I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.





We confess and believe that Christ in his risen form is truly present in the Sacrament of bread and wine and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ's resurrection.


The ministration of the Sacrament will take place in the pews with individual elements. These are available as you enter; if you missed picking one up and need one, please signal an usher now with a raised hand.



### About today's music

For the Sundays during Lent until Palm Sunday, the QALC Choir will sing the Introit after the prelude as a moment of meditative contemplation. An Introit (from Latin, *introitus*, "entrance") is a brief selection of psalm verses (or sometimes other scripture) with a refrain (antiphon), traditionally sung at the beginning of the worship service while the ministers enter. This ancient practice is recorded as early as the first half of the 6<sup>th</sup> century and would likely predate these records. The Introit ties into the day's theme or readings in some way. For example, this morning we hear a small portion of Psalm 91 as the Introit. Later in the service, Psalm 91 returns as the Psalm of the Day and is quoted in the Gospel reading appointed for this Sunday.



#### FORUMS IN LENT: Crucifixion, Theater of the Absurd



March 6, 13, 20 & 27: with Dr. Matthew Whitlock, Seattle University Resurrection is easy, but the cross is scandalous and foolish to the world, as Paul writes. This Lent, Professor Matt Whitlock of Seattle University returns to examine the cross as an absurdity with which the authors of the New Testament struggle to make sense out of Jesus' suffering. How can we learn from their struggle as we face the senselessness of suffering in our own lives?
