We confess and believe that Christ in his risen form is truly present in the Sacrament of bread and wine and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ's resurrection.


The ministration of the Sacrament will take place in the pews with individual elements. These are available as you enter; if you missed picking one up and need one, please signal an usher now with a raised hand.



About today's music

Anne Krentz Organ (b. 1960) is a composer and church musician who presently serves as the Director of Music Ministries at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Park Ridge, IL. Today's preludes illustrate Organ's skill at writing accessible music that draws upon the rich heritage of hymnody. Before the 8:00 service, we hear a piano setting of a beloved Scandinavian hymn, "Thy Holy Wings" (ELW 613). Before the 10:30 service, we hear Organ's choral setting and related piano variations on "Bless Now, O God, the Journey" (ELW 326), the hymn we sang at our Ash Wednesday services. For the choral setting, Organ interweaves statements of the *Kyrie*, the ancient Greek prayer of the Church: Kyrie eleison; Christe eleison; Kyrie eleison – that is, "Lord have mercy; Christ have mercy; Lord have mercy." These words echo several places in scripture, including Jesus's meeting with the Canaanite woman referenced in last Sunday's sermon, who seeks him, saying, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David." The Kyrie dates to the earliest liturgies of Christianity and is sung by the pastor and congregation near the beginning of our 10:30 service. - Cantor Kyle Haugen

FORUMS IN LENT: Crucifixion, Theater of the Absurd

March 13, 20 & 27: with Dr. Matthew Whitlock, Seattle University Resurrection is easy, but the cross is scandalous and foolish to the world, as Paul writes. This Lent, Professor Matt Whitlock of Seattle University returns to examine the cross as an absurdity with which the authors of the New Testament struggle to make sense out of Jesus' suffering. How can we learn from their struggle as we face the senselessness of suffering in our own lives?


