

A traditional Christmastide invitatory (invitation to worship) for Morning Prayer is spoken responsively to begin and to conclude the psalmody.

For Daily Prayer services, such as Morning Prayer, the emphasis is devotion rather than proclamation. The assembly is seated for the readings, including when readings are from the gospels. There will be a brief pause after each reading for reflection.

First Reading Titus 3:4-7

⁴When the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, ⁵he saved us, not because of any works of righteousness that we had done, but according to his mercy, through the water of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. ⁶This Spirit he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, ⁷so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

G: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Reading

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

Luke 2:8-20

¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with

haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.





About today's music

For today's organ prelude, the melody of a Swiss noël serves as the basis for a theme and variations by Baroque composer Claude Balbastre (1724–1799). Balbastre settled in Paris and became one of the leading musicians of his day; his positions included Notre Dame. Today's organ postlude was composed by another Parisian, Romantic composer César Franck (1822–1890), who used the same Christmas melody as a secondary theme for a grand and festive piece. — *Cantor Kyle*



Meet the Author: Mary-Jane Rubenstein

Pantheologies: Gods, Worlds, Monsters

Mary-Jane Rubenstein is professor of religion; feminist, gender, and sexuality studies; and science in society at Wesleyan University.

Pantheism is the view that God and the world are identical; nothing of God exists apart from it. Throughout the ages, mystics, "pagans," and "heretics" have flirted with this idea, the response to which has been their condemnation and sometimes execution by religious authorities.



Today, especially as people find justification for destroying the planet by locating God elsewhere ("up there" in heaven or "out there" in space), Dr. Rubenstein argues convincingly and passionately that pantheism deserves another hearing. What benefit might come from dissolving the distinction between God and world and seeing the two as one and the same?
