# the Pastor's WORD

## Seven Wishes for the Congregation Revisited

This time last year I shared seven wishes for the congregation. These wishes were not simply mine; they emerged, rather, from a variety of sources, including hopes shared with me at Cottage Meetings as well as things I had seen working well in other ministries.

How did we do? Below I have listed the original seven wishes along with observations concerning our success in realizing them.

1. A Visitation Team: the hope was to have four people from the congregation, in keeping with Martin Luther's concept of the church as a "priesthood of all believers," take communion once a month to the homebound. We not only met this goal insofar as the team regularly visits those who cannot join us on Sundays; the team itself consists of around *ten members*, more than double that for which we originally hoped. We meet once a quarter to share our experiences and learn as we go, guided in the process by retired chaplain, Thom Wert. We welcome others to join us. Please contact the church office if you are interested.
2. Seminary Intern: the hope was to have a student intern from Seattle University join us for eight to ten hours a week. An application was submitted, and I spoke with the coordinator of the program. Unfortunately, the number of students was limited so we did not receive a placement, but we will try again.
3. Food Bags: I wanted those who stop by our church office requesting assistance not to leave (literally) empty-handed. The hope was to assemble food kits to give out. This hope blossomed into the assembly of over *100 kits* last spring thanks to the efforts of our congregation and the work of Dolly Smith in particular. Barb Bash also put together a list of additional resources we included in each bag. We have since given away dozens of these bags to those in need.
4. A *Tradinnovation* Team: the desire was to find a way a way of imagining how to make our traditional liturgies as dynamic as possible by inviting several people to be part of the Worship and Music Committee once a quarter to brainstorm new possibilities. My hope is that we do this with the arrival of a permanent cantor.
5. Communications Team: the hope was to have a couple people help with sharing information about upcoming events at the church (beyond what the church office already does) through social media especially. Special thanks to Peggy Morgan and Lee Duty for helping to make this happen with our public lectures delivered last spring and earlier this fall.
6. Sponsors: the desire was to make sure new members had a connection to the congregation, someone to invite them more fully into our community. I paired "shepherds" with each of our new members on Rally Day this past September.
7. Parent Recharge Group: our growing ministry for children needs to include families as well! The hope was for a quarterly meeting of the parents of Sunday School children. This is something Terry Anderson, our Children's Ministry Coordinator, and I working on for 2019.

Looking back on 2018, it's clear that the congregation did some amazing work in making these wishes come true, carrying out its mission to make the love of God in Christ known to every person.

What wishes do you have for our congregation? May 2019 be another year where these wishes come true.

## Notice of Our Annual Congregational Meeting

We will be holding our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 27, immediately following the 10:30 worship service. The meeting will take place in the Fellowship Hall and will include a lunch provided by our Church Council.

The purpose of the annual meeting of the congregation is to review and celebrate the previous year's accomplishments, with reports from the pastor, the president and treasurer; to elect officers and delegates for the coming year; and to hear and vote on this year's guidelines for expenditures and any other proposals requiring the majority approval of the membership.

The congregation will also be asked to consider motions to (1) reduce the minimum elected congregational council members from nine to seven members, with no change to the number of elected offices (four); and (2) increase the limit on council authorization of expenditures above anticipated receipts in the current budget approved by the congregation from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Those who want more information can find copies of the full motions on the desk in the office and in the Annual Meeting announcement information that will be circulated in mid-January.

A quorum of members is required to accomplish our tasks, and of course we hope you will be able to attend.

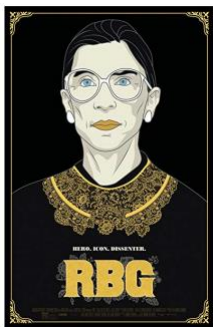
### Memorial Service for Don Sobeck

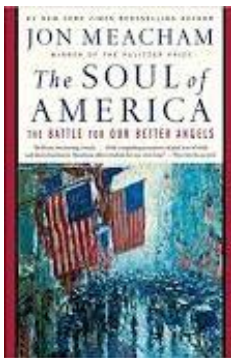

### **January Forums:**

#### **ISLAM 101**

The religion of Islam constantly makes the news and not often for good reasons. But what do Muslims actually believe? How has the Christian (and especially Lutheran) tradition engaged this religion? What does its Holy Book, The Qur'an, say about God, even Jesus and Mary? Join us for Islam 101, a special forum series on **Sundays January 6, 13, and 20, from 9-10 AM** in the conference room. Pastor Dan will begin the series on Sunday, January 6 with a brief introduction to Islam. Pastor Terry Kylo will join us on January 13 to discuss work he is doing on Christian-Muslim relations, and on January 20 we will be joined by Muslim practitioners to talk about their experience of being Muslim in the Pacific Northwest.

Come and see: Seeking and finding faith

#### IN THE BEGINNING

The author of John's Gospel acknowledges that there is more to be said about Jesus than any one Gospel writer can say: "But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were to be written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written" (John 21:25). We can say the same about Bible studies: There is always more to be said than can be contained within any one study. Given this, we may best approach these four sessions as a study "in" John's Gospel, rather than a comprehensive study "of" John's Gospel. Each time we encounter a passage, we may focus on something different than we have before. The next time we read a passage, we might notice other things.

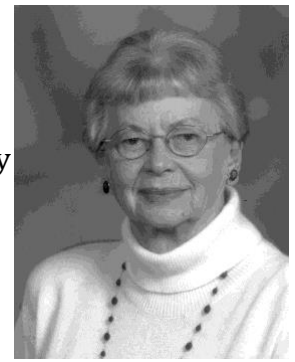

## **Florence L. Ekstrand, 1917-2018**

Florence Lind Ekstrand, beloved member of Queen Anne Lutheran, died peacefully December 14, 2018 in Mount Vernon, WA, at the age of 101.

Florence Ekstrand, says Karen McCullough, was a “wise woman of the church.” She was involved in the QALCW, led Forums, spoke at Sweetheart luncheons, and was the hostess of some of our “Progressive Dinners”—Karen recalls that Florence accepted hosting duties even when she was 85, saying, “Sure, I’ll do it,



just don’t tell my kids about it!” Delicious Swedish meatballs ensued. Florence convened several writing groups at her home, one for poetry and another for those writing their memoirs.

A faithful Christian, her home was always open to others. Her daughter Kris recalls, “Support for refugees and the homeless was probably the thing that was closest to her heart and is especially timely right now. Recently, I heard from a woman who said she was a checker at the Queen Anne Safeway store where Florence shopped. They chatted and my mother learned the young woman was losing her apartment. Florence invited her to stay at her house until she was back on her feet. This happened many, many times over the years when Florence had room in her house and others needed help.” Kris graciously provided us with Florence’s obituary:

The youngest of five siblings, Florence was born on Oct. 18, 1917, on a farm near Cokato, MN, to Swedish immigrant parents Edward and Alma Lind. Because she had already learned to read, she was promoted to third grade within two weeks after starting school. Consequently, she was only 15 years old when she graduated as valedictorian of the class of 1933 at Cokato High School. She studied journalism for two years at Macalester College in St. Paul, MN, before taking a job as a reporter at her hometown weekly newspaper, the *Cokato Enterprise*.

On Sept. 18, 1938, Florence married Mauritz A. Ekstrand, who was also of the Cokato area. They lived in several communities in Minnesota and Montana during the early years of their marriage before settling in Kalispell, MT, in 1950. Florence raised her four children while working as a free-lance writer, placing numerous stories in youth magazines published by church organizations and poems in various publications. When the family settled in Seattle in 1963, Florence went to work for Murray Publishing Co., where she served as editor for the weekly *Queen Anne News* and *Magnolia News*, plus a monthly trade publication for the Northwest mobile home industry. She also wrote and self-published her first book, *Scandinavian Home Cooking*, a small volume of stories and recipes that sold more than 250,000 copies. Florence retired in 1981 to devote full time to her publishing company, Welcome Press, eventually producing 10 books of her own and two by other authors, mostly on topics related to the Scandinavian culture. During these years, she traveled to Sweden and Norway several times.

After Mauritz died in 1981, Florence began making space available in her home for young people to live, including college students and refugees from the Eritrea-Ethiopia war. The refugee community came to her aid for several months in 2005, after Florence suffered a debilitating stroke. When it became no longer practical for Florence to live in her Seattle home, she moved to Mountain Glen Retirement Center in Mount Vernon, WA, where she lived out the remaining years of her life. The family extends its appreciation to the staff for their support and care throughout the last chapter of Florence’s life.

Florence is survived by her four children: Mary Ekstrand of Poulsbo, WA, and her partner, Jack Kent; Steve Ekstrand and his wife, Linda, of Mount Vernon, WA; Kris Ekstrand Molesworth and her husband, Carl, also of Mount Vernon; and Heidi Ekstrand of Ketchikan, AK. Her grandchildren are Nat Seavy and his wife, Jenny Tamayo, Forestville, CA; Andy Seavy and his partner, Ingrid de la Jara, Seattle; and Claire Molesworth and her husband, Nathan Siedman, Bolinas, CA. She also leaves great-grandchildren, Ritzy and BB Davidson and Atticus and Sybil Siedman.

A private family memorial will take place at a future date. Gifts in Florence’s memory are suggested to Queen Anne Helpline, Seattle; Washington Talking Book and Braille Library; or a community food bank.
