About today's music

The pairing of text and tune is an art in and of itself. "Joy to the World" and "Amazing Grace" can each be sung to the tune of the other, but only their "correct" pairing makes sense (try it sometime!). But for many hymns, more than one tune can be meaningfully and successfully matched to the text, and sometimes the pairings gain (or lose) popularity over time or in different communities. At today's services, our Hymn of the Day features two different tunes. At the 8:00 service, we sing "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy" to the tune LORD, REVIVE US (ELW 588). This tune comes from the 19th-century revivalist tradition and hearkens to rural American shape-note tunes; it seems related to the tune HOLY MANNA (#461 and #771). At the 10:30 service, we sing the hymn to the tune ST. HELENA by American organist and composer Calvin Hampton (1938–1984). This tune is somewhat challenging, but well worth the effort! As hymnologist Paul Westermeyer notes, "It rolls out of a composed introduction and then looks as if it might crash, but it flows ever so well... and the skillful repetitions [in the melody] make the learning process friendly for congregational assemblies."

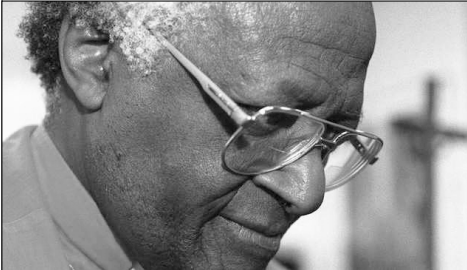

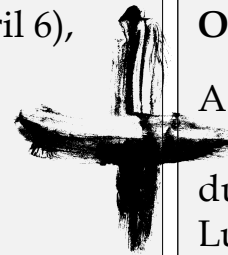
Stillness, Silence, and Song:

know is the spirituality that informed it. This Lent, in keeping with the theme of reflection and as a way of commemorating his, we will explore a spirituality that helped change a big corner of the world – a spirituality that can change each of us too.
