the Pastor's WORD

Why Do You Stand Looking Up Toward Heaven?

Over the Easter season I devoted five sermons to the resurrection. My purpose was to show that, whatever the resurrection was, we do an injustice to the phenomenon when we reduce it to the mere resuscitation of Jesus' corpse. The risen Christ *was not a zombie*. The earliest Christians experienced his post-mortem presence in significantly more profound ways.

One of these ways was in and through the community that emerged out of his death. Paul wrote explicitly, for example, of the church as the body of Christ, the new form of his presence in the world (1 Cor 12:27). Today when we come together as a congregation for worship, we "re-member" Christ's body in our assembly. This re-membering constitutes one of the ways Christ triumphed over death.

There are others. Paul also spoke of how leaders of the church had visions of the risen Christ (1 Cor 15:3-7), an experience which confirms, as Lloyd Geering observes, the essential meaning of resurrection as a *symbol of hope*—here the hope that Jesus' martyrdom at the hands of the Romans would not be in vain. (We will be reading Geering's book in the next incarnation of our Beyond Faith Wednesday night series, beginning Wednesday, June 21 at 7pm.)

I shared these ways (and others) of viewing the resurrection in my Easter sermons because of my own struggles, personally and intellectually. The Christian faith should not force us to contradict what science tells us. It is graceless to assume that *believing in something* (e.g., dead men rise) will make us right with God. God's love makes us right with God! Reducing the resurrection to a mere belief about a 2,000 year old corpse, moreover, does something worse: it prevents us *experiencing* the presence of the risen Christ in our lives.

Think of all the ways we can experience His presence today: in the eyes of those less fortunate whom we serve, in the care we receive from others, at the table of holy communion, or in feeling empowered, as Paul did, to persevere in the face of hardship. There is something of God, of Christ, in each of these, yet how often do we take notice?

The good news is that we are not alone. Acts 1:10-11 tells us that when Jesus ascended into heaven, the disciples stood around, hands in pockets, gazing upward. Suddenly, two men in white robes stood by them and they said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus . . . will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Let's be clear: the point of this story is not that Jesus can fly. The point is that we, like the disciples, can easily become distracted by looking to the past (i.e., reducing the resurrection to a belief about something that happened long ago) or looking upward (i.e., fixating on heaven) instead of seeking him here! The resurrection is an experience and we are invited into it. May our eyes be opened to Christ in our midst.

GROW IN FAITH!

“Summer for Sunday School” Campaign and Mid-Year Check-in

Greetings from the Church Council as we approach mid-year. As you might have heard by now, the Church Council has approved moving ahead with research and discovery around creating a part-time position for a Children’s Christian Education Director for the next year, acting upon the recommendation of parents with Sunday School age children. Parents and a committee have been meeting to refine expectations and develop a job description.

We are excited about the potential to hire a new Children’s Christian Education Director. We know that this move is critical to sustaining and growing our congregation on the hill as families are moving here and looking for Sunday School. Since this opportunity has presented itself at mid-year, the church's budget does not have the needed flexibility to absorb the costs (projected at \$15,000/year) associated with this position. The parents are supporting a fundraising campaign to raise \$30,000—enough to fund the Children’s Christian Education Director position for two years.

We are therefore announcing our **Summer for Sunday School** Campaign to run from June 1 through Rally Day in September to fund the first two year’s salary for a Children’s Christian Education Director. Your pledges can be funded during the campaign or split between summer 2017 and summer 2018.

The great news is that we are off to a strong start! We have a donor who is willing to match the first \$5,000 in gifts during the summer of 2017 and also the next \$5,000 of gifts during the summer of 2018! So, we are one third the way to realizing our goal. We are grateful for this generous offer and look forward to meeting this challenge. Please prayerfully consider if you are able to help in this next foundational step for our congregation.

As we head into the summer church calendar, mid-year is the best time to pause and consider your personal annual goal for our church mission. Our staff, our building, and our benevolences require funding every month of the year. If you need a catch-up contribution, your gifts are very much appreciated as we go into summer vacation season and weekly giving dips. We cannot carry out our mission without your support. Some congregation families prefer “Simply Giving,” an automated monthly giving program, and about one-third of the church’s general fund offerings come this way. We also have new options including giving through Paypal and Text-to-Give. Information on all of these programs are in the narthex and on our website.

We are very blessed at Queen Anne Lutheran Church to have your good Stewardship. It is a joy to be able to grow our church and expand our mission to proclaim God’s love in Christ for every person.

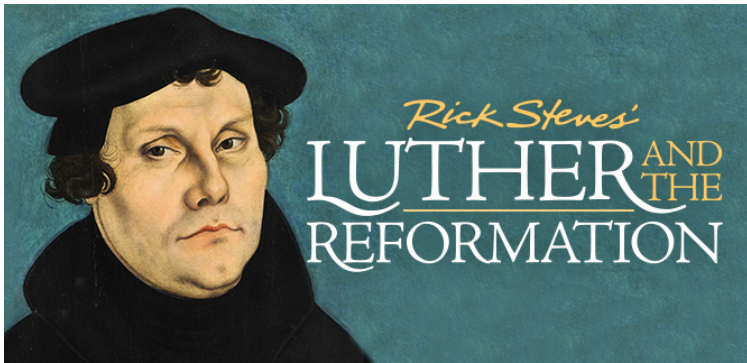

How would you adjust to living in a tent? Probably many of us would say “not so well.” It was a privilege helping five women of Mary's Place as they worked to keep a normal life for their families. Two things stand out for me from the week that these families were hosted by our church: Did you know you can decorate a tent? A brightly colored piece of fabric laid across the tent makes it seem like there is wallpaper on the walls when you are inside the tent. The other was being invited to share food — *Tsebhi Birsan*, a red lentil stew simmered in Berbere spices, prepared by one of our guests. It was set out in bowls on a platter along with the East African bread *injera*. One could imagine the mom serving guests in her home in the same gracious manner. I felt honored to be invited to share the meal she cooked. If you were unable to be a part of HomeBase this time, please try to sign up when it returns to us in October. (Peggy Morgan spent the night 4 or 5 times, as well as everything else she did—Thanks, Peggy.)

Wednesdays After School

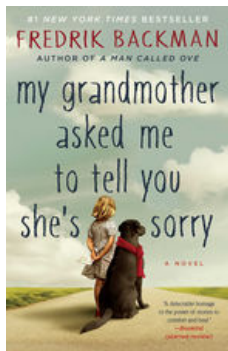

Holden Village Update: Holden is ready for guests!



Candy and I volunteered to work in lawns and gardens May 7–13; Rich was part of a group of about 50 trying to get the grounds ready for guests, while Candy worked on making diaper covers and mending (Quilts 65" x 93" are needed for the new extra-long twin beds). There was a lot of snow next to the buildings, and lots of water from melting snow in all the rebuilt street gutters. A lot of the plantings, and lawns, had been torn up during construction over the last four years—new water lines, underground electrical lines, replacing walks and patios, etc. While a lot has changed, the heart of Holden has stayed the same.

The tailings are contoured back towards Buckskin & Copper peaks—i.e. they are not as steep. There are many roads and paths on the tailings, so lots of hiking (think long walks) close to the village, as well as avalanche-free snowshoe/skiing areas. While the river sauna is no more, the village sauna has been greatly improved along with the newly rebuilt Jacuzzi. Copper Falls access is very different—mainly there are marked trails.

There are standing burned trees, which allows you to see farther down the valley from the bus, as well as when you are walking. The blackened trees, and lots of fireweed and other sun-loving plants create a different look and feel on the approach to the village, but not in the village itself.

In the five years since QALC members last attended as a group, some lodges have been remodeled and updated. Some no longer have steps leading into them— the ground is level with the



entrance.

Walks have

been regraded in order to improve accessibility for all. There is a hand-washing station in the dining room so that *everyone* now washes his or her hands before meals. The revamped bowling alley should be ready by now. Mice, deer and normal creatures still abound.

We look forward to being guests August 13-19. The QALC group of 18 will receive e-mails outlining logistics, including carpooling.

Bishop's Message



Learning to Discern

Every parent knows what is right for their child. Right? Not always!

Kim and I were quite certain we knew exactly which teacher our shy daughter Briana needed for first grade. It certainly wasn't the one that the school determined would be best. We worried ourselves over the fact that Mrs. Balka appeared to us to be so strict. How would our little one ever survive? She would be crushed and end up in a pool of tears.

Mrs Balka ended up being just the right teacher for our Briana. Her high expectations and clear sense of order is precisely what Briana needed as she was trying to learn to navigate her world. Mrs. Balka had a wonderful capacity to see the giftedness of each child. She could see the teacher in Briana.

Briana started the year with her desk in an absolute mess. Her brain wasn't yet wired for good order. Kim went in every Friday at the request of the teacher to help her learn to order it so she got off the week to a good start. By the end of the year Briana, on her own, had a very neat desk.

Briana ended up turning her bedroom (with a little help from her mother) into a classroom. The ABCs adorned her walls and she managed to come up with a desk, overhead projector, and real classroom clock. She couldn't wait to get home from school so that she could begin playing school. Briana was printing off attendance sheets, worksheets, and grading sheets a plenty. The truth is we were never quite sure whether Briana was doing her own homework or made up homework intended for her make-believe class.

Fast forward 25 years and that same daughter has now been teaching for six years. This year Briana is teaching first grade. There may well be parents who fear their child will be enrolled in her classroom. After all who do you think our daughter has modeled her teaching after? You are right if you are thinking Mrs. Balka.

Briana is also Miss Organized. Everything has its rightful place. Everything is color coded, three holed punched, and filed for quick access.

We learned an important lesson by not interfering in Briana being assigned to Miss Balka's class. We learned the importance of not allowing our own fears and prejudices to determine what might be life giving.

We call this the act of discernment in the Living Local Movement. Discernment comes only after dwelling in God's word. It comes after deep listening and beginning to see what one may not see on first impression. At first we didn't see how much Briana would gain from having a teacher with clear expectations and a helpful sense of order. We only saw "strict."

This same reality is often what prevents a congregation from seeing what God might be up to in the neighborhood. We tend to think we know who our church is and what it is we need. This can prevent us from responding to invitations that the community may be trying to extend to us. We have a tendency to get stuck in "our" ways when God might be inviting us into God's way.

There is no doubt in my mind that God is enrolling the church in a new classroom that none of us are too sure is the right classroom for us. Rather than fearing these new times, perhaps we ought to see the gifts that God has in store for us.
