



I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.







on LIFT EVERY VOICE Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954)

About today's music

"Lift Every Voice and Sing" (ELW 841), known for decades in the U.S. as the Black National Anthem, features words by James W. Johnson (1871–1938) and music by his brother, J. Rosamund Johnson (1873–1954). Written at the turn of the 20th century to honor Abraham Lincoln and the Emancipation Proclamation, it was premiered by a choir of schoolchildren at the all-Black Stanton School in Jacksonville Florida on Lincoln's birthday, February 12, 1900. Hymnologist Paul Westermeyer notes: "It is poetry—closer to high-art poetry than to hymnic poetry—that celebrates liberty without neglecting the reality of the 'stony road' and the 'blood of the slaughtered.' Remarkably, however, it moves with hope through 'silent tears' without the fury that could easily be expected." Although the complex melody lends itself to a practiced choir or soloist, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" transcended its choral origins to become a rallying cry of the Civil Rights era of the 1950s and 1960s and, ultimately, a cherished fixture of American communal song.
