A Brief History of (Our) Time

Stephen Hawking, the famous scientist who gave us *A Brief History of Time*, died last March. This month his final book appeared, a posthumous collection of writings and interviews concerning the existence of God. Hawking's take on the subject should come as no surprise, at least to his readership: the universe, governed by scientific laws, has no reason for God to exist. It runs perfectly well on its own.

Some religious critics like to challenge Hawking on scientific grounds. I don't. I'm not an expert. I learn from him what I can, marveling at how he translates the complexities of his subject to a broader audience.

Yet however great Hawking's science, he is still *only human*. That means that he, like you and me, makes assumptions that inform his perspective and shape his conclusions, assumptions perhaps of which even he wasn't aware.

Consider his cosmology in brief: the universe began as a singularity before which time did not exist. Out of this singularity, out of nothing, sprang the cosmos, populating the space it created with trillions of glittering stars. Like subatomic particles at the quantum level, says Hawking, the universe simply "popped" into being. It runs according to scientific laws, only to return to its pre-temporal source.

Does this narrative sound familiar? Think about it. The universe began as a singularity (God), who according to official Catholic teaching, created "ex nihilo," which means "out of nothing." It exhibits a meaningful and rational structure (John 1:1), only to return, as Paul affirms in Romans 11:36, to its pretemporal source (God).

Hawking's view, it turns out, doesn't just pop into being like the universe he describes. It has a long history in the West going back to Judaism and Christianity, one he arguably *assumes* when he claims that the universe sprang from *one source*, before which neither time nor matter existed. The only thing missing is a deity, the absence of which Hawking explains by recourse to a single chain of reasoning: since time didn't exist before the Big Bang, there was no cause, and because there was no cause, there was no creator.

But here we should pause. If we think of God as a cause, then wouldn't that put God *in time*, and if God is *in* time, would God really be God? Perhaps Hawking, the master at the head of the classroom when it came to science, needed a little more time as a student when it came to his theology!

This month we celebrate a much more brief history of time than the one Hawking described, our congregation's 100^{th} anniversary. Even if we differ from Hawking on God, as perhaps we should, may we look upon our time together the way he looked upon time itself: with wonder, with awe, and with gratitude.

The display will continue until the week after Christmas, when you can pick up your display.

We will treat each piece with great care, but understand that it will be a public display in the narthex.

Think of it as sharing a family treasure with the children, friends, and guests at Queen Anne Lutheran over the Advent season. It's wonderful to see the familiar story of Christ's birth created in many different forms of art, and inspiring to consider that people all over the world join to celebrate God's gift of love at Christmas.

This fall at OALC we donated 39 Baby Care Kits, 130 Personal Care Kits, 72 School Kits, 80 bars of soap and 75 quilts. That is a LOT of work—a lot of collecting and a lot of assembling! Thank you to all who helped make it happen! Do you know that this past year, our quilts and kits and soap have gone to Armenia, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Serbia, Bosnia, El Salvador, Burkina Faso, and Iraq?

Bishop's Message

Gratitude

One of the great joys of owning our boat is how many people comment on her name. When we are out on the water people will often pull alongside and shout out, "I love

the name of your boat." We hear this same comment dockside and from neighbors who walk by the house where we store the boat.

What is it about the name *Gratitude* that elicits such a response? It certainly wasn't the case with our first boat. It was named *C-Sick* and we received very few comments.

I only have hunches as to why it strikes such a strong chord with people. The most obvious is we live in such a cynical world that more often expresses complaint and criticism before it expresses gratitude. People delight in hearing a word of appreciation.

Gratitude is acknowledgement that one has received gift in their life.

Gratitude is the discovery that enough is more than plenty.

Gratitude is the recognition that we have received that which we do not deserve.

Gratitude is heartfelt—down in one's bones—appreciation and thanksgiving for the daily gifts that we receive.

God's people from the beginning of time have been taught to be people of gratitude. We most often express our gratitude through feasts. We gather around tables filled with plenty to give God thanks for delivering us from slavery to freedom, and from death to life.

St. Paul discovered that when you approach life out of a sense of gratitude it allows you in all circumstance to feel content. Even in times of need or when one has little. In such times one still knows that we are being provided for.



I love being around grateful people. They are always people of joy and promise. Their posture is humble, and their lives are filled with appreciation. They are often people who have been through the most difficult of times and they tend to see the best in everything.

I am so grateful as your Bishop that so many of you are people of Gratitude.

May you be strengthened this Thanksgiving by knowing that God continues to provide us all that we need to be content.

Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me.
