the Pastor's WORD

I Need Your Help

A couple months ago I shared with you my seven wishes for the congregation, all of which were—directly or indirectly—informed by our shared mission of making Christ's love known to all people. I spoke about these thereafter at several council meetings, reordering them in terms of congregational priorities and imagining ways they could be implemented.

Out of this process I came to realize one thing: I need your help.

It's one thing to dream about possibilities. It's another thing to share them. It's still another to implement them, and it's the last of these that seem beyond my grasp.

I don't know what to do.

Here is where I find myself struggling specifically: each week I have before me a set of tasks I must complete as your pastor. These include obvious ones like writing sermons and preparing for Sunday worship. Behind the scenes a slew of additional duties await me, many of which are administrative, others of which beckon at a moment's notice. Upon completion, another day, another week, has passed. New possibilities for mission and outreach, once gleaming in conversation over dinner, say, at a cottage meeting, become dormant and die.

This is where I need your help. I feel like I am treading water, and that unless we work together in the process of implementation, many of the opportunities we have not only for expansion and growth but also for assisting each other as a family of faith (i.e., mission fulfillment) will disappear.

And so, when it comes to implementing a couple of the wishes I share with the congregation, I wonder: what if we assembled two teams, one for the sake of outreach (a communications team), and the other for the sake of bringing communion to members who cannot join us for worship due to physical limitations (a visitation team)? The first would help get the word out about events and programming, about who we are and what we offer. The second would help *be* the Word to those in our church community who find themselves in need, particularly the home bound.

What do you think? Consider this. Pray about this. Might you be involved, and if not, might you know someone who could be? I will reach out to you as well.

God is calling us to do a new thing. May our wishes come true.

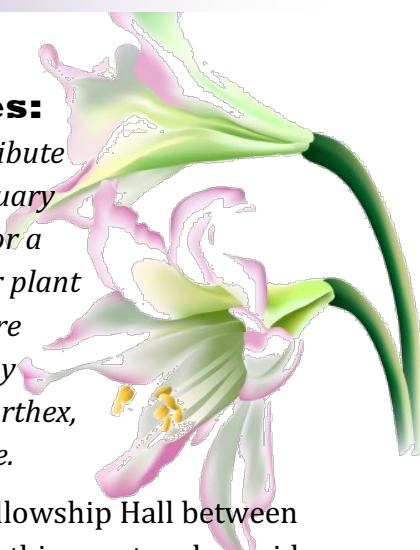

Join us for this free presentation which documents the only concentration camp in Washington State during the Second World War. Japanese American families from the White River and Puyallup valleys were incarcerated at what is now the Fairgrounds in Puyallup. This DVD presentation, a feature of the Puyallup Valley Chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League, provides recollections of living survivors who talk about their wartime experience of being imprisoned in their own country. What is the Stewardship of the Building Fund (SBF)?

The SBF was created by council in 2005 to accumulate monies that could be used for a series of major maintenance and repair projects under the direction of the Property Committee, as well as for large-dollar emergency repairs that might arise. The SBF includes monies contributed from the Guidelines for Expenditures through 2009, and also monies from donor-designated gifts in subsequent years. Council has retained for itself the authority to allocate the monies.

This write-up is a follow-up to what I penned for *the Quill* last month titled “Annual Meeting Survey on Funding Property Repairs.” That article mentioned that using SBF is one way to fund some of the projects that need doing—because they were mandated by the Fire Department, or something has broken (think furnaces), or for wood that needs some long term covering (like paint) to keep the wood from deteriorating.

Thanks to those of you who responded in February by donating funds to the Stewardship of Building Fund, probably in response to my comments at the Annual Meeting that we have doors that need replacing and/or mending. Others have pledged “IOU’s” or maybe “2019 gift” to SBF. At the end of January, the Annual Meeting date, the SBF balance was \$11,223.

See the article on the next page, “Property Maintenance Funding Needs.” That itemizes the costs of many building maintenance projects that truly need some help. Since the total funds we could spend certainly exceed \$11,223 in the SBF, prioritization will be necessary. Your comments and questions are also welcome—you do not need to be on the Property Committee to weigh in.

Property Maintenance Funding Needs

The Property Committee's Annual Report highlighted some of the projects that are necessary to maintain the building, such as putting paint on surfaces that have not been repainted since being installed in 1960. Below is a list, which includes relative priorities based upon city requirements or wood deterioration. Having enough funds in the SBF to pay for particular projects is also critical.

A. Highest priority:

1. Fellowship Hall exit doors on NW corner— \$6,000. One of the existing wood doors cannot be used because its frame is rotten; it has been rotten since at least 2007. The City's fire inspector requires replacement. New doors will be metal.
2. Small enhancements to the front two wooden entrance doors so they lock better and easier, and can be opened more easily. Several options are available, including installing a disabled-type entrance control since many of us find the heavy doors hard to open. Options are not all priced yet.
3. Find and fix leaks in the irrigation system to reduce water bill. Our water usage has been higher than expected, because water is slowly leaking. American Leak Detectors determined that the irrigation system is the issue. You may remember a few years ago we dug up some of the pipes clogged up by roots from Parks Department trees— this time, the issue may be the tree to the north of triangle; or maybe just really old galvanized pipe that has deteriorated. Options being researched.

B. Medium priority:

1. Assuming we keep the existing two front entrance doors, and McGraw Street door, the wood needs refinishing. *Next time you walk into church look at the bottom edges of the doors!* Not priced yet.
2. Stained glass window maintenance:
 - a. Painting of wood; possible covering with protective windows for long-term durability, as well as damage protection— \$38,000.
 - b. Repainting fascia and soffit above window— \$5,000.
 - c. Permanently cover the "flicker holes"—Probably only metal will prevent new holes. Not priced yet.
3. Paint outside walls behind the altar area. These walls have virtually no paint left. They have not been painted since the building was built—\$11,600.

C. Longer-term needs:

1. Paint outside areas that have had some paint coverage since 1960:
 - a. North side of building— \$28,000 (*last painted by Mac Smith and other members*).
 - b. East side of classrooms— \$5,000.
2. Straighten the copper gutter supports so gutters catch rainwater. Melting snow has bent the copper gutter hangers so water runs over the side, including onto the stairs on the north side—and then the drains clog up! Not priced yet.

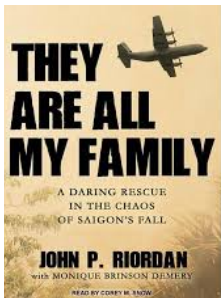
New Circle: Meets at church in the chapel conference room on the third Monday of each month at 7 PM. All are welcome. Contact Candy Mathes.

Lutheran World Relief Quilts & Kits

The Spring Ingathering (regional collection of quilts and kits) will be May 4 & 5, at Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church. Loaders— please mark your calendars.

Personal Care Kits— we emphasize assembling Personal Care Kits in the spring because towels or nail clippers are sometimes on sale in spring. We emphasize school kits in the fall because school supplies are usually on sale in summer. It is more cost effective for us to directly order some of the personal care kit items in bulk: combs, toothbrushes, and soap, because they are cheaper. If you want to simply pay for all materials for one Personal Care Kit, please donate \$5 per kit. Please make checks out to "QAELC Women." Our goal is to assemble 100 Personal Care Kits.

Items that you might be able to pick up on sale:

Nail clippers: Since nail clippers cannot be sent in their package, if you buy a nail clipper, try it. If it cuts your nails, buy some more and also let me know your source. Sale prices have sometimes been 50 cents at Bartell's (two for \$1).

Dark-colored Bath Towels: These can be as small as 20 x 40 inches for "hotel towels," or as large as 27 x 52 inches. Sales prices can be \$2.75 to \$4.00. Hot, humid tropical areas actually appreciate the smaller, thinner "hotel" towels because they dry out faster. If you happen to find bath towels on sale in the \$3 or cheaper range, we would love for you to buy some. The towel sales at Fred Meyers and other stores vary each year.

Bulk purchases: We buy heavy, large, sturdy combs for 21 cents; individually wrapped soft toothbrushes for 33 cents; 4-oz. Ivory Soap for 40 cents/bar; and hotel towels for \$2.60. Only one toothbrush is used in each kit and must be wrapped. Toothbrush packages containing more than one must be unwrapped and separated, and the single toothbrush then sealed.

Materials are needed by April 6.

Bishop's Message

You Don't Have a Problem

During my formative years, my dad was the Executive Director for the Easter Seal Society of Washington. It no doubt shaped his values—and informed mine as well. Let's just say he knew—and introduced to me—a great number of people whose physical and mental challenges were not

always easy to cope with.

One such introduction was to Johnny Kemp, who was born without arms or legs. His parents were told he would be better off institutionalized. Dad convinced the Kemp family that Johnny could be fitted with artificial arms and legs and that he would do just fine. He became a life-long friend who went on to have a successful law firm, providing counsel to people with disabilities.

Then there was Harold Wilke, who was born without arms. I remember the first time he sat at our family dinner table. Smoothly operating his knife and fork with his feet, he removed any doubt that he could do anything. You should have seen him pick out the correct paper denominations from his wallet when paying for a purchase.

The stories go on, including my attendance at Easter Seal Camp with my dad where I witnessed kids my age readily do what I was unable to do given *all* my body parts.

This background is important to understand the wisdom that Dad shared with me the first time I got a dent in my first car. I was devastated. A friend sat on the hood and left an impression equal to her size. My day was ruined. More like my whole week was ruined. There was also the time I had my car window broken and my eight-track player and tapes were stolen.

His response in both cases was the same, "Kirby, if money can fix it, you don't have a problem."

My dad taught me so much about perspective. How do you weigh the things in life that matter? He taught me wisdom: "The patient sorting-out of what choices lead to life and what choices lead to death."

You can only imagine what my own girls have gone through. The first time my girls dented their cars you can be sure what words came out of my mouth. They may not be words filled with great empathy, but they are words filled with great truth.

Life does present us with challenges that money can do nothing to fix. These are the challenges that really matter. These are the challenges that call us to place our faith in God.

Johnny and Harold were both people of great faith. People who taught me that even when money can't fix what you are facing, *faith* can make all the difference in the world. Faith moves people from being victims to survivors—teaching all of us to see the challenges of life as opportunities to grow in faith and lean sharply into the direction of life. Let us lean into this life together, knowing that God is leading.
