INTRODUCTION

☐: Good and gracious God, we give you thanks for this day and the opportunity to welcome one new member into the body of Christ through baptism. Open all our hearts and minds to your promises in this rite of grace and mercy and peace.

In Jesus name we pray, Amen.

☐: God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of baptism. By water and the Word, God delivers us from the powers of sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world.

PRESENTATION FOR BAPTISM

Sponsors, Kristyne and Garret:

We present Callum Dahnert for baptism.

☐: Justin and Brianna, called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have Callum baptized into Christ?

Parents: I do.

☐: As you bring your child to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities: to live with him among God's faithful people, bring him to the word of God and the holy supper, teach him the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in his hands the holy scriptures, and nurture him in faith and prayer, so that he may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace.

Do you promise to help Callum grow in the Christian faith and life?

Parents: I do.

P: Kristyne and Garret, as sponsors, do you promise to nurture Callum in the Christian faith as you are empowered by God's Spirit, and to help him be mindful of his identity as a child of God, and to live out that identity in communion with the church?

Sponsors: I do.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

P: I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

P: Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God, the powers of this world that rebel against God, and the ways of sin that draw you from God?

Parents and Sponsors: We renounce them.

Addressing all assembled:

P: Do you believe in God the Father?

C: **I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.**



Holy Communion – All baptized Christians who seek a taste of the new and forgiven life in Jesus Christ are welcome to receive the sacrament. When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.


By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands. Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

If you prefer to receive only bread, be assured that you are receiving the full presence of God.





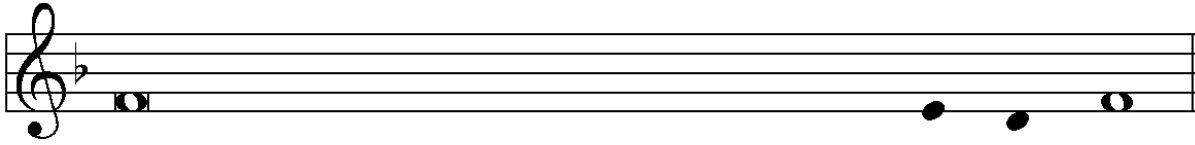

About Today's Music

Like last Sunday, today's Hymn of the Day is another of Luther's hymns from 1524 – this time, the tune is also attributed to Luther himself. His paraphrase of Psalm 130 hearkens to today's Gospel, where Jesus describes someone society views as an unholy outcast who nevertheless offers humble, faithful, fervent prayer to God. The text assures that the lives of all who call out to God are truly "in [God's] keeping," and the English translation hearkens to the baptismal rite that we witness today, depicting the cross as God's "signature, inscribed upon our temples." Today's choral anthem at the 10:30 service, "Be in Our Gathering," seemed especially appropriate as the quilts and kits for Lutheran World Relief are blessed and we give thanks for the many hours of skill and service to prepare them. The anthem offers prayers for unity among God's people using textile imagery: "Heal our divisions in your embrace, weaving them into the fabric of grace." The beautiful quilts displayed today are will carry this imagery across the world.

CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM AS ZOMBIE APOCALYPSE

The popularity of Christian nationalism has grown significantly over the past few years. Today, far-right politicians openly endorse it as a way of dissolving the distinction between religion and the state. Now on the eve of a national election, we ask: What is Christian nationalism? How, according to Dr. Jeff Robbins, our forum speaker, does it resemble a zombie apocalypse? And what can we do about it?

Please join us and invite others who may be interested to hear from Dr. Robbins, who will give us a presentation via Zoom followed by a Q&A session. Gather with us at 9 AM in the Conference Room, or follow the Forum Zoom link to attend.

Jeffrey W. Robbins is Professor of Religion and Philosophy at Lebanon Valley College, where he teaches in the Honors and the Social Justice and Civic Engagement programs and serves as the Faculty Mentor for the Allwein Scholars Program. He was awarded the Thomas Rhys Vickroy Award for Outstanding Teaching at LVC in 2005. He is chair of the Board of Directors for the Westar Institute and was the original chair of the Westar academic seminar on “God and the Human Future.” He is the author or editor of nine books, including most recently “Radical Theology: A Vision for Change” (Indiana University Press, 2016), and co-author of “An Insurrectionist Manifesto: Four New Gospels for a Radical Politics” (Columbia University Press, 2016), which was named as a Choice Outstanding Academic Title in 2016. He is also a Contributing Editor of the *Journal for Cultural and Religious Theory* and co-editor of the Columbia University Press book series “Insurrections: Critical Studies in Religion, Politics, and Culture.” He was identified in the *Journal of the American Academy of Religion* as “one of the best commentators on religion and postmodernism.” He has spoken at national and international conferences and been an invited as a guest lecturer or keynote speaker throughout the world, including Austria, China, England, France, Ireland, the Netherlands, Slovenia, Sweden, Tunisia and Turkey.
