Signs of the Times

It was not that long ago that the third highest attendance numbers for a Sunday were on Mother's Day. It was a big deal to honor mom's wishes to have all her kids

in church. I often met adult children that I didn't know existed. It may have been awkward for them to go to church, but it was one day when you didn't want to disappoint mom. Coffee Hour was always slim because families were off to a Mother's Day brunch following worship. It was the one day when Mom was not expected to do any work. It was a favorite day for restaurant owners as the cash registers were singing.

Father's Day, on the hand, was one of the least attended Sundays. It often fell on the first day of the fishing season. The treat was for dad to take the kids fishing and then return home to big meal.

Fast forward a decade or two—and everything has changed. Not even Hallmark has been able to sustain the power of these special days. I dare say that Mother's Day has fallen off the Church calendar.

These are the kinds of changes in the culture which we don't get to vote on. Multiple factors converge to create new perspectives on what is important and what the culture values. We are but one voice in the conversation.

I know several people for whom Mother's Day elicits tremendous pain. People who had difficult relationships with their mother, those who have lost their mom, people facing fertility challenges, those who have lost children, and women for whom the expectation of motherhood by the culture is not their personal choice. My comments are not intended to be a critique of Mother's Day but rather a reminder for us all how the church must learn to adapt to an always changing culture.

While having this conversation with a congregation's adult forum group, I met a mother who expressed the heart burn she feels trying to navigate her role as mom in the world. She confessed that she has had to forgo her time on Facebook because it made her feel that her parenting skills were lacking given all the postings about how great other people's families are. She spoke about how much she would value a mothers' group of mothers willing to share in the real challenges they face.

I could see the light come on as she began to imagine how this could happen in her congregation and how valuable it would be. She was clear that it would need to be an outreach for new mothers by new mothers. She received affirmation from others for raising the idea, and I encouraged her to consider giving it a try. Such a gathering isn't going to turn around attendance on Mother's Day but it could very well be the "Day" that each one of the participating mothers looked forward to.

There are so many ways in which the church can discover new ways of being church with mothers and fathers, with ALL PEOPLE, that serves to strengthen the fabric of the whole community. We need to listen, learn, and try.

So, for those who celebrate Mother's Day, happy Mother's Day. For those who celebrating Father's Day, happy Father's Day. And for all children of God, may we discover new ways to be in relationship with God and with one another.

I worked for 19 years in Geriatric mental health, dementia and medical concerns for folks over 60. I obtained a Certificate in Geriatric Mental Health from UW's continuing education Social Work Dept. I also taught classes for the UW continuing education program to Nurses and Social Workers for several years in Addiction Studies and Seniors.

I grew up in Ohio and my grandmother (Mary Elizabeth Mabel Pflueger-Wurm) was the baby sister of Queen Anne Lutheran's founder, Rev. Jessie Pflueger. My grandmother is the reason I was raised Lutheran and how I came to accept Jesus and God in my life. I remember, when my grandmother was in her nineties and found it increasing difficult to get to Church, how much she cherished a visit from the pastor or other members of her congregation (another older Pflueger brother founded her Church, St. Paul's of Westerville, Ohio).

I hope that together we can deliver much needed love and communion to those who can no longer come to services for whatever reason. I am new to this program but I am confident that we can make such a wonderful difference together. Please work with me so we can serve our seniors and disabled adults together.



Lutheran World Relief School Kit Materials Needed for Fall 2018 Ingathering, November 2/3 School Kits:

Please look for school items on sale during the coming summer. Our goal is 50 school kits.: <u>Items we need by Sept 30:</u>

70-sheet notebooks (wide or college ruled) - need 200 for 50 kits.

In July & August, you can buy at Fred Meyer's or WalMart (usually) 10 at a time, for 19 cents each.

Blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well) – Need 37

Pencil sharpeners (with cover) – Need 25

Box Crayons (24 regular) – 30 boxes

Ball point pens; blue/black regular (i.e. not gel) – Need 100 - there are 5 per kit

Rulers (centimeter/inch) - Need 42

Erasers – 2.5 inches long – Need 40

Pencils - ZERO needed.

Personal Care Kits:

We intend to send 70 - 100 kits – need 70 - 100 nail clippers. Usually 49 – 59 cents on sale, which occurs periodically; Bartell's sells two for one (for \$1); however, usually only 12 or so at a time.

Progress Report

We're happy to report that we are making steady progress in our preparations to build Twegashe Primary School!

Trip to Tanzania

In late January we took a two-week trip to Tanzania with our volunteer builder, Bill Suhr. During the first week we drove across northern Tanzania, covering close to 700 miles and visiting seven different schools along the way. From these visits we gathered lots of helpful ideas about construction techniques and materials. Perhaps even more important, we met people who have already successfully navigated the complexities of undertaking a project in Tanzania. All of them were very eager to provide information, and have encouraged us to contact them as questions arise in the future. This is an invaluable resource!

We spent the second week of our trip in Bushasha Village. Here we accomplished our primary goal, to survey the school site and get a better idea of the slopes so that our architectural team can move ahead with detailed school design. We also made a visit to the existing government primary school, Kyembale Primary. We were particularly interested in seeing their kindergarten, and were astonished to find 130 children packed into one classroom. Then we found out there are actually 200 students on the roster, all with only one teacher! The principal was new and hadn't yet heard about our plans to build a new school in the village. He was quite excited when we told him, and asked if there was any possibility we could open the school next year to take some of the pressure off Kyembale. With 800 students enrolled and only eight teachers, it's no wonder he is eager to have relief!

Construction materials update

We've been doing a lot of research in our effort to choose the most suitable construction material for the school. Our plan from early on has been to use interlocking stabilized soil blocks (ISSBs) made by compressing soil that has been mixed with a small amount of cement. These blocks are more environmentally-friendly than the baked bricks used in most local construction because they require no firing. One drawback with the type of ISSBs we were originally considering is that they are solid, so rebar cannot be inserted to provide earthquake resistance. Earthquakes are not common in the area around Bushasha, but in 2016 there was a 5.7 magnitude quake centered only about 40 miles from the village. As a result, we have decided we will probably use a new type of hand-operated brick press made in India that produces hollow, interlocking ISSBs approved by the Indian government for use in high earthquake severity zones.

Water supply news

In researching our options for how to supply water to Twegashe School, we came across the St. Photini's Well project, sponsored by St. Paul's Greek Orthodox Church in Irvine, CA, and working in northwestern Tanzania, where Bushasha is located. We reached out with some questions, and before we knew it, they were offering to drill a well for us, as long as we will then make water available not only to the school but also to local villagers.

501(c)(3) approval

One piece of very good news that awaited us when we returned from Tanzania was our determination letter from the IRS. CORE Tanzania is now an approved 501(c)(3) public charity, which means donations are tax-deductible!



Fundraising campaign

In April we formally launched our "Making Lives Meaningful" Campaign for Twegashe School ("Twegashe" translates roughly as "Let's make our lives meaningful" in Kihaya, the language spoken in Bushasha). Our campaign goal is \$500,000, enough to build the first phase of the school (K-3) and operate for three years. (Please note that all of our travel expenses are covered by the individuals traveling.) To date we have raised about \$125,000 in donations and pledges—nearly one-fourth of the way to our goal. Many thanks to all of you who have helped us to get this far!

I'd like to end with a brief story about a third-grader named Anita, a relative of mine who lives in the village and was walking with us one day as we headed toward the school site to take some measurements.

Anita took my hand, and as we continued walking, hand-in-hand, she asked "Do you know who I am?"

"No, who are you?" I replied, wondering where this was going.

"I'm Magufuli." [Tanzania's recently-elected president]

I wasn't quite sure how to respond.

"You see," she said, "I've already recruited you as my bodyguard!"

Like Anita imagining herself as the president of her country, we have an ambitious vision, a vision of quality education for every child in rural Tanzania.

And like Anita, we know that anything is possible.

But it's only possible because of YOU! Thank you for your support as we work to turn our vision into reality! Wakora muno! ("Thank you very much" in Kihaya) —*Michael & Jeannette Banobi*

My Time at Holden - April 2018

I travelled to Holden Village recently for the first of three visits this year to work on the village archives. This was the first time I have ever been to Holden in early April. It is a small community, less than 50 people total—staff and guests. Several long-term staff people, including the village pastors, were taking their required leaves from Holden before the big ramp-up to summer mode. There were several people I knew who were there during my visit. Some guests came at this time because it was their spring break.

Unpredictable Hazards, Pleasant Pastimes, and Dishes

I took a lot of luggage, as well as a space heater, this trip because I did not know what to expect with the weather or working conditions. Some of the lodges and chalets are vacant during the winter and not heated—including the Village Center where the main archives are kept. Providing extra heat would be essential.

The weather was changing from winter to spring during my visit. When I arrived at Holden, it was snowing, and there was snow on the tree branches weighing them down. There were no sounds of birds or other critters. While there, it rained a lot. Toward the end of my visit the sun had made an appearance and blue sky could be seen. By then the trees were bare, and various birds—robins, Steller's jays, swallows, and ravens—had arrived with their calls. Chipmunks were also about.

While the main east-west street of Holden was bare and wet, there was still over two feet of snow on the ground. The use of YakTrax® was necessary for walking on the snow. One of the dangers at Holden this time of year is the possibility of "postholing," where one makes a step on the snow and the foot keeps going into the snow depths, causing the sudden cessation of any sort of momentum. All kinds of injuries could occur with a "postholing" incident. I was able to avoid this.

Another danger is a "roofalanche." This is when snow slides off a roof of a building and falls onto the nearby ground. There are piles of snow alongside all the buildings, which used to be on the roofs. One does not want to be at such a location when a "roofalanche" occurs. I watched one take place while I was safely indoors.

I heard the story of a mudslide that took place on Thanksgiving morning last year. Material came down Martin Ridge from an avalanche chute west of the village and travelled down the main street from east to west past the school. It covered the road throughout its length and inundated the drainage ditch along its uphill side. Miraculously, the mudslide did not enter or damage any of the buildings. Villagers spent their Thanksgiving digging out the ditch and scraping the mud off the road. There is a coating of mud remaining on the road, and the concern was what that coating would do once warm weather set in.

During the winter season, there is almost no program. Some crafts activity took place in the Art Studio (people still call it the Craft Cave), though two artists in residence—who had been in the village for a month—left a couple days after I arrived. Guests and staff made use of the ping pong table and ¾-size pool table set up in the dining hall. Putting together jigsaw puzzles was a common pastime for both guests and staff; I also worked on three of them during the evening hours after Vespers.

My visits this year coincide with those of Larry Howard, the village archivist appointed by the Holden board of directors. I work under his direction. Larry and I were regarded as short-term staff. This meant we had the same duties in which all staff participate: specifically, dish team. We were on different dish teams, so adjusted our work schedules accordingly. In winter there are only two dish teams daily instead of with each meal in summer. We were spared from doing "garbology" this time.

Brownian Motion in the Village Archives

In previous articles and in many conversations I have usually said that I was working on the museum or the museum archives. That was incorrect. "Village archives" is the proper term, for much of the material that makes up the archives might not be exhibited in the new museum. Such

materials still need to be catalogued, properly stored, and made available for scholars, researchers, and village staff.

Larry Howard had a list of the tasks he hopes we could accomplish this year in the village archives. However, he knows from experience that his time in the village is often affected by what he calls "Brownian Motion:" some task or a request made to him takes him and me in different directions and on other unforeseen tasks. This held true for the April visit as well.

The current Operations Manager, Mark Rerucha Borges, decided that the historic Ops files could go to the archives. Larry Howard had wanted to do this for years, and so the to-do list was set aside to attend to the boxes and file cabinets of Ops material. These files were taken from storage and brought to the Creekside Room in Koinonia. Josh Post, current president of the board of directors, who was in the village for the first four days Larry and I were there, joined us in sorting, sifting, and examining the content of those files when he was not busy with his board president duties. The three of us were able to go through most of the material; after Josh left the village, Larry and I completed going through the remaining files. Lots of correspondence, invoices and purchase orders. blueprints, installation manuals for devices and appliances no longer in use, samples of products, many photos with little or no annotation whatsoever, and much more made up the content of these files. Some of the files dated back to the time when Werner Janssen was the business manager of Holden (1963–1984), a job that is now handled by at least five staff people.

A big task that is taking up Josh's time is searching for and reviewing all of the board minutes and reports he can find. He has made quite a study of this, and is arguably the most knowledgeable person of the board's governance of Holden Village throughout its history. Though I never found any such items while I was going through materials in the archives, I did show to Josh a couple pieces of correspondence regarding the bowling alley he had not seen previously. Last year, Josh spearheaded a project to renovate the bowling alley and saw it to completion. This visit,

he brought some devices that, when inflated, are placed in the gutters so youngsters and people new to the game of bowling can play without the frustration of rolling gutter balls. He showed Larry and I how quilts laid over the lanes help preserve them during the winter months.

When not working on the Operations archives, Larry wanted to make a cursory search through all the boxes in the archives in the Village Center. There are over 100 of them, most of which do not have any sort of official inventory. Larry needs lists of all the content—at a high level, not detailed—of each box so he can conduct computer searches. He hopes to have this big task complete by the end of this year. Cataloguing of all the materials cannot begin until this inventory task has been finished. I was able to make lists for three of these boxes. In one of those boxes I came across photo representations of the brochure made by the mining company for the sale of Holden in 1957. I guess I had always thought the name "Holden Village" was something coined after the place had been acquired from the mining company. But there on the first page of this brochure from 1957 was "Holden Village" in bold lettering. When I showed this to Larry, he was surprised as well.

A Pressing Need for Volunteer Staff

During a staff meeting it was reported that guests would be returning to Holden in the summer, projecting village capacity at 90% or above. There is space available for additional guests if they would get on the waiting list, for cancellations are always a possibility. While there will be plenty of guests, there is a pressing need for more part-time staff and long-term staff. When I talked with Peg Carlson-Hoffman— one of the directors of Holden—about this, she said that it is harder and harder to interest young people to volunteer their time. Institutions of higher learning, which used to promote Holden to students, no longer do so, steering them to paying internships instead. Word of mouth is now the most important way to inform and interest people about Holden, its program, and its opportunities for life enrichment through volunteering.
