#### From the October 2022 Edition of The Spirit



#### From the Bishop:

"Sometimes it's boring.

Sometimes it's thrilling.

Sometimes it makes me cry."

(Quote from "The Wonderful Ordinariness of Congregational Life" by Cheryl Fullerton, Christian Century, March 2022)

Recently I was thinking about church. (Full disclosure ... I think about church quite a bit.) But, in particular, I was thinking about the rhythm of church life. And I think the above quote from Cheryl Fullerton sums it up pretty nicely.

#### Sometimes it's boring

I admit, sometimes there is something that is uninteresting about church. Perhaps it is the repetitive nature of it. Perhaps it is the cyclical nature of things. Perhaps it is seeing the same people in the same pew week after week and year after year.

We know that Fred will sing the hymns out of tune ... every time. We know that Mary will cluck her tongue at someone's tattoo peeking out from their sundress. We know that Mike will fall asleep during the sermon, and we know that Dan will try to share the peace with every single person. We know that the children will fidget. We know that the baby might cry. We know that we have rituals and sacraments and prayers that we say each week. We know that sometimes we won't hear the utter preposterousness and absurdity and utterly amazing news that Jesus loves each of us and all of us — that sometimes this message sails over our heads because we're too busy looking at the bulletin.

And yet ...

#### Sometimes it's thrilling

I always get goosebumps when I hear the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." I rejoice each Easter when we all shout, "He is risen! He is risen indeed!" Candles lit in darkness bring hope and light on Christmas Eve. When I am privileged to place bread in people's hands and I see young, old, wrinkled, black, white, brown hands reaching out for Jesus, it is truly miraculous.

We know that Fred cares for his wife with Alzheimer's. We know that Mary still grieves her daughter. We know that Mike works the late shift, and we know that Dan only leaves his group home for church. We know that the children will hear of Jesus. We know that the baby will grow up in the community of elders. We know that sometimes we will hear and understand, if even for a moment, the utter preposterousness and absurdity and utterly amazing news that Jesus loves each of us and all of us.

And so ...

#### Sometimes it makes me cry

Church is not for the faint-hearted. Church is not for people who only want to be with their own kind. Church is for the young, the middle-aged and the old. The healthy and the sick. The spiritually depleted and the spiritually full. Those who are seeking, those who are exhausted, and those who are filled with fire for justice. We all come together. The Freds and Marys and Mikes and Dans. And we sing and we pray, and we receive Jesus, in community, together. Church is wonderfully boring and thrilling. We catch glimpses of the divine amongst the coffee pot and petty disagreements. We see Mary hug the tattooed young girl after she is baptized. We see Mike exchange high fives with Dan. We see Fred with tears singing at the top of his lungs, "I Know that My Redeemer Lives."

There is nothing like church.

#### FROM THE CANTOR

On the morning of Thursday, September 8, London's bronze statue of Winston Churchill shone with the glint of living memory. By nightfall, it stood in silent silhouette as a memorial to former times. The fading light of the post-World War II years slipped beneath history's horizon with the passing of Queen Elizabeth II. Millions who have no direct connection to the United Kingdom or its monarchy perceived the world differently upon learning of the queen's death.

Few events have garnered as much focused attention (and worldwide viewership on broadcast and online media) as the state funeral of Queen Elizabeth II. As a church musician—and a little bit of an Anglophile besides—I was, naturally, interested in the music choices for the service. The final hymn, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" (ELW 631) particularly stood out to me. And although the hymn was sung at the wedding ceremonies of Charles and Camilla and William and Catherine, I'll wager that its selection for the queen's funeral was much more than a nod to tradition (or the product of a royal committee's consensus). I suspect that the queen herself considered the profound message this hymn conveys in the context of a Christian monarch's funeral.

Watching the service on YouTube, the juxtaposition was striking. With the Imperial State Crown resting upon the coffin, and situated only a few feet from the new king, the congregation sings:

Finish then thy new creation, pure and spotless let us be; let us see thy great salvation, perfectly restored in thee, changed from glory into glory till in heaven we take our place, till we cast our crowns before thee, lost in wonder, love, and praise!

Monarchs engage in *performative speech*—words that *do* the thing they *say* (the statement of "Arise, Sir [Name]" at a knighting ceremony is a popular, if ahistorical, understanding of this concept). In place of the late monarch, the royal priesthood of believers (the congregation) takes a performative role, effecting through sung intercession the fulfillment of God's baptismal promises for the queen and all who are in Christ—each already-begun and future-finished "new creation" (2 Cor. 5:17)—all who will join the elders of Revelation 4:10 to "cast their crowns before the throne" as they sing praises and "fall before the one who is seated on the throne and worship the one who lives forever and ever."

With its prominence as the final congregational hymn, it seems to me that Queen Elizabeth II chose "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" to teach us something about her faith. What do *you* think? Does my interpretation resonate with you?

Our draft numbers need to be available by the Council's Nov. 8 meeting; Council finalizes the guidelines on Dec.13.



## Sacred Spaces: Opening the Holy Invitation Even Wider

On Saturday, September 24, Pastor Dan, Barb Bash, Jackie Munguia and Dylan Holland attended a five-hour workshop at St. Andrews LC in Bellevue presented by the Synod. The workshop helped us learn about and experience alternative ways and spaces in which to worship. "Experiential Tracks" included Creative Church (worship centered on creating art and poetry), Wild Church (worship in nature), Potluck Liturgy (where everyone contributes something to worship), and Dinner Church (ways to worship around a collective table). Other sessions invited open-ended discussions about cultivating space and leadership within a church to be open to such initiatives.

Those presenting were pastors already practicing these types of worship, and many of the attendees had interesting ideas and perspectives as well.

It was all very stimulating. Perhaps the ideas percolating from this day might bubble into our own church conversations about our worship life together as we go forward.

#### GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS.

#### God's Gardening Yields Good Works, New Friends

It was a beautiful fall day for a work party! An enthusiastic group of us from Queen Anne Lutheran and Columbia City Church of Hope gathered on September 24th at Martha Washington Park, a 9.6-acre area on Lake Washington just south of Seward Park. The Seattle Parks Department and Forterra, a non-profit land conservation agency, are restoring a stand of Oregon White Oak (Garry Oak) in a thicket of shrubs near the water in the park. We were there to help with that effort for a few hours as our 2022 God's Work, Our Hands project.



Hundreds of years ago, the area along Lake Washington was inhabited by the Duwamish Tribe, who cultivated edible plants such as camas in the meadows in the oak savannah/prairie. They controlled undergrowth in the area with fires. After American settlers moved into the area, the land was redeveloped as an orchard with a house, a youth camp, the Martha Washington School for Girls, and finally an alternative school. In 1972, the Parks Department purchased the tract from the State of Washington and demolished all the buildings. The orchard is still standing, and City Fruit harvests its apples and cherries to distribute to food banks and meal programs. However, the oak stand was not maintained, and it became overgrown with invasive plants.





next spring so we can see the bulbs in bloom.

We volunteers worked in the oak stand to tear out blackberries and snowberries, rip up morning glory, and plant native bulbs. It was fun for those of us from QALC to get acquainted with the volunteers from Church of Hope and hear about their exciting plans to partner with El Centro de la Raza and the Northwest Washington Synod to develop their property into a mixed-use building with affordable housing for families, a child development center, and a worship/community space for the church. And it was gratifying to see that we made a noticeable improvement in the appearance of the oak stand. Our Forterra supervisors will let us know when to visit

- Package of cookies
- Juice (at least 2 individually-sized bottles)

Queen Anne Helpline will also purchase fresh roasted and sliced turkey from a local butcher, as well as slices of pumpkin pie to include in the bags. 
#### THE HOLDEN DISPATCH

#### My Time at Holden: September 4-10, 2022

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times ..."

This famous phrase that begins Charles Dickens' *A Tale of Two Cities* easily sums up my whole third trip to Holden this year. There were times when nothing seemed to go right, and other times when things worked out great...

Joel Matter traveled to Holden for a week (September 4-10) to work in the Archives there. Copies of his full 8-page Holden dispatch are available in the narthex, and are linked here online as well. If you would like a copy mailed to you, please just let the church office know.



Meanwhile, here is a brief excerpt:

#### In Which We Pack a Pesky Megaphone and Explain the Idea for Bringing It:

... The next mishap I experienced was totally my fault. I had packed a battery-operated megaphone in my luggage. Depending on how the luggage was laid down, it would emit noises. When it was placed in the bus, it was initially silent. By the time the people were on board—wearing masks—and the driver was about to start the trip up Forest Service Road 8301, it was making a ticking noise like that of a time bomb. People were disturbed. So, I got up out of my seat and made my way to the luggage, with difficulty opened it, extracted the box with the megaphone, opened the box and then the megaphone itself to extract a couple of batteries. I left the luggage open, apologized profusely for the distraction and delay, and sat back down.
