Grief, Gratitude, and Hope

In 1 Corinthians 13:13 the Apostle Paul speaks of faith, hope, and love, the greatest of which he says is love. For this issue of *The Quill*, I'd like to suggest another triad that, I think, captures the year now in review: grief, gratitude, and hope.

We all grieve. We know the experience of loss. The pandemic has amplified it, preventing some, for instance, from visiting their loved ones who are dying. Several hundred thousand people have now lost their lives to Covid-19. Businesses, once prosperous, have floundered. Jobs have disappeared. There is so much to grieve. My heart goes out to those in our congregation especially who have suffered the loss of family members. It goes out as well to those who, like my mother, struggle arduously against cancer, or who find themselves for whatever reason nearing the end of life.

Grief by itself can be terrible, even if it is a part of life. But sometimes gratitude accompanies grief. Think of loss: you may feel a deep, agonizing absence when someone close to you dies. You may *also* find yourself feeling grateful for that person's presence in your life. This happened to me recently when I learned that a long-time mentor of mine passed away. I was deeply saddened when I heard the news; at the same time, I was also filled with gratitude that he had been part of my life. I was lucky to know him.

Gratitude often accompanies grief when we think of those who cared for a loved one, of doctors and nurses, say, who showed compassion. Consider also the selfless dedication people in our congregation have exhibited in donating their time, talents, and/or treasure to charitable causes and organizations like Queen Anne Helpline, not to mention our ministry here at Queen Anne Lutheran. Because of them—because of *you*—we have been able to help provide meals to people experiencing homelessness during this pandemic, and we have been able to offer rental assistance to keep others from experiencing homelessness. Many who have received assistance from us have expressed their gratitude to me, and on their behalf I express my gratitude to you.

Here's something interesting: Gratitude can inspire hope.

I have been thinking a lot about hope, where it comes from and what makes our hope as Christians distinctive. I even made it the topic of discussion on a recent God for Grownups [podcast episode](#) with my friend Pastor Mark Griffith. Here is what I have found: stories we have inherited from the past can inform an orientation of hope toward the future. We have heard, for example, of what God did in Jesus Christ long ago. We recall, as the prologue of John's Gospel says, that the light has entered the darkness. Remembering it some 2,000 years later shows that the "darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). That gives me hope.


Looking back on 2020, we may simultaneously experience feelings of grief and gratitude. It's been a difficult year! But we also have hope. Long before 2020, a light came into the world, and that still flickers—now and into the coming year.

A new hymnal supplement for 2021: *All Creation Sings*

This year we will introduce the ELCA’s new hymnal supplement, *All Creation Sings*, at QALC—but as we continue to live through COVID-19, I’m not sure *exactly* how that will take place. We’re as ready as we can be for *All Creation Sings* in the midst of the pandemic: QALC has already received several copies of the supplement for the choir, as well as leader and accompaniment editions, and the Worship and Music Committee will recommend funding in the upcoming 2021 budget to help cover the purchase of pew copies. Presumably the ELCA will soon make texts and music available through its online resource subscription service, *Sundays and Seasons*, as well, which will help make material available for *Word Out!*

Some of you may remember *Worship Supplement* (1969), and many of us know *With One Voice* (1995). *All Creation Sings* is similar in scope and substance. Like those earlier volumes, this new supplement will help the church at large to share and to sift music and texts that are new, unfamiliar, cross-cultural, or sometimes even a little bit experimental. From the Augsburg Fortress website, here’s more information about *All Creation Sings*:

This resource invites us to expand our song and prayer with timely attention to the health of our planetary home and the human community within it. 200 hymns and songs are included, more than 30 of them multilingual and many being new since ELW was released. This body of song supports the rhythms of the whole church year and gives enlarged expression to themes of healing and wholeness, creation care, justice and peace, praise and lament. Here are two new communion services, one presented in Spanish and English, the other offering options for evening use. Also included are a contemplative service of word and prayer as well as more than 50 additional prayer resources, rounding out nearly 70 pages of liturgy content.

And, *All Creation Sings* includes a beautiful hymn for Transfiguration Sunday, “Dazzling Presence on the Mountain,” by one of our own QALC members, Rev. Paul Hoffman!

I look forward to helping QALC get to know *All Creation Sings*, and the songs, hymns, and liturgical elements that fit our community and help to enrich our worship life together. I hope 2021 brings us together soon. As always, keep singing in the Spirit while we are apart.


With the New Year on the way, the chapter “Frame Your New Year’s Resolutions in Terms of Giving” caught my eye. Below is an excerpt for your contemplation:

Annual Congregational Meeting This Month

We will be holding our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday January 31, as a daytime virtual meeting on the Zoom platform. More details will be sent out to all members before January 17, and our Annual Report will be available on that date also. At 10 AM on Sunday the 31st, there will be a Q&A session with Church Council members to address any questions members have, prior to the meeting itself later that day. The purpose of the annual meeting of the congregation is to review and celebrate the previous year's accomplishments, with reports from the pastor, the president and treasurer, and others; to elect officers and delegates for the coming year; and to hear and vote on this year's guidelines for expenditures and any other proposals requiring the majority approval of the membership.

May 2021 Synod Assembly Information Emerging

At our Annual Congregational Meeting, we will be electing our delegates to attend the NW WA Synod Assembly. The following letter from the Synod came out this week. Go to lutheransnw.org/2021-Synod-Assembly to check for further updates. This letter was edited for length:

Greetings, Congregations and Leaders of the Northwest Washington Synod,

I am pleased to be sharing with you some preliminary information regarding our 2021 Synod Assembly. This assembly will be VERY different than previous assemblies, so please be attentive to information coming out in these upcoming months to prepare you for an easy experience!

First, our assembly will be Saturday May 15, 2021, from 9 AM–4 PM, and it will be completely online, via Zoom. We are building a great team to make the event smooth and easy to navigate.

Assembly will include worship, reports from our synod and churchwide leaders, elections, resolutions, and ministry anniversary celebrations.

Registration will open February 1st and close March 31st. The cost is \$25 per voting member. (NB—*QALC covers the costs for our representatives*) Visitors will be free – and while not part of the Zoom meeting, they will be invited to participate by following the livestream of the event.

As congregations prepare to elect voting members from your congregations, please keep in mind that due to the online nature of this Assembly, it will be necessary for each voting member to have access to their own computer and smart phone to participate in the meeting and our voting process.



It's Official: Lutheran Community Services Northwest and Compass Housing Alliance Join Forces



Seattle, WA—Jan. 4, 2021 – Lutheran Community Services Northwest (LCS Northwest) and Compass Housing Alliance (Compass) have signed a definitive agreement for Compass to become an affiliate of LCS Northwest. The agreement was approved by the Board of Directors for both organizations and is effective Jan. 1, 2021.

The two social services agencies with Lutheran roots bring different complementary strengths to the affiliation. Compass brings a focus on enhanced emergency services and affordable housing, while LCS Northwest brings a focus on behavioral health, child welfare, family services, crime victims, and seniors.

“Both of our 100-year-old organizations have a history of responding to needs in our communities and making meaningful impacts,” said LCS Northwest CEO and President David Duea. “We live in a time when

people are struggling economically, and our dual focus on the most vulnerable people could not be more important. I believe that working side by side, we can deliver health, justice and hope as well as stability, growth and community.”

God-Talk #3: Providence of God

With *Dr. Michael Zbaraschuk* 1/10/21 at 10 AM

Michael Zbaraschuk returns to us to lead a discussion about the idea of Providence from a Christian process theological perspective. He will first talk about some Christian understandings of Providence that have been constructed in the past, and then outline one informed by a process theological worldview.

Dr. Zbaraschuk wrote his dissertation on a process-liberation theological understanding of providence at the Claremont Graduate University. He is now an Associate Professor of Religion at Pacific Lutheran University, where he teaches constructive theology (historical, liberation, green, and feminist). He is the author of *The Purposes of God* (Pickwick), and the editor of *The Emerging Church, Millennials and Religions* and (with Daniel J. Peterson, our pastor) of *Resurrecting the Death of God* (SUNY Press).

New Year's Resolutions—for the Planet

Every year, I make those same New Year's resolutions – lose weight, exercise more, read more, watch less TV. Almost always, they are aspirations for self improvement. But, as the New York Times newsletter, "Climate Fwd" recently pointed out, perhaps 2021 is the year to make a New Year's resolution to help the planet.

In past articles for this column we've talked about changes we can do personally, within our church, and in the community. But let's be honest, those are tiny drops in the bucket compared to the urgent changes needed nation-wide to slow (let alone reverse) the rapid onslaught of climate change. Covid19 taught us the phrase "flatten the curve". Now we need to apply this to global warming. And as with Covid19, drastic action is required.

This year, my New Year's resolution will be to "THINK BIG".

We can start by supporting some of the flagship efforts of our Governor to be an example for the rest of the country. His goals include the following:

- Establish a Clean Fuel Standard, which reduces transportation pollution through electrification of cleaner fuels for ferries, transit, and passenger vehicles.
- Pass the Climate Commitment Act, which caps statewide greenhouse gas emissions and invests in clean energy, transportation, and climate resilience projects, and funds part of the Working Families Tax Credit.
- Pass the Healthy Homes and Clean Buildings Act, which requires new buildings to use carbon-free space and water heating by 2030, and puts the state on a pathway to fully decarbonize existing buildings by 2050.
- Require an environmental justice assessment for all climate-related investments, and create an Environmental Justice and Equity Advisory Panel to analyze how climate investments impact those most vulnerable to climate change.
- Invest \$428 million in clean transportation, clean buildings, and clean energy projects.

We can write letters, email, and call our government representatives to make sure they know what legislation and policies we think are important. We can check our 401(k)'s and eliminate any investments in fossil fuels (and ask our employers to do the same). We can write to Target and other big box stores and urge them to reduce plastic packaging. We can pray for the earth, for guidance on how best to use our own talents and resources to help, and for the energy to carry out our intentions. What will your New Year's resolution be?

Dear Beloveds,

For this new year, the synod staff has adopted a working statement. We are excited to share it with you and we hope that you may use it and adapt it in your context and community:

“Trusting in the Spirit, we are walking together as God’s people so that all may discover and participate in what God is doing among us through Jesus.”

“Trusting in the Spirit...

Martin Luther writes in the Small Catechism regarding the third article of the Apostles’ Creed,

“I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel ...” As people of God, we know that doubts, concerns, worry, frustration and so many other things get in the way of following Jesus. But even when we do not have the strength or even the faith to carry on, God still calls us through the Spirit. As we hear and live into the good news that God comes to us – daily – hourly – every minute of every day, we are carried through the Spirit.

...we are walking together as God’s people ...

As I have said before, the word “synod” comes from two Greek words: sun- ‘together’ + hodos ‘way’. I love the image of walking together – of helping someone up when they stumble, of holding hands when it is difficult to see the way forward, of cheering on those who are in the front and encouraging those who are in the back – one huge Jesus-following gathering. This, of course, does not mean that we always agree. And it does not mean that we won’t have hard conversations. All of this is part of being in relationship (if you don’t have conversation anymore, you don’t have much of a relationship). But together, we, as the people of God, walk

together, knowing that we are on a journey with Christ, knowing that we are Holy Community together.

Have you ever seen a baby discover their hands for the first time? Suddenly they are moving them around and laughing, curling their fingers, inspecting their palms, sticking them in their mouths. The gift of hands was something they never even comprehended before and suddenly – there they are. Right in front of their eyes.

Have you ever heard someone who recently heard the good news of Jesus express their wonder and amazement at who God is and who they are in God’s eyes? They suddenly see the world, themselves, each other, and God in a totally new way.

Sometimes those of us who have been around for a while, we forget. We forget the wonder, the beauty, the sheer joy of experiencing and participating in what God through Jesus is doing in this world of ours. As people of God, we are called to open our hearts, open our very beings, to see and hear and feel and experience and participate in what God is doing among us through Jesus. We are called to laugh, to inspect, to taste what God is doing in this amazing world we have been given. And we are called to share the good news of what we see God is up to among us and the communities that surround us so that all may discover and participate.

Dear Beloveds, all of us on the synod staff are thankful for you as we live and dance in the Spirit, walk with you, and continue to live into the amazing grace of God through Jesus Christ our Savior.
