What Do We Do Now?

Our forum series on climate change ended on May 26, but in many ways (I hope), the conversation as a congregation has just begun.

The series started with two sessions led by Dr. Kristi Ebi from the University of Washington. Dr. Ebi specializes in the impact climate change is having on public health along with what could happen as the warming trend continues. She shared how rising temperatures will not only wreak havoc in other parts of the world, affecting, for example, the production of cereal crops like rice and wheat, but also how it will make for hotter and more humid summers here in the Northwest. Higher temperatures for us will create a host of problems, including the influx of mosquitos carrying the West Nile virus.

Following these initial presentations, I introduced eco-theology, which serves as a biblical and theological response to the problem of human-made climate catastrophe. We subsequently welcomed Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda, an eco-feminist theologian from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley. She spoke of "climate sin," which refers to our consumption-driven lifestyles and how they disproportionately impact the poorest people of the world. Yet she also spoke of hope and redemption, offering a "critical mystical vision" which sees/acknowledges what's happening (the negative impact we're having on the planet and its ecosystems), imagines what could be otherwise, and affirms how God can lure us from what is to what could and ought to be.

Our final presenter was Jessica Zimberle of Earth Ministry. Jessica likewise engaged Scripture and theology, asking pointedly, "What does our faith have to say? Why do we care?" Her focus, however, was on practical ways we could get involved as people of faith. She called them "Green Fields." Here are three:

- Worship/Liturgy: prayer, hymnody, and sermons can elevate our awareness of the problem and remind us of our call to be stewards of God's creation, something we incorporated throughout the duration of the climate change series.
- **Buildings and Grounds**: ever notice that in most of our rooms we have receptacles not only for trash but also recycling and composting? You can thank Rich Mathes, who also has been replacing older light bulbs with "greener" LEDs. What else can we do? Start a community garden on church grounds?
- **Faithful Advocacy**: how can we get involved in policy change? Might we find ourselves in Olympia, working with our elected officials in ways that honor our biblical and theological commitment to creation care?

I hope to continue the conversation we began this spring on climate change and what we can do to address it. Get involved. Share your ideas, and let's work together in ways that honor what it means to be the stewards of creation God intended us to be.

FROM THE CANTOR . . .

You've probably seen the announcement in the bulletin or noticed the box in the narthex at the table near the fireplace... a suggestion box for sermon topics and hymns is available for you! As your Cantor, I'm interested in learning about your favorite hymns. This provides me with one window to the "musical memory" of the congregation. The records of my predecessor are another important resource for me, but hearing directly from you is a great way for me to learn more about the hymns that are important to you.

Lutherans have a beautiful heritage of worship, with hymns playing a central role in teaching and proclaiming the faith: We hear the readings, we hear the sermon, and throughout the service we respond in song through poetry and music that reinforce the message. Hymns are chosen based on the season, the readings for the day, and/or other themes that may be celebrated or observed (such as our recent emphasis on creation and the Christian response to climate change). The Hymn of the Day usually ties into the sermon theme or an overarching theme for the day or season, while other hymns may tie into a specific reading (Communion hymns often relate to the Sacrament itself). And, of course, it's also important to take into account theological considerations that may arise from a hymn's text.

It usually takes a church musician quite a while to get a feel for how a congregation sings, and for the congregation to develop a collective sense of musical community with a new church musician. It's sort of a "weaving together" through music that builds upon our weekly gatherings over time. Your hymn suggestions can be a useful resource to draw upon as we continue to get to know each other through singing together—and proclaiming God's story together—in worship. Feel free to leave a suggestion in the box, send me an email, or catch me after worship!

Are you a musician who would like to participate in worship?

The Mystery Basket: easy-peasy or a stump?

With the kick-off on the last Family Sunday happening on June 2, the Mystery Basket will continue to make an appearance each Sunday during the summer.



What is the Mystery Basket?

It's a medium-size basket with a cloth in it that covers up an item, any item, and is sent home with a young worshipper to bring back the following Sunday with a new item inside. The goal is not to send the basket home with the same person two times in a row.

The worshipper who has the Mystery Basket can put in ANY item as long as it fits into the basket, can be covered with the cloth, and is not alive. So sorry, no spiders or worms allowed ©.

On Sunday, the Children's Time minister attempts to relate the item to a trait or action of God that we've learned about in the Bible. Then, whenever we see the item in day-to-day life, it reminds us that God may be seen all around us in both big ways or small ways.

Is there something that will stump the Children's Time minister? From my point of view the answer is, "Probably not!" Surprisingly, in the many years I've experienced the Mystery Basket at church, somehow the item has always related to God. And, whenever I see one of the items, it's a reminder that leads me to notice God's presence in daily life, and in either very small ways or even big ways.

Skeptical? You're invited to attend worship all summer and experience the Mystery Basket for yourself. Who knows, you might even get a turn to take it home!

$\textbf{Doors, Walls and Water} - a \ property \ committee \ update$

- 1. Refinishing the front doors and the McGraw street door is scheduled for July. Because workers must remove the doors and wall off the entrances, we will need to use the Chapel door for 2+ weeks. Please follow signs.
- 2. The second floor heat has not worked since our February snow. The source of the problem was finally found— a damper that was shut. Many of our old dampers are not accessible through panels, but are behind walls. That is why holes now exist in the narthex kitchen walls and other places. After Johansen Mechanical fixes the damper, we will fill the holes.
- 3. Rainwise QALC? The City of Seattle has been trying to reduce Westpoint sewage overflows, which happen when large rains send too much water down sewers too fast. We have a proposal, which costs QALC nothing, to reroute most of our gutters and downspouts into rain barrels to slow down our runoff. Many of the barrels will have screening that matches our wood trim. They could install rain gardens if we prefer. Artist drawings will be posted in the narthex. Please let me know if you have concerns or suggestions.

A Report from the NW WA 2019 Synod Assembly

The Northwest Washington (NWWA) Synod Assembly gathered May 18-20 at the Lynnwood Convention Center. There were about 450 participants at the assembly—370 voting delegates were present. Pastor Dan, Rich Mathes and Candy Mathes were our voting delegates. Georganne Robertson and Paul Hoffman also attended. Every delegate received a handmade prayer shawl—to "help us listen to God" as we worked through the Bishop call (selection) process. There were nine candidates for Bishop whose names were placed before us in the call process. We listened to many presentations and Q&A sessions by and with the candidates. Although those were to help us make our voting decisions, Rich and Candy learned a lot about the Synod and the congregations of the Synod in the process. For example, we heard about the Living Stones prison congregation in Shelton; about congregations without buildings; and heard stories of churches closing, and using the sale of their buildings to support mission endeavors and homeless shelters.



We were impressed with the many candidates (*pictured above*), who had a great variety of backgrounds. There were four separate ballots necessary to complete the call process. The Rev. Shelley Bryan Wee will be our next Bishop (*photo*, *left*). Bryan Wee has served as assistant to the bishop in the Northwest Washington Synod since 2017. She was pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Cheney, Wash., from 2016 to 2017 and campus pastor at Eastern Washington University in Cheney from 2009 to 2017. She served as pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Spokane from 1999 to 2009. The bishop-elect received a Bachelor of Arts from Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma in 1988 and a Master of Divinity from Luther Northwestern Theological Seminary (now Luther Seminary) in 1993.

The Synod does need us lay folks to volunteer for various committees and projects, so if you want to learn more about the Synod, please consider such work.

Rev. Kevin Strickland, assistant to the ELCA Bishop from Chicago, ran the election process. He was great at leading us in song, sometimes to get us into thinking about other issues, and sometimes as a way to break up the Roberts' Rules-driven election process. The large assembly was impressive in song—QALC does not often hear 400+ attendees together united in song!

Bits and pieces that caught Candy's attention:

From Rev. Strickland's opening sermon—

"Grace of God, not judgment and exclusion;"

"We are called to be out in the world."

"Community—not about being right but it is about love and forgiveness."

Candidates were asked to name books/authors that were important to them. A few responses—

- Grounded by Mark Sable and Paul Azaceta,
- Parker Palmer, author, and founder of the Center for Courage and Renewal
- The work of women & LGBTQ+ theologians
- Seven Brief Lessons on Physics by Carlo Rovelli

and from Pastor Unti's closing sermon:

"You are fearfully and wonderfully made. (Psalm 139:14) —Share this with everyone you meet."

The Assembly approved the following six resolutions (along with budget approval and voting on lay and rostered people to serve as members of the Synod Consultation Committee, the Synod Committee on Discipline, and the Synod Council):

- 1. Honored Glen Gersmehl for leading the Lutheran Peace Fellowship for 24 years. He retired on 12-31-2018.
- 2. Resolved: That NWWA Synod endorse the Poor People's Campaign and encourage member support.
- 3. Resolved: That NWWA Synod join Emmaus Collective, which works to dismantle white supremacy in the church culture.
- 4. Resolved: That NWWA Synod Assembly direct the Synod office to review governing documents on racial harassment and discrimination and report by 2021. NWWA will partner with regional organizations to provide diversity training to rostered leaders; congregations are encouraged to support their Rostered Leaders' participation.
- 5. Resolved: That NWWA Synod memorialize ELCA 2019 Churchwide Assembly to urge the US Congress to call on Israel to grant due process rights in the Israeli court system, particularly regarding ill-treatment of Palestinian children, and ensure their operations are carried out in accord with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Bishop Eaton will contact the US Congress.
- 6. Develop a Year of Celebration during 2020 for the 50th anniversary of the ordination of women. This resolution was amended to include the 40th anniversary of ordination of women of color.



Wear Orange June 9 to Support Gun Safety

The statistics are mind boggling. Did you know that about 51 kids under 18 are shot in the U.S. every day? And that 26,000 kids have been killed with guns since 1999? The statistics for adults are even worse.

Twenty-five years ago, the ELCA adopted the Social Message on Community Violence, calling for advocacy and an end to the cycle of violence. This message is still all too relevant, with frequent occurrences of gun violence in this country. A new 60-day ELCA resource invites the church to journey together through daily observances that call us to face the painful truth of gun violence and work for its prevention as people of God who strive for justice and peace in all the world. The 60 days of prayer, scripture, stories and church teaching begins June 16 and can be found at **elca.org/60days**.

The weekend of June 7-9 is **WEAR ORANGE** in the Seattle area and nationwide. Orange is the color worn in the woods when people want to stay safe during hunting season, and all weekend long there will be activities to raise awareness of the need for gun safety. Check the Wear Orange website if you are interested in participating in events sponsored by Mom's Demand Action for Gun Sense, Everytown, and Everytown Survivor Network.

In support of promoting gun safety, people at QALC are encouraged to wear orange on June 9, Pentecost Sunday. And check out the ELCA website for the 60-day journey.


Queen Anne Men's Ministry (for men of all ages)

Bíshop's Message

Life in Between

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!"

—Luke 10:11-13

Our Synod Staff has been dwelling on Luke's story of the 10 lepers for the last several months. It has come to our attention that the story takes place where many, many Biblical Stories take place, "in between places." In this case Jesus encounters the lepers in between Samaria and Galilee.

There is a practical reason for this. The lepers would not have been welcomed in Samaria or Galilee. They were living in the only place they were allowed, on the margins. Given that Jesus was constantly on the move plays right into the likelihood that we will encounter him in between place.

But there is more to this than geography. The story of faith, hope and love is forged "in between." For Abraham and Sarah it was formed in between the invitation to leave behind family and home and the promise of becoming a great nation. For the Israelites it was in the wilderness between Egypt and Promised Land. For the people of exile it was between living in a strange land and the hope of returning home. For the disciples it was in between the sea of Galilee and the cross. And then there is the most holy of time between Good Friday and Easter Morning.

I have never been good at living "in between." The uncertainty creates anxiety for me. I want to know the outcome. I just want to get there. Forty years in the wilderness would have done me in.

It is not easy for me to live in the present. I am often seduced into wanting to go back to the way it was or jumping ahead to what is waiting for me.
