Grace Grants

I am excited to announce that the application process for Northwest Washington Synod Grace Grants is open. Thanks to the vision and desire for continued ministry, Grace Lutheran, Bellevue gave the synod council a percentage of their proceeds

when they closed their ministry. The synod council, in turn, wants to invest this money in congregations and ministry sites who are doing faithful innovation. In that spirit, Grace Grants were born.

For each of the next three years, \$100,000 will be made available for congregations and ministry sites to apply for Grace Grants. If other congregations, institutions or individuals would like to contribute to this fund, the synod council will continue Grace grants beyond these initial three years.

Congregations and ministry sites are welcome to apply for grants ranging from \$2,000 to \$20,000. The council welcomes all applications. In particular, the Grace Grant Committee and synod council are looking for congregations who are faithfully looking into the future, trusting God, and seeing new possibilities in sharing the story of Jesus.

As you consider these grants, these questions might help you discern what God is up to in your area of the synod:

- What is happening in your church's neighborhood? Where do you see possibilities for partnership or collaboration?
- What is our unique ELCA identity and witness?
- Are there avenues to talk with and listen to those outside the walls of the church?
- How can we equip disciples and our own community of faith?
- How can we foster a spirit of connection across the synod?
- What are the resources needed to develop new leaders?
- How can we partner with young adults, listening and collaborating?
- Where are the places we can be more eco-friendly in our church buildings?
- Who are those marginalized?
- Who are those discriminated against?

Of course, there are other areas to consider for ministry through these Grace Grants. These are just a few ideas that might help.

As you prepare, here are some important dates:

- February 1 Grant Application Period open, find form on synod website.
- May 1 Applications due. No late applications will be accepted.
- May Grant committee review will take place.
- June 5 Final approval of Grants by Synod Council.
- June 6 Notification of grants awarded at Synod Assembly.
- July 1 Grants to be funded

Grants need to be used between July 1, 2020 & April 1, 2021. Grants are potentially renewable. I hope you find this opportunity as exciting as the Northwest Washington Synod Council. We are excited to continue vitalizing our congregations and ministry sites into the future – as we trust God is walking with us, leading us and guiding us.

Highlights from the 2020 Annual Congregational Meeting

We met on January 26 for a wonderful lunch (Thanks to all responsible!) and for our QALC Annual Meeting. 50 voting members registered their attendance at the meeting. Full reports including the minutes will soon be in the Members Area of our queenannelutheran.org website. Contact the church office for access to the Members Area.

Reports were presented by Terry Anderson, Director of Children's Ministry, Candy Mathes representing the QALC Women, Cantor Kyle Haugen, Outgoing Council President Dan Squires, and Pastor Dan Peterson.

Myra Dittes presented the Treasurer's Report for 2019. Having begun the year with a robust beginning balance of \$72,881, the church ended the year with a positive ending balance. With increased activities in music (due to the arrival of our Cantor, Kyle Haugen) the financial statements now present increased detail in reporting Worship and Music finances. Council set aside \$50,000 for deferred maintenance; at the end of the year those funds were transferred to the funds for the stewardship of the building. In 2019 Donor Designated Benevolences amount to \$32,668. A motion was approved to transfer the Endowment Fund Assets to the ELCA Fund Pooled Trust.

Nancy Fulwiler presented the Audit Committee report, confirming that the church's financial policies, procedures, and records are all sound.

Marc Oplinger presented the Nominating Committee report, and the 2020 slate of candidates was approved as presented; our new congregational leadership is listed below, and the new Council will begin meeting this month. Several positions on the 2020 Nominating Committee and one of two delegate positions to the one-day Synod Convention in May are still open.

Rich Mathes presented the 2020 Guidelines for Expenditures, noting that in order to break even the church needs to increase offerings.

Many people have contributed to the mission and work of QALC over the past year. Throughout the meeting, thanks were given for everyone's stewardship of time, presence and finances. There is much to celebrate from 2019 and much to look forward to in 2020 and beyond!

FROM THE CANTOR

Choir and Community

With so many Facebook acquaintances and friends who are also church musicians, I come across posts and links related to my profession. Through a friend's re-posting at Facebook I recently found a blog article entitled, "The Critical Importance of Church Choirs." The article is posted at a site called blog.discoverworship.com, and I must state upfront that I don't know much about that site or the views espoused there overall—I simply thought the author (Vince Wilcox) made some interesting observations in this particular piece. Below I share some of my own thoughts as well as a quote from Wilcox.

For Lutheran Christians, the choir has always been central in worship alongside the robust participation of the congregation. The choir helps steward a biblical worship heritage dating from ancient times (consider especially the Psalms) as well as our unique Lutheran musical-theological history and its contribution to the evolution of Western culture. This means that preparation of music and building skills as an ensemble are essential to a healthy choir's identity. But more importantly, a choir—especially a volunteer choir—is a *community*. Wilcox writes:

We live in the age of the superstar worship leader and celebrity pastor. Choirs can be an antidote to this spiritual epidemic. A healthy choir affirms all it's [sic] members—not just the high-profile ones. A choir can be a redemptive community where all the imperfect parts of the Body of Christ are cherished—especially when someone is going through a tough time. A choir is a place where you belong, where you are missed when you're not there, and where you can contribute your modest talent so that the whole can be greater than the sum of its parts.

It's my hope that QALC's choir can offer a fun, educational, caring "community within our community" through our weekly preparation to help lead the song of the congregation. If you've ever considered joining us Thursdays at 7 PM, please feel welcome—the Lent/Easter cycle is coming and this is a great time to check us out. There's always extra sheet music for guests!

Coming Soon

I'm looking forward to working with for**KIDS** again in February, and we'll offer a musical selection or two at our Family Sunday in March (last December's psalm refrain with kids and choir together went well, giving kids leadership within the worship service). Looking further ahead, we'll have a "free ring" (no rehearsal required!) again this year on Palm Sunday for kids (10:30) and adults/kids (8:00). I'll also be reaching out soon to see if there is interest in more structured bell-ringing opportunities for adults leading up to Easter Sunday. Stay tuned!



ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP AND FAITH

Suggestion Box Yields Great Results in December

The first month of the Climate Change Suggestion Box was a success! Rich Mathes won the drawing and received a reusable water bottle. Here are the excellent suggestions our members submitted:

For the Community:

Support uniform federal standards for recycling and composting.

For the Church:

Solar panels.

Use compostable products to replace plastic. BEWARE: "compostable" means what Cedar Grove accepts. Flatware and lined deli containers are trash in Seattle, even though the products say they are compostable. Plates with slick surfaces and waxed cups aren't compostable, either. Even if you wash food off these dishes and recycle them, the paper itself probably goes into the garbage at the recycler.

For Our Homes:

Put up a clothesline to dry your clothes in good weather (makes them smell wonderful!).j

Plan trips to avoid using the car; make it a family contest! Ideas: 1) carpool with families for soccer practice, 2) ride bikes or walk to school, 3) group errands – for example, do grocery shopping and visit the library when you're in the area for a doctor/dentist appointment.

Use compostable products to replace plastic. BEWARE: "compostable" means what Cedar Grove accepts. Flatware and lined deli containers are trash in Seattle, even though the store where you get them says they are compostable. Plates with slick surfaces and waxed cups aren't compostable, either. Even if you wash food off these dishes and recycle them, the paper itself probably goes into garbage at the recycler.

Use washable ceramic/glass dishes and storage containers instead of single use plastic.

Use air purifiers for good respiratory health.

Use toilet paper made from recycled paper. A million acres of Canada's boreal forests are logged each year, and a lot of that timber goes to make throwaway tissue products like toilet paper. Since boreal forests store more carbon per hectare than any other forest ecosystem, they are one of the best defenses against climate change. NO major household brands of toilet paper contain any recycled content. See the sustainability scorecard below from the Natural Resources Defense Council/Stand.earth and Google "The Issue with Tissue".

Prior to that, she served as Director for Community Engagement and Professor of Intercultural Studies at Trinity Lutheran College in Everett. As an Associate with the Kaleidoscope Institute, Stacy regularly facilitates intercultural competency training with an ecumenical consortium of Northwest churches and trainers.

Stacy brings a solid background of investment in young adults. She has been deeply involved as an advisor and young adult mentor for a five-year Asian American Discipleship Conference series on faith and vocation. Stacy has also served on the Lutheran Volunteer Corps Board of Directors (LVC) and connected locally with service volunteers. Since her own youth, Stacy has been rooted in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA), and has served as denominational staff and in many volunteer capacities, including the ELCA's national Multicultural Youth Leadership Events.

While in Chicago, she was Dean of the Community and member of the faculty at the Lutheran School of Theology, Chicago. Stacy has traveled extensively in Latin America, Asia and Africa and holds degrees from UCLA and McCormick Theological Seminary. These experiences equip her with a wealth of global, ecumenical, and theological insight. Meanwhile, Stacy brings another talent from urban Chicago: an "unparalleled ability" to parallel park in the tightest of spaces!

In her spare time, Stacy still loves reading books: from how the brain works to the latest on understanding the complexities of culture and politics. Alongside her spouse Diakonda, Stacy is passionate about advocating for inclusion of all members of our communities, particularly immigrants.

When asked what she looked forward to in partnering with Krista Colleagues, Stacy shared, "In these terribly polarized times when the tensions in our life together seem daunting, the wisdom and perseverance of the Colleagues—together with the access and potential available in our connected/global world—will move us all to a better place than we can even begin to imagine. Our preparations for Twegashe School are going well. Construction is a bit behind schedule, partly because of rain, and also because our volunteer builder, Bill Suhr, couldn't stay as long as planned since his work permit was denied. But we were fortunate to find a Tanzanian from the Arusha area with the skills necessary to take Bill's place. He can't be here on a regular basis, but during the time he is here, he is very effective, and the crew loves him. It seems as though they work hard when he's not here to do things right and earn his approval when he returns! The roof is the hold-up now. As soon as it arrives and is installed the classroom will be ready to go except for a few last-minute touches

We have hired two wonderful teachers who have lots of experience teaching young children and are very excited about helping to create the kindergarten program for a brand new school. Our friend Keela Williams has been here for four weeks training Editha and Joanita in the Montessori method and orienting them to all the materials that she has donated. They are impressed with how these materials force children to really think, rather than just memorize as is very common here.

The best news we have to report is that the local Lutheran Church (by far the largest church in Bushasha) has agreed to let us use their building to house our kindergarten class until their classroom at

Twegashe School is ready. Hooray for the Lutherans! This means we will be able to begin classes on the third of February. So exciting! This news is especially good since it means that Keela will still be here and will be able to work with the teachers and students together. (Of course, personally, I am also very excited because it means I will still be here when classes begin, too!)

We hope you share our excitement, since your support and encouragement have helped to make this all possible. Asante sana!



February Book Group — Educated: A Memoir

The Queen Anne Book Group (open to all) will meet on Monday, February 25 at 7 PM in the church narthex to discuss *Educated: A Memoir* by Tara Westover. Discussion will be led by Nancy Fulwiler.

Tara Westover was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. Born

to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, she prepared for the end of the world by stockpiling homecanned peaches. In the summer she stewed herbs for her mother, a midwife and healer, and in the winter she salvaged in her father's junkyard.

The family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education, and no one to intervene when Tara's older brother became violent. Then, lacking a formal education. Tara began to educate herself. She taught herself enough mathematics and grammar to be admitted to Brigham Young University, where she studied history, learning for the first time about important world events like the Holocaust and the civil rights movement. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her over oceans and across continents, to Harvard and to Cambridge. Only then would she wonder if she'd traveled too far, if there was still a way home.
