We confess and believe that Christ in his risen form is truly present in the Sacrament of bread and wine and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ's resurrection.


The ministration of the Sacrament will take place in the pews with individual elements. These are available as you enter; if you missed picking one up and need one, please signal an usher now with a raised hand.

## About today's music

The beloved Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" (ELW 257) is adapted from the seven "O antiphons." (An antiphon is similar in function to a refrain.) These antiphons were sung at the end of Advent, from December 17 to 23, at Vespers (evening prayer), one set each day before and after the Magnificat (Mary's song in Luke 1). Their original Latin text dates from the eighth century, if not earlier. Each antiphon begins with the vocative "O," such as "O Wisdom..." or, "O Root of Jesse." In the original Latin, the first letters of the second words form an acrostic. Read backwards, the words "Ero cras," emerge, meaning "I will be tomorrow" (Christmas Eve). Hymnologist Paul Westermeyer notes: "Because you have to read the acrostic backwards, the opposite direction is [also] suggested: 'I was yesterday.' Because we sing these antiphons in the present, that is, 'between the times,' with the knowledge of God's past and future presence in Christ, the paradoxes that Advent highlights emerge: Christ is to come, but was and is. The hymn itself suggests the same thing." We both long for Christ's return and for the full fruits of his first advent as God-with-us. And so we sing today, "O come, O come, Emmanuel." - Cantor Kyle
