
G: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.



Holy Communion – All baptized Christians who seek a taste of the new and forgiven life in Jesus Christ are welcome to receive the sacraments.


We confess and believe that Christ in his risen form is truly present in the Sacrament of bread and wine and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ's resurrection.

About today's music

The tune of the African American spiritual for today's Hymn of the Day ("My Lord, What a Morning," ELW 438) is named for Henry T. "Harry" Burleigh (1866–1949). The baritone soloist for fifty-two years at St. George's Episcopal Church and for twenty-five years at Temple Emmanuel in New York City, Burleigh had no formal musical training as a youth. At age twenty-six he left his hometown of Stamford, Connecticut and moved to New York City, where he won a scholarship to the National Conservatory of Music. Conductor and composer Antonin Dvořák (1841-1904), the director of the conservatory, befriended him. Although mainly known for his stunning baritone voice, Burleigh also played double bass in the conservatory's orchestra. Burleigh was a prolific and influential African American composer, editor, and arranger, with 265 vocal pieces and 187 choral works. Dvořák was profoundly influenced by African American spirituals largely thanks to Burleigh, and it's generally accepted that Burleigh provided Dvořák themes for arguably his most famous work, the New World Symphony. – Cantor Kyle
