bonanza, at 9,516 feet. There is a great library; craft, weaving and basketry areas; bowling alley, pool hall, and a fantastic bookstore. It doesn't matter if it rains or shines; there is always something to do!

From Seattle, It takes about 3.5 hours to drive the 190 miles to Fields Point Landing, where you park your car and get on the 9:30 AM boat to go uplake. Arriving "Villagers" are met with buses for the 10-mile drive to the Village.

Holden Village should be re-opened next summer! Assuming the program and registration will work as in prior years, would any of you be interested in going as a group? QALC used to go every other year for a week. (The week would be Sunday to Sunday.)

Look for the sign-up sheet in the Narthex. List your top three weeks. We used to choose late July to early August for the best weather—and fewer mosquitoes. If the registration process is unchanged, you will need to commit to a week by January 1, 2016—when registration begins. If you have more time, you can also volunteer to be on staff—kitchen, housekeeping, gardens, carpentry, general labor, etc.

Bishop's Message



What Makes for Success?

But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all."

-Mark 9:34-35 (NRSV)

It is the season for graduations. It begins so soon in today's world. Kim takes care of a little boy named Cooper who now is a proud graduate of

Lord of Life Lutheran Preschool. I asked him what graduation means and he said, "It is when you are done with one school, you get the summer off and then you go to kindergarten." So there you have it!

Graduation is stirring my memories of graduating from Inglemoor High School in 1970. I have fond memories of all the activities that topped off our Senior Year. I was elected to be the class speaker and spent hours working on my speech. The compelling line, "It is going to take a hell of lot more than tear gas and guns to hold this generation down." We were a generation that believed that we would change the world and there would be war no more. Sad to say, we went on to be the greatest consuming generation in all of history. Like in the movie the Big Chill, we traded in our in our ideals for a place at the table of corporate America.

I was also elected by my peers as the "Boy Most Likely to Succeed." My counterpart was my classmate and dear friend Sara Forhan. Sara certainly lived into the recognition. She became a medical doctor specializing in gynecology and went on to work for the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. She was a near 4.0 student so it came as no surprise.

On the other hand, I was the class clown and found my way into the principal's office on more than one occasion. I remember Mr. Siverson would simply shake his head and say, "Unti, I expect more out of you."

So, did I "succeed"? I have been deeply blessed by serving as a pastor. It is a humble honor to be able to serve the church and people of this community. I have no regrets, and yet I dare say in the eyes of many of my classmates I have not lived up to the title they gave me. I can already hear the question at the 50th Reunion: "What the hell is a bishop?" Every pastor knows how easy it is to stop the conversation when you announce what you do.

So I asked five year old Cooper, "What do you think a bishop is?" Cooper's response, "A bishop is in charge of all the pastors." (Hold onto your ideals, young Cooper!) But a call to bishop, a call to pastor, a call to be a follower of Jesus is not likely to be something that will impress my classmates.

Little does Cooper know, now that he is a big graduate, he gets to spend the rest of his life deciding what makes for success. Is it the high paying job, the nice house and the fast car, or is it something else? "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Hang in there, Cooper!



A PLACE OF HEALING

The Mission of God in the world has always been close to questions of health. Even that important word, Salvation, is not seen in the scriptures just as a question of one's relationship to God, but also about wholeness, and healing, and a part of the universe running together as God had always intended.

Even as I write this, the examples of stories from both the Hebrew and the Greek Testaments overflow with this concept. Moses delivered the Torah to the people that they might have "none of these diseases" that were known among the other nations in the land. Daniel and his friends were allowed to conduct a dietary test, and showed how following God resulted in better health. Jesus healed the paralytic man by forgiving his sins, and then asked him to take up his cot and go home. The Centurion asked for healing for his servant in such a way that Jesus commended his "faith." Often both a physical and a spiritual healing appear together.

The people of God have continued in this tradition of wholeness through the years since Jesus walked the earth. People prayed for one another and found healing of many kinds. As medicine advanced, the church was close at hand. It had its own witness of trust in the face of plagues and epidemics. Many have answered a call to care for those in need by becoming nurses, and following the traditions of Clara Barton, Florence Nightingale, Mother Teresa, and even Martha Washington. One of the oldest healthcare institutions in our fair city is known as Providence Hospital, in recognition of the order of Sisters who served in many places. At one time, one fourth of all the long-term care facility beds in America were owned by Lutherans.

The need remains ever with us. None of us is guaranteed by our faith to never face infirmity or sickness. But we know that our faith can be "just what the doctor ordered." No definitive studies can "prove" that prayer can be a healing force, but some statistics seem to suggest that. I have heard the stories of way too many people to doubt it. So along with counting numbers of various kinds, and taking tests, and pills, and therapy of one kind or another, we will also look to God to restore us to wholeness of life.

People at Queen Anne Lutheran Church already know this. We are involved in Health Kits for overseas, health needs as simple as soap or a toothbrush for our HomeBase guests, opening our doors to those who struggle with the encompassing disease of alcohol addiction, and providing even the most basic health need of food for one who is hungry. We have a group who practices Yoga, not just as a physical stretching of muscles and joints, but also a spiritual stretching of faith.

Because of this, I am very excited about a new venture with Lutheran Counseling Network and our congregation. Sister Clare Josef-Maier will be offering counseling here in our building. I will leave it to her to explain more about her work and what she can provide. I can say that I have known many of the counselors in this organization and have appreciated their maturity of faith as well as their competence. They offer patience and persistent support for some to see a difficult and long-lasting journey through to the end, or just an objective and friendly person to listen as we explore some personal question of our own. They are registered with the State of Washington as a health care provider, but they stand in the spiritual tradition of those having various gifts of discernment, healing, mercy and so much more.
