

Seasons and Scripture

I have a confession. The church year, especially before I became a pastor, meant precious little to me. As a child I associated Advent with chocolate-filled calendars. Christmas, a single day, was a time for receiving gifts. Easter was the season of hunting for eggs and coloring them, and the calendar by which I lived was the academic one. I share this as someone who was raised in the church, yet someone for whom the surrounding culture (in this regard) wielded a much greater influence.

Now that I am a pastor, things are changing. I am learning to experience time differently. The church calendar puts me in touch with the life of Jesus, inviting me to become his contemporary—to anticipate his birth, to see him grow, to travel with him in his ministry, to stand at the foot of his cross, to celebrate with the disciples his victory over death, and to share with others the good news of that victory.

Yet I still struggle. Living into the church year, mindful of each season, can be enormously difficult. Sure, our culture "celebrates" Christmas and Easter, but even those it strips of their theological significance. So how can we become more mindful of each season? One way would be to select a verse for each, giving each season a reason, a theme for us to remember and contemplate. This Advent, I invite you accordingly to meditate on a single verse.

The verse I have in mind comes from Psalm 62: **"For God alone my soul waits in silence; from him comes my salvation"** (v. 1, *NRSV*). Advent, as you know, is a season of waiting. We find ourselves at the outset of the Jesus story, a story about to unfold, awaiting the appearance of light he will bring into this otherwise dark world. "The kingdom of God has come near," he will tell us in the first chapter of Mark (1:15), but it has not yet arrived. We wait for him. We wait for God. We wait for healing.

Waiting, I think, belongs to the essence of faith. He who waits *trusts* that the thing or event for which he waits will occur. He is, as the theologian Paul Tillich observes, "grasped" by its power. Thus, while waiting involves *not having*, it is also having. "The fact that we wait for something," Tillich explains, "shows that in some way *we already possess it*. Waiting anticipates that which is not yet real. If we wait in hope and patience, the power of that for which we wait is already effective within us."

Waiting, in other words, is like faith. It's having and not having. The power of that for which we long "grasps" us, so we possess it, even as it lies beyond our grasp. We may think, for instance, that God is absent, yet the fact that we find ourselves waiting for God, praying for God, or longing for God means that God is *already present within us as the source of our waiting, praying, and longing.* That's good news!

You recall my confession. For years, the seasons of the church meant very little to me. But that is changing. Advent gives me the chance to reflect on what it means to wait, to have even in my not having. Psalm 62:1 centers my reflection. May it center yours too.

End of Year Giving

In this Advent season, many of us are already planning our end-of-year giving. If you are planning to make a special gift at the end of the year to further the mission and ministry of Queen Anne Lutheran, the following information may help you with your planning.

Donations by Check

You may know that the church must always observe the IRS rules for acknowledging donations. In order for your gifts to be included on your 2018 QALC Giving Statement, please remember that: Your checks must be received in the church office by 5:00 pm on Monday, December 31st (slipped under the office door if the door is locked).

If you are mailing a check to the church, it can be mailed as late as December 31^{st} , but it must have a "2018" postmark to be considered a 2018 donation.

PayPal Donations

QALC also accepts PayPal donations. Visit the church's website (queenannelutheran.org) and find your way to the "Donations" page. Like donations made via check, PayPal transactions must also be dated 2018.

Gifts of stock

Queen Anne Lutheran is also equipped to accept gifts of stock in lieu of checks. We have a brokerage account with Edward Jones that can easily accept your stock transfers. Contact our QALC Treasure, Myra Dittes by email (treasurer@queenannelutheran.org) for the Edward Jones account number and DTC number.

Looking ahead to 2019

The new **2019 Offering Envelope** booklets will be available on a table in the narthex throughout the Advent and Christmas season. If you don't see an offering envelope book with your name on it and would like one, please contact our QALC Financial Secretary Sallie Wilson at sallie.n.wilson@gmail.com, or the church office. The church provides these numbered offering envelopes to help you become a faithful giver, but also to ensure the accurate recording of your donations by the Counters. Note that in addition to weekly envelopes, your book of offering envelopes includes several envelopes for "special offerings."

Lastly, please consider enrolling in QALC's "Simply Giving" EFT program. This is an electronic funds transfer program that provides a simple and secure way for you to make automatic donations to QALC from your checking or savings account. This helps QALC by ensuring that your offering is received even when you cannot make your donation in person. It also eliminates the chance of error, and it helps ensure a steady income for the church. Enrollment forms are available on a clipboard on the railing in the narthex. 
Updates from the Property Committee: Things You May Not Notice





Just after Thanksgiving, a bold but careful crew took on the task of changing lightbulbs in our sanctuary and fixing the pulley that lowers our Advent wreath to lighting-height. As you can see from the photos, long ladders and a certain amount of fearlessness are requirements for these tasks!

Also that week, we took care of a post by the McGraw Street door, which was completely rotted through. We were relieved to discover that it wasn't actually



needed to support the overhang above it; there is a steel plate that is doing that work. Nevertheless, the post was replaced with one that is sound and the overhang was given a new drain and drain-pipe so the water won't flow into the wood anymore. It looks



CORE Tanzania Progress Report



First, a very big "Thank you" for \$3,705 in donations made so far this year through the church's donor-designated benevolences fund to support CORE Tanzania. We are very grateful for your generosity. We would love to thank each of you individually, but we don't know who you are! Please let us know you donated so we can say a proper "thank you."

A lot has happened since our last Quill update—so much that we don't have room to describe it all here! Instead, we'll mention some highlights, and refer you to the CORE Tanzania page on the QALC website for more details (https://queenannelutheran.org/897new/core-tanzania/)

School Design. Since late May we've been working with a new architectural design team, led by our friend and Queen Anne Lutheran member Marc Oplinger. Marc has support from a few of his colleagues at Gensler, working through the company's G-serve program. We're grateful to Marc and his team for all the time and energy they've put into this project!

Curriculum. We've gathered an enthusiastic curriculum committee with a broad range of teaching experience—elementary education, middle school science, Montessori, special education, and ESL. We'll need this expertise and enthusiasm, since designing a detailed curriculum for an entire year is a big and complicated task. The task becomes even more challenging since children in Bushasha begin school not knowing either of the two languages (Swahili or English) that are used in the Tanzanian education system.

Trip to Tanzania. In mid-September we headed to Tanzania for a three-week stay in the village. Our volunteer builder, Bill Suhr, once again joined us, as did our volunteer project manager, Mike Tully. Our daughter Catherine also came along and served as team photographer. We had a long "wish list" of items to accomplish on this trip, and, remarkably, we were able to complete most of them! Here is a summary of what we accomplished:

- Constructed a 600 meter road to access the school site.
- Initiated the process of manually moving roughly 1000 cubic meters of dirt to level a soccer field (a full size field is required by the government). This task was about one-third completed when we left, and is now almost finished.
- Arranged for our soil to be tested for use in making Compressed Stabilized Soil Blocks (CSEBs). Our soil passed the test!
- Met several times to review our drawings with the Tanzanian architect who will be applying for our building permit

- Helped the village management complete and submit paperwork to the district government requesting final approval of the land transfer. (We got a thumbs up from the district!)
- Commissioned a land survey, the final step in the long process of obtaining title to the land where the school will be built. (The survey is currently in progress.)
- Staked out locations for the school buildings and teacher's houses
- Priced construction materials in town
- Visited a private primary school near town which uses English as the language of instruction and observed a kindergarten class

Well-drilling. Preparations for Twegashe School continued in the village even after we left Tanzania. In mid-October, the drilling crew from the organization that offered to drill the well for us arrived in Bushasha to begin the drilling process. They hit water at about 140 feet but planned to continue drilling farther to be certain the water supply will be consistent.

A lot has been accomplished, but there's a whole lot more to do! Our hope is to get a building permit within the next several months, order the brick press, secure a residence permit for Bill, have a solar pumping system installed to power the well so there's water for construction, and send Michael and Bill over there at the end of May to start building (after the rainy season ends, and more importantly, after our son Aaron and Bill's son Christoph graduate from college!). Of course, also on the list of things to do before we start building is a significant amount of additional fundraising.

We're making good progress and we're so grateful to our Queen Anne Lutheran family for helping us get this far. Your interest, encouragement, and financial support are helping to turn our vision of a new school for the children of Bushasha into a reality.

Bíshop's Message

God Knows How to Disarm the World

Friends, we are living in some disturbing times where violence, bullying, threats and hostility abound. The world can be downright mean. No one is spared - not even mothers and children.

How is one to respond in times like these? Do you just duck and seek cover? Do you remain silent? Do confront those who are the source?

What many have chosen to do is to up their security systems. It is one of America's fastest growing industries. Others choose to literally arm themselves. While still others practice what is called situational awareness. It is about being alert to your surroundings and trying to take the necessary precautions.

On a recent trip to Chicago I heard a wonderful story from one of our Lutheran Bishops about Munib Younan, Bishop Emeritus of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. (He served as bishop from January 1998 to January 2018.)

My colleague was traveling with Munib when they crossed through a Check Point between Palestine and Israel. They were met by a security guard armed with an assault rifle who was anything but kind to Munib requiring him to get out of the car before he could proceed.

What Munib did is unimaginable to me. During the interrogation Munib said to the guard, "I don't think you like your job." Obviously, this comment took the guard by surprise. It didn't stop Munib. He asked the guard about his family and discovered he had a girlfriend. Munib increased the level of empathy for the guard's difficult position. Before long the guard put down his assault rifle and wanted to know who this man was.

Munib Younan is one of the most disarming people you will ever meet. He feels so deeply that he has been freed in Christ that he experiences very little fear in what for many is a very frightening place in the world. Everywhere he travels, Munib engages people with this same disarming charm - confronting hostility by revealing the fear that lies behind it.

When I grow up I want to be like him.

We are entering the Advent Season and Christmas. It is a time when we prepare ourselves to worship the Prince of Peace who was born in the same land as Munib. How brilliant of God to enter the world as a baby.

I know of no power greater than that of newborn. A newborn can quickly take over an entire household. They have the power to make macho men break into tears. They attract admiring looks wherever they go, unleashing a power of endearment that is hard to resist.

Yes, our God knows how to disarm the world. This God baby grew up teaching others to turn the other cheek. This baby who became an adult stood up to the likes of Herod and Pilate without batting an eye.

Yes, this Jesus, the Prince of Peace, has come into the world to disarm it. To disarm the hostility and meanness. To create a world where the stranger is welcomed, and all are accepted. This Jesus has come to face the fear of the world and replace it with peace.

Might this Season indeed be a season where each day we pray more fervently: Come Lord Jesus!
