





In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

By intinction:


When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands. Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

If you prefer to receive only bread, be assured that you are receiving the full presence of God.



About Today's Music

A Leise is a German sacred song from the Middle Ages ending in kyrieleis, a shortened form of kyrie eleison ("Lord, have mercy"). Today's Hymn of the Day is Martin Luther's extension of a *Leise* to the Holy Spirit that dates to the 13th century or earlier. Luther added three stanzas of his own, and all were published together in 1524 in the first Lutheran hymnal, Geistliche Gesangbüchlein (Little Book of Sacred Songs). The anonymous tune, NUN BITTEN WIR, is named for the opening words in German and is probably as old as the first stanza. Today's prelude features two contemplative Baroque settings of this melody composed by significant North German Lutheran organists. The early Baroque and middle Baroque are represented by Hamburg's Heinrich Scheidemann (1595-1663) and Lüneburg's Georg Böhm (1661–1733), respectively. Both pieces employ the ornamented organ chorale technique, using the pre-existing melody as a basis for creative embellishment. For the postlude, we fast-forward to the 20th century and southwestern Germany for Roman Catholic organist and composer Hermann Schroeder's (1904–1984) festive piece, published in 1933.
