## **Rotating Display of QALC Member Art**

Each will include a short narrative that explains how God shines through the work. The idea is to not just show what is traditionally thought of as "art" such as a painting or sculpture. What's important is what the piece means to you, and sharing that with the congregation. Maybe it was something your grandfather or

grandmother passed down to you, or something your child made last month. Maybe it has been languishing underappreciated in the closet for years. Doesn't matter—let's see it! If you have something you think you'd like to display, please contact a member of the Stewardship "In" Committee.

Currently on display in the narthex you will find Pastor Doug's Tanzanian sculpture of the Sacrifice of Isaac on the mantel, and now also a lovely Christmas print from Myra Dittes:

TITLE: Die Helige Nacht ARTIST: F.W. Wehle, 1895

I found this "Heilige Nacht" (Holy Night) print hanging in the old farmhouse that had been my grandparents home and before them, my great grandparents home. It is a constant reminder to me that these ancestors were strong in their faith.

My great grandparents came to this country as immigrants from Gehlenbeck, Prussia. With unwavering confidence that God would protect them on their long journey to America, they carved "Gott Mit Uns" (God With Us) in bold letters on their wooden trunk. Upon arriving in America, they settled on a farm in central Illinois, among other new arrivals from Prussia. The nearby "Neu Gehlenbeck" Lutheran church became their new family.

So now, generations later, this picture speaks to me of how my own faith is a gift handed down to me from my parents, grandparents and those courageous, great grandparents.

## **Call Committee Update:**

The Call Committee is happy to report that we have at last completed the Ministry Site Profile. This has been a long and careful process that began with the work of the Transition Team and continued with many months of discussion among the Call Committee. We considered the input that we have received from all of you in the congregation, whether through your responses to the survey that the Transition Team conducted, your notes in our Call Committee box, or discussions that you had with us during fellowship after service. We made our best efforts to distill all of the input into the responses provided in the document. Even if you don't see a particular point mentioned in the document, know that we will be focused during the interview stage on trying to find the person who has as many of our desired qualities and strengths as possible, and you can always continue to share with us your input.

For those who are interested, we have copies of the MSP in the office, and it is also available on the QALC website in the "Members Area." Barb in the office can help you gain access to that area if you reach out to her. We have submitted this to the Synod so that they can have as much time as possible to identify possible candidates. Usually that process takes around 30 days, but given that it was submitted during the Christmas season (when pastors tend to be just a little bit busy), we are expecting that we will not begin receiving names until late January or early February. If you look on the Call Wall, you will see a flow chart that describes the steps of that next phase of the process.




## **Community Lunch on Capitol Hill —More Thanks**

## **Entering the New Year Well**

What shall you bring with you into the New Year and what shall you leave behind?

I met the cutest couple in their eighties. They lived just down the street from the church. I had been asked by their neighbor if I would be willing to officiate at their wedding. I agreed, as I seldom turned down the opportunity to share the gifts of the church with the people of the community.

They invited me over to their home and graciously shared their story with me. Both of them had lost their spouses whom they deeply loved. I knew this when they invited me to see the family pictures in the hallway. On one side of the hallway were pictures of his family - his former wife, their children and grandchildren. On the opposite wall hung the photos of her former husband, their children and grandchildren.

This couple had accomplished what I have not often experienced. They were able to appropriately hold the memory of their former spouses and still fully embrace one another. Neither had met the other's spouse when they were living but each had shared enough about their love and respect that they felt like they knew them. I was thrilled that this couple could celebrate what had gone on before them and begin a new chapter in life with great gratitude for each other's companionship and love.

It sure made it easy for this couple's adult children and grandchildren to be in the home of these newlyweds. They knew that their past was being appropriately honored and they could rejoice in the new beginning for their parents.

It takes wisdom and confidence to know how to carry the bones of those who have gone before us.

And Moses took the bones of Joseph with him: for Joseph had solemnly sworn the people of Israel saying, "God will visit you; then you must carry my bones with you from here." -- Exodus 13:19

How well are you carrying the bones of your past? The New Year gives us the opportunity to be intentional about what we carry forward. For far too many of us, we tend to bring grudges, hurt feelings, jealousies not yet overcome, and anger still clutched. You do nothave to carry that weight for another year. Letting go of the ugly past can be the best weight loss program there is.

Knowing how to carry the past and enter the future allows to live life in the present to its fullest. Happy New Year!



#### **Christmas in Our Hearts**

Christmas is a festive time, with lots of lights, and glitter, and traditions, and many things that all combine to make it a high point of our year. We should celebrate with everyone the hope for peace on earth for all people. With our Christian sisters and brothers, we turn our eyes and our thoughts on Jesus, the Word made flesh.

But soon it will all go back to normal. The Christmas carols will not be heard for a while, the Christmas sales will soon be replaced with imperatives to buy flowers and candy and jewelry for our loved ones, and the guy across the street from me will pack up his 12-foot high inflatable Santa's Sleigh, and put it back in the box for 11 more months.

We who have faith will struggle with how to keep Christmas for the entire year. We should. We recognize the change that somehow brings our hope, our generosity, and our love for other people to the fore, and manages to keep our cynicism and our 'Grinch-ness' in check. Others have struggled with this, too. They have left us words, and articles, poems, exercises, and lots of suggestions for New Years Resolutions. I applaud and thank them for their efforts. I will read and consider and attempt to keep Christmas in my heart the entire year. I will not be surprised, though, if when the spring come, and the days are long and warm, that I lose some of this good will, lost in other things. (That day may come sooner if the Seahawks end their season prematurely.)

God has loved us and knows us, better than we do ourselves. To listen to Matthew tell the story, while Joseph is trying to figure out what this all means with Mary, an Angel comes and tells him more about this one who would be named Jesus. All this wonderful news is declared as a fulfillment of another time in the days of Isaiah, when a newborn boy would be named "Emmanuel, which means God with us."

We will put away the music, the cards, the Nativity sets, the ornaments, the lights and candles; and the tree will either be hauled out to be recycled or disassembled and put in a box. Yes, we will try to keep Christmas in our hearts and heads. But if we do forget some difficult day in weeks to come, or find ourselves in a completely new world with none of the well-loved things of Christmas, if we were somehow never to think of Christmas again for a very long time, Christ will still be ours.

The promise was not about a festival, or a time of celebration, although Mary and Joseph and the Shepherds and the Magi would all have tales to tell. The promise is ultimately about God with us. Christ never leaves us nor forsakes us. All else is secondary. There is no need for the right-sized box or wrapping paper; Christ makes his home in the center of our lives, ready to save us from our sins, or shortsightedness, or inability to see the goodness of God in the world around us. The Christ of Christmas is the one who remains in our hearts for the entire year, and for the rest of our lives.

May we all find Christ anew in 2016.
