The ministration of the Sacrament is given in two ways:


In the pew:

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands. Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.





About Today's Music

Today's postlude and one of the prelude selections have ties to the services for Queen Elizabeth II this past September. Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872 – 1958) published his chorale prelude on the tune RHOSYMEDRE for organ with two other Welsh tunes in 1920 (for the melody, see ELW 640; for the intended text, see "My Song Is Love Unknown," ELW 343). This graceful, understated treatment of the hymn became a cherished work, especially in the United Kingdom; it has been heard at several royal weddings and funerals, as well as at the service of prayer and reflection for the queen held at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, on September 9. The organ *fantasia* is a genre indebted to the tradition of improvisation, usually avoiding strict rules of musical form. Today's postlude is one of the fantasias of J. S. Bach (1685–1750), played at the conclusion of Elizabeth II's state funeral at Westminster Abbey on September 19.

Christian Nationalism as Zombie Apocalypse Forum • 9-10 AM • Sunday, November 6

with Dr. Jeffrey Robbins, co-editor of Doing Theology in the Age of Trump

The popularity of Christian nationalism is growing fast Today, far-right politicians openly endorse it as a way of dissolving the distinction between religion and the state. So, what is it, and how, according to Dr. Robbins, does it resemble a zombie apocalypse?

Gather with us at 9 AM in our Conference Room on 11/6, the Sunday before the election, or from home via Zoom.

Jeffrey W. Robbins was identified in the Journal of the American Academy of Religion as "one of the best commentators on religion and postmodernism." Dr. Robbins is Professor of Religion and Philosophy at Lebanon Valley College, where he teaches in the Honors and the Social Justice and Civic Engagement programs. He is the author or editor of nine

books, including most recently "Radical Theology: A Vision for Change" (Indiana University Press, 2016), and co-author of "An Insurrectionist Manifesto: Four New Gospels for a Radical Politics" (Columbia University Press, 2016). He is also a Contributing Editor of the *Journal for Cultural and Religious Theory* and co-editor of the Columbia University Press book series "Insurrections: Critical Studies in Religion, Politics, and Culture." He is chair of the Board of Directors for the Westar Institute and was the original chair of the Westar academic seminar on "God and the Human Future." He has spoken at conferences in the U.S. and abroad, in Austria, China, and England.
