# FROM THE BISHOP

# From the December 2022 Edition of The Spirit



I took the quilt to the cleaners to get washed. They looked at it and handed it back. If we touch this, they said, it will fall apart.

To most eyes, the quilt is nothing to look at. The bright yellow ducklings have long faded to muted colors. The binding is frayed. Happy, my dog from childhood, chewed holes in the fabric where stuffing came out and repair was never finished. (Happy did this to many sheets and blankets in my growing up years. My sisters and I called them "Happy holes." My mom did not.)

From the time I was a toddler, this quilt has held my laughter, tears, secrets, sleep, insomnia, sickness, health, anger. In darkness, this quilt surrounded me in warmth. Years later, my children were wrapped in this same quilt.

Long before my grandma quilted my "duckie" blanket and gave it to me, there was a young family without permanent shelter and a baby soon to be born. The village midwives came into the night to help birth a baby for a family unknown. They came to an unhoused couple, a foreign couple, a poor couple with no prospects or power. And yet, these midwives left their warm houses and their own families, bringing their own handmade blankets and strips of cloth as they participated in this baby's birth. And, when he was born, they wrapped this child and his mom in warmth.

We know this because we hear the angels' words to the shepherds, "This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' Surely if the baby was wrapped in bands of cloth, the child was alsowrapped in blankets.

What a difference it would have been without these blankets, without these swaddling cloths, without these midwives. Without the skills and the gifts God gave to them. The vocation of midwife brought Jesus into the world. The hands and wisdom of these women wrapped him in swaddling cloths.

It is such an amazing story ... through God's invitation, and from Mary saying yes and Joseph saying yes and the innkeeper saying yes and the midwives saying yes – Jesus came.

Two thousand years ago, in a way no one could have imagined, God was with us in human form. Wrapped in blankets.

Held in love.

What love, what grace, what beauty. Amazingly and almost inconceivably, in this little baby, God's love came, and God's love continues to be among us through Jesus – Immanuel, Incarnate, God-in-the-flesh love. Embodied love ... for you and for me. Always.

I know that life is messy. Life is sometimes hard. Sometimes the world seems out of control, and we are so small against so much of what is out there. And yet ... through something as small and vulnerable as a newborn baby, we are promised that God is here. Amongst us. And God's love is for everyone. Absolutely everyone. Regardless of your job or your political party, your anxiety or your income; your ethnicity, your language, your gender, your situation in life. God's love is for you who celebrate this holy day and God's love is for those who don't. God's love is for those you are estranged from and those you embrace.

This Christmas and this year, may you feel surrounded by God's love and presence. In your laughter, tears, secrets, sleep, insomnia, sickness, health, anger—in darkness and in light may you feel God wrapping you into God's embrace ... like a worn, faded blanket that is covered in ducks and Happy holes.

**It's a special time of year for music!** Read on for some info about upcoming services, as well as a little background about one of the most cherished Advent hymns.

# A Season of Music: Highlights for December

- **Kids and youth in worship:** This season we welcome kids and youth to help as their schedules allow with bell ringing, leading the psalm or other parts of worship, and ringing the large outdoor bell for the 10:30 service. *Please keep your eye out for the Friday emails and any updates or late breaking announcements about special music involvement from our families this Advent-Christmas season.*
- **Brass quintet for two services:** We will be joined by a student brass quintet from Pacific Lutheran University on Sunday, December 11 for the 10:30 service and on Christmas Eve, Saturday December 24, for the 11:00 p.m. service. One of the players is a former voice and choral student of mine and it's wonderful to reconnect with him as a skilled collegiate musician!
- Choral concert in Tacoma, with poetry by one of our own: I am delighted to feature "Night of Wonder," a poignant new choral piece with poetry by QALC member Pastor Paul Hoffman. My community choir, Northwest Repertory Singers, presents this piece as part of a lush collection of Christmas music tied to the Americas—with nods to Canada, the Southwest, the African American musical tradition, and more. # A Season of Preparation: "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"

You may have noticed that each Sunday at both the 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM service we sing one stanza from the famous Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" (no. 257 in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*). The source material for this hymn is the ancient collection of seven "O" antiphons, dating to the eighth century or perhaps even earlier. A different antiphon is intended to be sung with the Magnificat (the Song of Mary from Luke 1:46–55) at Vespers each evening from December 17 to 23. The Savior is invoked to come among us, using a different name or trait in each antiphon: O Wisdom; O Lord (Adonai); O Root of Jesse; O Key of David; O Dayspring; O King; and finally, O Emmanuel. In Latin, the first letters of each word following "O" form a reverse acrostic, spelling the words *Ero cras*, or "I will be tomorrow"—that is, on Christmas Eve, in the hiddenness of night, the Savior will arrive. In *Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, Paul Westermeyer digs into the symbolism of the acrostic:

This acrostic gives an obvious level of meaning: you get the Advent message of preparation by waiting for it day by day, letter by letter. But the acrostic, like the church year's seasons themselves—and maybe especially the lead-off season of Advent—also pushes to a deeper meaning. Because you have to read the acrostic backwards, the opposite direction is suggested: "I was yesterday." Because we sing these antiphons in the present, that is, "between the times," with the knowledge of God's past and future presence in Christ, the paradoxes that Advent highlights emerge: Christ is to come, but was and is. The hymn itself suggests the same thing.

God's blessings and peace to you during these "between times," as we give thanks for Christ's first advent and celebrate the mystery of the incarnation, even as we eagerly await his second advent and the fullness of the redemption we have received through him.

Your faithful donations throughout the year have allowed us to stay current with all of our benevolence payments and our ministry expenses. And we are grateful as well for your many hours of volunteer service that keep our ministry vibrant and always reaching outward.

# **End of Year Giving**

In this Advent season, many of us are already planning our end-of-year giving. If you are planning to make a special gift at the end of the year to further the mission and ministry of Queen Anne Lutheran, the following information may help you with your planning.

# **Donations by Check**

You may know that the church must always observe the IRS rules for acknowledging donations. In order for your gifts to be included on your 2022 QALC Giving Statement, please remember that:

**Hand-delivered checks** must be received in the church office **by 5:30 Friday, December 30**, as the office will not be staffed on the 31st.

Donations made on December 31 must be either mailed with a "2022" postmark, or posted as a credit card or PayPal transaction dated 12/31/2022.

# **PayPal Donations**

QALC also accepts PayPal donations. Visit the church's website (queenannelutheran.org) and find your way to the "Donations" page. Like donations made via check, PayPal transactions must also be dated 2022.

# Gifts of stock

Queen Anne Lutheran is also equipped to accept gifts of stock in lieu of checks. We have a brokerage account with Edward Jones that can easily accept your stock transfers. Contact our QALC Treasurer, Myra Dittes, by email (treasurer@queenannelutheran.org) for the Edward Jones account number and DTC number.

#### Looking ahead to 2023

The new **2023 Offering Envelope booklets** will be available on a table in the narthex from December 11 through the Christmas season. If you don't see an offering envelope book with your name on it and would like one, please contact our QALC Financial Secretary Sallie Wilson at <a href="mailto:sallie.n.wilson@gmail.com">sallie.n.wilson@gmail.com</a>, or the church office. The church provides these numbered offering envelopes to help you become a faithful giver, but also to ensure the accurate recording of your donations by the Counters. Note that in addition to weekly envelopes, your book of offering envelopes includes several envelopes for "special offerings."

Lastly, please consider enrolling in **QALC's "Simply Giving" program**. We have been using the "Simply Giving" system for several years now and this accounts for 30 percent of our regular donations. Through this program, you can set up regular Direct Withdrawals from your checking or savings account to Queen Anne Lutheran. Jacqui Darroch administers this program for us. The paperwork is quite simple. To enroll, use the Enrollment and Authorization Form available on the narthex sign-up railing, from Jacqui, or go online to our GIVE page. Return the completed form, with a voided check, to the church office in a sealed envelope marked "Simply Giving." With questions or to make changes in your Simply Giving enrollment, just contact Jacqui, Myra Dittes, our QALC Treasurer, or our Financial Secretary, Sallie Wilson.
