### Vocation and the "Purpose-Driven Life"

When I was a professor at Seattle University, I used to love teaching students about vocation. The word comes from the Latin term *vocare* which means to call. In a Christian setting it means to be called *by God* for a particular kind of work in the world.

Before the Protestant Reformation, only the "spiritual elite" (monks, nuns, priests) were believed to have had a vocation in life. Martin Luther changed that. Following 2 Thessalonians 1:11, he argued that *every Christian* had a calling from God. A maid was just as called to her work as a monk was to his, provided she did it in the spirit of service (i.e., for the sake of helping her neighbor).

Luther equated a person's calling with the "station in life" s/he already inhabited. Social and economic mobility were uncommon in his day. The idea was to do what you already do in the spirit of service. Yet Luther was also aware that the world around him was changing, that education could make some degree of mobility possible. This gave people the opportunity to determine *for themselves* the kind of calling they wished to pursue.

You can find *your* vocation by thinking about the kind of work you enjoy, whether it suits your skills, and how you can use both to help/serve others. This is the recipe for a "purpose-driven life." Teaching it to college students was enjoyable because it helped them navigate everything from choosing electives to exploring internships. It helped them see that finding a career was about more than personal fulfillment. It was about helping others, which helps make for a better world.

Most of us are well beyond deciphering the steps we must take to find our first career. We might think that learning the recipe for a "purpose-driven life" no longer applies. But it does: a vocation, a calling from God, can be anything from the role you play as a parent or grandparent to the volunteer activities you pursue following retirement. I think of our quilters, how the work they do reflects something they *enjoy*, draws on the *talents* they have, and then utilizes both for the sake of *helping others*. Without them, and without the many other volunteers who contribute their time and talents, our ministry cannot—and will not—survive.

Members and friends of Queen Anne Lutheran have done an incredible job in sustaining this ministry through financial giving over the past year (especially in the midst of a pandemic). Our ministry needs your time and talents too. We have a variety of unusual pathways to plug into the life of the church, and we have a pressing need for helping volunteers to support our community and staff. Pages 12 and 13 of this month's edition of *The Quill* offer some great examples. Consider them. How might God be calling you in this ministry to a purpose-driven life?

# From the Cantor

Here are a few "news briefs" related to music ministry at QALC.

### New "Song Stories" video series

At about the time this newsletter is published, I'll release the first in a new series of "Song Stories" YouTube videos. Each video will be approximately two minutes long and will provide historical background about a hymn, plus a stanza or brief musical selection based on it. The first featured hymn is "Lift Every Voice and Sing" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship 841). Keep an eye out in the Friday emails for info about new videos as they are released!

### For KIDS music #2 is coming soon

The first For**KIDS** video (in lieu of Sunday song time) was released on Reformation Sunday, October 25. Keep an eye out for the next video for the first Sunday of Advent, November 29. The video will include "Light One Candle to Watch for Messiah" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship* 240). We'll sing a stanza of this hymn each week in our audio (or video) worship services, and the For**KIDS** video will be a good resource to help kids learn this song. Also, I hope you'll consider using this song for your own family devotions as you light Advent candles at home.

### **Christmas and ForKIDS**

In lieu of a Christmas pageant, a slide show/video with music and narration is coming to our YouTube channel on December 20. Many thanks to those who have signed up for one-on-one For**KIDS** *Zoom music sessions*, which were publicized by Terry and in QALC Friday emails. I will be adding more sessions, hoping that this will lead to more participation. Here's how the sessions work: During each one-on-one, 15-minute Zoom session, I'll sing Christmas songs "Simon Says" style and record the Zoom audio. Later, I'll stitch the kids' voices together for use as part of the slide show/video. This way of recording music will be a bit of an experiment for me, but I think it will work! (Note that for *speaking* parts for the Christmas slide show/video, kids and adults will record in the nave, just like for Sunday audio services, so if you're planning to help, please watch for more details about that.)

### **Lessons and Carols**

In place of our usual worship services on December 24 and December 25, I'm working with Pastor Dan to produce a Lessons and Carols video service that you'll be able to follow (and sing with) at home. If you've seen our Holden Evening Prayer services from last summer, I envision something similar, with the words of the readings and carols clearly visible for you to follow as the audio plays. Nothing can come close to celebrating our Lord's birth together, but hopefully this (and our ForKIDS slide show/video) will give us a sense of the season with our church family.

### **Happy Thanksgiving**

Even amid everything that we are dealing with—as individuals and as a community—we are always thankful for the One who promises to always be with us. May the peace of Christ rule in your hearts this Thanksgiving. As always, keep singing in the Spirit while we are apart!

### A Bit of GRIT

Three of our grandkids go to public schools in the small suburb of Westmont outside of Chicago.

At all school levels, the focus is on students learning the skills of "**GRIT**," and at Middle School graduation a few years ago, grandson Tim was one of three getting an award for living **GRIT**. To me the word grit brought up images of tough cowboys living off the land, so we looked up the details:

"Living with grit is perseverance and passion toward long-term goals, and sustained commitment toward completing specific endeavors despite episodes of failure, setbacks, and adversity. Resilience is a part of grit."

We learned that people with grit often display the following traits:

- Have a core purpose in life.
- Learn from the wisdom of those with life experience.
- Learn from people who have failed before finding success.
- Learn from nature and literature.
- When tempted to give up, ask, "What's the hard part of this problem?"
- Choose to try something hard/challenging because they want to, not because they have to.
- Are problem solvers.
- Ask themselves: Is this problem permanent or temporary?
- Ask themselves: Do I blame myself or others or a situation for this problem?
- Persevere.

The Bible is full of stories reminding us of people who lived with grit: Elizabeth, Mary, Joseph, the wise men, and the shepherds, just to name a few!

For many of us, the holidays will be very different this year as we're advised not to get together with loved ones, not to come together in person to worship or to light the Advent wreath, or to experience the music and candles at the candlelight service. We'll need a dose of grit!

Try making a mantra about God's presence in your life, and let the word **GRIT** come to mind when you start feeling down:

### First Sunday in Advent, November 29—We Celebrate Communion

This month, we celebrate the First Sunday in Advent on November 29 with a video edition of "Word Out!." The service includes the lighting of our sanctuary Advent candle, and will also incorporate Communion. As Pastor Dan states in that service's Welcome, we look with hope in the Advent season to new beginnings. He notes, "Sunday's service itself features a new beginning. Months into a pandemic that seems indefinite, we at Queen Anne Lutheran Church recognize the spiritual need for sustenance; a need we did not anticipate in the early days of the outbreak. 

When asked simple questions about global trends, we systematically get the answers wrong. So wrong that a chimpanzee choosing answers at random will consistently outguess teachers, journalists, Nobel laureates, and investment bankers. In *Factfulness*, Professor of International Health and global TED phenomenon Hans Rosling, together with his two long-time collaborators, Anna and Ola, offers a radical new explanation of why this happens. They reveal the ten instincts that distort our perspective—from our tendency to divide the world into two camps (usually some version of *us* and *them*) to the way we consume media (where fear rules) to how we perceive progress (believing that most things are getting worse).

### Seattle LWR (Lutheran World Relief) Ingathering 2020

Prior to Covid19, our LWR Quilt & Kit Ingathering (collecting quilts and kit to ship to Baltimore warehouse) process had not changed for many years. Our process relied upon volunteers (6-7/shift) who spend hours inside a container (424 square feet) stacking boxes. Covid19 made that model less safe and some of our usual volunteers would not work inside the container since there was no social distancing.

LWR came up with a new model. Boxes would be collected over several days and then a professional moving crew would load the container. This required a church large enough to store the boxes, maybe for a long time, plus one with a parking lot that directly leads into the building without stairs or cumbersome ramps. First Lutheran Church of Bothell (FLCB) volunteered to be the guinea pig for this new process in the Seattle area.

In October, churches brought their boxes to the FLCB parking lot. But even then the process was COVID-19-modified. The drivers, and passengers, needed to be masked, and stay in their vehicles. Our loading crew was limited to the number of persons FLCB allowed to use their building and grounds (two groups of six). FLCB took temperatures of the volunteers when we arrived, and recorded our contact data. Any drivers/passengers that needed to use restroom, had to be temperature-screened as well. Deliveries were scheduled every 15 minutes so that cars would not need to line up, and so that our "unloaders" would have time to get everything inside safely. Our "unloaders" used two-wheel dollies to roll all boxes into FLCB building.

A 53-foot container was delivered to the FLCB parking lot, and on Nov 20th it was fully loaded. The hired professional moving crew worked inside the container, employing the normal Box Tetris approach. Our regular volunteers moved boxes on two-wheelers from inside the building to the container, and placed the boxes on the container lip. This process only took around three hours. The excess boxes at FLCB will probably be shipped when another similar Ingathering happens in 2021.

Many thanks to all the many volunteers and to FLCB who helped with this "Modified COVID-19 LWR Loading Process."

The question came up the other night at the "QALCW Informal Zoom Meeting with a Glass of Wine:" What are we thankful for?



Twegashe students are now in their new home! They moved from their temporary classroom in the village Lutheran church at the end of October. We are so grateful to that congregation for allowing us to use their building, since otherwise this group of kindergartners would not have had the opportunity to attend Twegashe School. Another example of Lutheran generosity in action!

We're also grateful to Queen Anne's own Marc Oplinger for the design of this lovely classroom, including the beautiful colors. The children and teachers are very happy to be in this wonderful new space!

Michael and I have been in Bushasha since early October, and a lot has happened in that time. The kindergartners went on a field trip to collect worms for the composting toilets, our cook set up shop in the new kitchen at Twegashe School, the students received new raincoats just in time for the start of the rainy season (It rains a lot here, and it's cold when it rains!), we've arranged with the director of the village clinic for regular health check-ups for the students, and we've started taking applications for next year's kindergarten class.



Phase I construction is almost finished. All that remains is one teacher duplex and some finishing touches on the classroom building and toilets. And just in time for the completion of construction, we've received a Rotary grant for solar electricity for the school!

Dear Ones,

In this month that we celebrate Thanksgiving, I give thanks for you. May God's Spirit continue to lead and guide us in these times.

This last week my mom called to tell me that they would not be hosting a big family celebration for Thanksgiving this year because of COVID-19. I already knew that we wouldn't be able to have the raucous, crowded party that we have had in the past (and will have in the future), but it still is hard when the decision is voiced. Unfortunately, we are still in COVID-19 times. And because of this, I want to emphasize a few things for all of you.

In the last few weeks, I have been asked when the synod would have new, updated guidelines. As the guidelines were a few months old, I thought I should review and give new guidelines for where we are now. However, as I started working on updated guidelines, I realized pretty quickly that old guidelines are today's guidelines ... because we are still in COVID -19 times. Therefore, the updated recommendations sound remarkably like the old recommendations.

The NWWA Synod continues to encourage care and thoughtful preparation for your community. A carefilled response is much more than unlocking the church doors and inviting all to come. Please keep in mind the Washington State guidelines and CDC guidelines and the population of your congregation. While we are all in different phases, depending on your county, here are some guidelines that we all should keep in mind.

- 1. Please continue to avoid large gatherings, maintain physical distance when with others, use face coverings, and regularly wash hands and surfaces.
- 2. To maintain ultimate safety, the NWWA Synod continues to recommend that congregations and ministry sites continue to utilize corporate worship on an online or digital platform until February 2021 and further into 2021 depending on the availability of vaccines or other positive markers.
- 3. If there is an in-person worship experience, please

consider meeting outside while masked and physical distanced and following the protocols for a corporate gathering. While this is not completely safe, this is the next safest option to meeting online.

- 4. If there is an in-person worship experience indoors, please understand that there is high-risk involved, and care must be taken for the safety of all. Please consider this carefully and thoroughly before implementing. Please see the synod website for further guidance.
- 5. If you are going to meet in-person, small gatherings are the safest option. Below are some ideas that are meant to meet spiritual, emotional, and physical needs as we continue to navigate this pandemic. (These ideas are meant to be a supplement to online worship and are only to be implemented after careful reflection and planning).
- Small group Bible studies
- One-on-one pastoral care conversations
- Bringing a meal or a card to a homebound person
- Participating in a food drive
- Having a "bring your own food" potluck gathering in a backyard.
- Sitting around a bonfire listening to a guitar
- Book Study
- I'm sure you all have many others.

If you have ideas in your congregation or ministry site on how to meet the spiritual, emotional and physical needs of people during this time, please share with others so we may safely and meaningfully meet with one another during this time. We would be happy to post these ideas on our website.

As we enter into winter, it is easy to let our guards down. We long to be together. We miss each other. And we are tired. I get it. I'm with you. I want nothing more than to be able to be with you in-person. But as we love God and neighbor, let us continue to be church in the world. Let us thoughtfully and prayerfully prepare. And let us continue to be Holy Community. And remember, dear Beloveds, we are still gathered and we are still sent – to live into the love of Jesus with all we meet.

### **Donations by Check**

You may know that the church must always observe the IRS rules for acknowledging donations. In order for your gifts to be included on your 2020 QALC Giving Statement, please remember that:

Checks can be mailed as late as December 31st, but the envelope must have a "2020" postmark to be considered a 2020 donation.

### **Credit Card Donations**

QALC also accepts credit card donations.

- You can charge your donation to your Paypal account, or if you don't have a Paypal account, you can use any credit card.
- Like donations made via check, these PayPal transactions must also be dated 2020.
