

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.







from *Six Short Preludes and Postludes*, Op. 101 V. "Founded on an old Irish church melody." Charles Villiers Stanford (1852–1924)

### About today's music

The melodies for today's organ postlude (GARTAN) and for the sending hymn (SLANE) are both traditional Irish melodies. Both are also closely associated with texts from the Irish *lorica* prayer tradition (prayers for protection). Although today's postlude melody is sometimes associated with Christmas, the Irish organist, conductor, and scholar Charles Villiers Stanford (1852–1924) matched the melody with a portion of "St. Patrick's Breastplate" —a prayer attributed to St. Patrick himself (c. 385–c. 461). "Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to guide me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in care of friend and stranger."
