Hitting the Reset Button

The call was clear: Queen Anne Lutheran Church wanted a pastor who would preach sermons of substance, reinvigorate educational programming, and help the congregation continue to reach out to others. How exciting, I thought, as I read the ministry site profile January before last. This congregation sounds amazing.

The process itself seemed quick, though not rushed: after several months of conversation, first with the call committee and then with the congregation at large, I was offered the position as pastor. I accepted the call with enthusiasm and began at the end of last June.

Looking back a year later, I see an assumption I brought with me into this ministry: to be successful, all I had to do was transfer what worked in other places—at the university where I was a theology professor or in various churches where I taught Sunday forums over the last decade—to Queen Anne Lutheran Church. After all, the congregation indicated clearly its desire for a teaching pastor. This would be great.

But something happened that I did not expect. At first people attended Sunday forums, Tuesday Bible study, and the new Beyond Faith group in numbers folks hadn't seen for several years. Gradually, however, the numbers dwindled. What, I wondered, was I doing wrong? What—perhaps more constructively—could I be doing differently?

I asked around. People had different answers, but one thing became clear to me fairly quickly: the "I" must become "we" when it comes to what **we** as a congregation want in our life and ministry together. It's not about what programming I offer you based on what has worked elsewhere in the past; it's what **you** want and will work toward when it comes to church programming that inspires **you** to question, to grow in **your** faith, and to live out **our** mission.

To make the shift from "I" to "we," I asked for Cottage Meetings. These gave me a chance to learn more about you and to share ideas and hopes for what lies ahead in our ministry. A second round of them will occur beginning in late July, so be on the lookout.

Besides Cottage Meetings, you have another opportunity to share what you want. Suggest a sermon topic! From mid-July to the beginning of September, I will preach on topics that interest *you*! Submit a topic in the suggestion box located in the narthex and I will consider it.

This is a ministry we share. Whatever "works" must come from all of us. Lifting up what you want and meeting you where you are is my call. Over the past year that has become more and more clear to me. So let's leap and hit the reset button, moving forward now—together.

An Update from the Council and Stewardship Committee



LYONS News:

Nine LYONS youth, along with Megan and Bryant, attended a May Youth Weekend at Holden Village during Memorial Day Weekend. Fiona Hubbard, a senior in high school and member of Phinney Ridge Lutheran, wrote the following about her experience:

"As a first time Holden visitor I really had no idea what I was getting into. As the old school bus made its way up the switch-backs I marveled at the sea of matchsticks. When we finally reached the village, Holden seemed like a diamond in the rough, or a forest that was just beginning to make its comeback. The forest wasn't the only participant in this season of comebacks, after years of remediation work, Holden was preparing to open its doors to the public once more. (Yes, this was the first that I had heard of remediation. Once again let me remind you Holden hasn't been on my radar until now).

The work we did over the course of our stay varied from sweeping porches to cleaning the pottery studio. I personally had the privilege of hauling and stacking wood. Coincidentally, almost everyone from LYONS managed to stay together for our volunteer work. Though the work was physically demanding, and it was the warmest weather I had experienced in a long time, everyone cheerfully chatted as we threw wood into the bed of a truck. (We also eventually made make-shift muscle t-shirts out of our Thrivent shirts). The food was wonderful and fresh, and I always kept drifting back to the bread station (Avery has been banned due to setting some toast on fire). The services, particularly evening prayer, and the candle prayers were inviting, moving, and brought a sense of calm to a group of 100+ teenagers without fail. I look forward to spending time up in the mountains as a volunteer."

A pre-order has been made to Lutheran World Relief (LWR) Farmers Market for a case of medium blend, dark blend, and decaf drip grind coffee. Each case will have twelve 12-ounce bags. When they become available at the LWR Coffee Project display in the Narthex, the price per bag will be \$7.50 for medium and dark, \$8.00 for decaf.

While LWR does not offer chocolate or tea at the moment, we can continue to meet your needs for those items from Equal Exchange.

Ball point pens; blue/black regular (i.e. not gel) - Need 250 - there are 5 per kit


From the Cantor . . .

Bishop's Message



The Holy Spirit is Moving & Dancing

The celebration of Pentecost occurred a few weeks ago. On that day, we heard how the disciples finally left that locked room. Thousands were baptized. People were swept up in the fire and wind and flame of the Spirit. But we are mistaken if we determine that event happened long ago without relevance for

today. For the Holy Spirit continues to move and breathe as we move and breathe in the Spirit . . . even in the twenty-first century, even here in the Pacific Northwest!

As I write this, I am on my second day as Assistant to the Bishop. I also am selling my house, looking for a house, learning names and faces, absorbing facts and figures, and (as you all experience) driving in western Washington traffic. It is exciting and overwhelming all at the same time.

I admit when I was approached about this position, I resisted. I was settled. I was happy with my call. I had a dentist and hair stylist and dog groomer. I was not considering a move to the west side. But as I talked with Bishop Unti and the rest of the staff, my excitement grew and I felt the Holy Spirit calling me to a new and different place.

When I think back on my life, this is exactly how God invites me to new ventures. If someone had told me my Freshman year at PLU that I would become a pastor I would have laughed out loud. If someone had told me my first call would be on the Flathead Indian Reservation I would have shook my head in disbelief. If someone had said that I would live in Spokane for twenty years I would have said, "There's no way!" If someone had suggested I move out of Spokane after twenty years I would have said (and did), "But I'm comfortable." And yet . . . that pesky (awesome!)
