



I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.







Postlude Psalm 19

Benedetto Marcello (1686-1739)

About today's music

Psalm 150 reminds us that dance can be a form of praise. Last week's postlude was a dancelike piece by J.S. Bach nicknamed the "Gigue Fugue." Today the first music we hear hearkens to music of dance. Ordained in the United Methodist Church, composer David A. deSilva is a trustees' distinguished professor of New Testament and Greek at the Ashland Theological Seminary, the author of more than twenty-five books, and a contributor to biblical translation projects. He serves as organist and director of music at a Methodist church in Florida and has several published pieces for organ, choir, and handbells. For the collection entitled *The Danserye*, deSilva adapts Tylman Susato's Renaissance music originally composed for small instrumental ensembles. Susato (c. 1510/15 – after 1570), an innovator in the use of movable type for music, was an accomplished composer of Mass settings and other church music — as well as instrumental music based on dance forms, and secular vocal music.
