

In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

By intinction:


Come down the center aisle; please sanitize your hands. Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Continue to your right and use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

If you prefer to receive only bread, be assured that you are receiving the full presence of God.





About Today's Music:

All of today's organ music exhibits characteristics of the genre known as *toccata*, from the Italian word meaning, "to touch." This refers to a piece of music that requires dexterity at the keyboard. For today's prelude music, "In Thee Is Gladness" (ELW 867) is given flourishing treatments by Paul Manz (1909–1919), a Lutheran cantor who served most of his career in Minneapolis, Minnesota at Mount Olive Lutheran Church; and by Wisconsin native Brenda Portman (b. 1980), who serves as Resident Organist at Hyde Park Community United Methodist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. Baroque Lutheran composer Johann Sebastian Bach (1685–1750) wrote two significant toccatas in the key of D minor. One of Bach's most famous organ works is the toccata in D minor associated in the U.S. with Halloween; the toccata we hear today is the "other" toccata in D minor.
