Climate Change and Our Calling from God

The Bible constantly surprises me. Its writers could not have imagined the world in which we live today. Their technology was rudimentary (Judges 1:19). They attributed illness to evil spirits (Mk 9:17). They thought the sun revolved around the earth (Josh 10:12-13), and their view of the world resembled a birthday cake with three tiers (Rev 5:13). Yet for all their lack of technological sophistication, biblical writers often possessed a degree of insight and wisdom *far* beyond ours.

Consider the second creation story in Genesis. According to the ELCA's social statement on "Caring for Creation," this text specifies that "our role within creation is to serve and keep the Lord's garden, the earth. 'To serve,' often translated 'to till,' invites us again and again to envision ourselves as servants, while 'to keep' invites us to take care of the earth as God keeps and cares for us (Num 6:24-26)." Tend to my creation, God says, trusting its well-being to "the man of the earth," to us.

Finding ourselves today on the cresting wave of human-made climate crisis, we have to wonder: what happened? Where did we go wrong?

Again we turn to Scripture, only to discover what "Caring for Creation" identifies as "the central cause of the environmental crisis," namely, "our alienation from God and the rest of creation" as symbolized by Adam's expulsion from the garden (Gen 3:23) and the enmity that arose between the serpent and Eve (Gen 3:15). Sin, "lurking at the door" (Gen 4:7) entered the world through Adam (Rom 5:12) who, now curved in on himself, disrupts and exploits what God has made.

At the heart of the second creation story, we realize, lies a profound theological truth for our time: we have abdicated our most basic vocation of caring for the earth by living instead for ourselves, unaware or even *unwilling* to acknowledge the repercussions our habits of consumption and greed have on other people and the planet as a whole.

Over the next month, our Sunday forum series, "World's End? Addressing the Climate Crisis," will invite us to explore the ramifications our way of life is having on the environment, what resources the Christian faith may provide us to face the problem, and what opportunities might exist for corrective action. Our worship services will complement the series, offering hymns in praise of God's creation, including the *new creation* we celebrate this Easter season, along with sermons of hope. You can find out more information about the forum series and a special public lecture in this edition of *The Quill*. I cannot encourage you enough to attend!

The Bible constantly surprises me. The depth of its stories, especially those in the opening pages of its first book, offers not only an answer to the question of purpose; these stories also offer good news in sometimes surprising ways—word of a God, for example, who clothes His children even in exile (Gen 3:21). May this forum series surprise you likewise with hope and give you courage to fulfill *your* vocation as God's caretaker of the world.

Northwest Repertory Singers concert in Tacoma



As many of you know, I'm the artistic director of Northwest Repertory Singers, a 50-voice auditioned community choir in Tacoma. Our spring concerts are Saturday, May 18 at 7:30 PM and Sunday, May 19 at 3 PM, entitled "re|sounding VOICES: Songs of Place and People, Hope and Courage." The concerts will be held at Mason United Methodist Church in Tacoma's bustling Proctor District (a part of town with a feel not unlike Queen Anne Hill, with shops and restaurants near the church). Our concert features the U.S. West Coast premiere of *Everyday Wonders: The Girl from Aleppo*, a hope-filled choral cantata with piano and violin accompaniment based on the true story of a Kurdish refugee girl's journey from Syria to Germany. In addition to *Everyday Wonders*, our program features repertoire by modern American composers. Examples include the incomparable setting of the African-American Spiritual "Wade in the Water" by Moses Hogan; the poignant "Choral Reflections on Amazing

Grace," composed by Roger Ames after the 9/11 attacks; and "Arise, My Love," a joy-filled setting of words from the biblical Song of Solomon. Honoring the human drive to persevere, our concert concludes with composer Tom Trenney's unique 2017 setting of "We Shall Overcome" for choir and djembe (and published by "our own" Augsburg Fortress). **For tickets and information, visit www.nwrs.org.** I would love to see you there!*

World's End? Addressing the Climate Crisis



Scientists across the globe now say that we may have as little as eleven years before irreversible changes in our climate take effect, changes that will be devastating. What is the science predicting, and how might we respond from a faith perspective?

Join us this spring for a *special four-part forum series*—**World's End? Addressing the Climate Crisis**—beginning with a two-part presentation by **Dr. Kristie Ebi**, author of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change latest

report and professor of public health from the University of Washington, followed by an introduction to "eco-theology" by **Pastor Dan** on 5/12, and concluding with a forum and public lecture on 5/19 (see below) by **Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda**, eco-theologian, from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary.

The forum series runs from **Sunday**, **4/28 to Sunday**, **5/19**, 9-10 AM in the Fellowship Hall.



Dr. Kristie L. Ebi is a professor of global health and environmental and occupational health sciences at the University of Washington and she has been conducting research and practice on the health risks of climate varia-

bility and change for over twenty years. Her research focuses on the impacts of and adaptation to climate change. She focuses on understanding sources of vulnerability, estimating current and future health risks of climate change, and designing adaptation policies and measures to reduce the risks of climate change in multi-stressor environments.



Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda, Professor of Theological and Social ethics at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, brings together Earth ethics, eco-feminist theologies, and other liberation theologies in her work on climate change.

Her book, Resisting Structural Evil: Love as Ecological Economic Vocation (Fortress, 2013), won a Nautilus Book Award for social justice. She has lectured or consulted in Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, Latin America, and many parts of North America.



CORE Tanzania Update

We're happy to report continued progress on our Twegashe School program.

First, a huge "Thank you" to the QALC Women for their generous donation of \$3,000. We feel very blessed to have your support!

We've made it through another government hoop, with the formation of a local NGO in Tanzania to carry out our activities there. We have word from our Tanzanian architect that the building permit should be ready by the beginning of May. The block press that we've purchased has made its way from India to Bushasha Village, and our volunteer builder has completed a week-long training in Dallas on using this machine and on building with compressed earth blocks. Our well has been drilled, and a pump is on order, so we'll have water on site when we're ready to start making blocks.

There's still one more government application to complete, but Michael needs to be in-country for us to begin that step. We'll be heading to Bushasha on May 11 to make preparations for construction, and that application will be our first item of business. Michael will be staying in Tanzania for an extended time to oversee the project, and our volunteer builder will arrive in late May, assuming all goes well with his residence permit application. If we haven't received permission by that time to actually start building, there will be plenty of work to do making blocks—our calculation is that for Phase I construction we'll need about 60,000 of them!

Lots of blocks required, and of course, lots of funds, too! We've raised enough to start, but there's still a gap to close for funding the entire Phase I project. We are so thankful for all the support we have already received from our Queen Anne friends. If you have suggestions of people or groups we could reach out to (or that you could reach out to on our behalf) to leverage that support, we would be very grateful for your input.

Thank you for standing behind us in this effort to bring meaningful education to children in rural Tanzania.

You will also have the rich experience of being part of the Conference of Bishops. It was a real eye opener for me coming from the Northwest to discover how diverse the practices of this church are. Yet, I must say I have never experienced a group that works so hard to hear one another and does so in such a respectful way. The Conference became a life line for me.

Before you even settle in you will attend the Churchwide Assembly where you will experience what it means to gather a thousand strong. You will be introduced to the many life-giving ways this church is present throughout the world. It is impressive to hear a thousand voices in song and prayer. (And this is from a guy who doesn't enjoy singing!)

The joy awaits you of being able to meet a host of judicatory leaders and interfaith leaders. This is a group that is growing stronger in solidarity against hate and hostility. They will walk alongside of you as together you share the challenges of navigating these times.

I encourage you to take advantage of the many ways in which Faith Action Network, our Public Policy Office, will invite your voice and presence to advocate for those who are marginalized by a political system that is deeply influenced by privilege and power.

One of my biggest surprises was discovering how deeply valued the church's voice is in a world that still hungers for a gracious moral grounding. I was amazed what it meant to others just to show up.

Coupled with the weight is the pace which at times will be unrelenting. You will need to discover new rhythms and ways to take care of yourself.

May God continue to richly bless you and sustain you as you have said "yes" to serve as a bishop of this church!
