About this day: The Palm Sunday liturgy originated in the fourth-century Jerusalem practice of following the steps of Christ through the city and its environs. The Christian community gathered outside the city walls to the east, listened to the Gospel account of Christ's entrance, and then walked into the city waving palms. The significance of this liturgy is the entrance of the congregation into the worship of Holy Week. We hope you will be able to participate in our Good Friday service as we contemplate the crucifixion in word, song, and silence.

> *The congregation gathers outside for the procession with palms. Palm branches are distributed before the liturgy begins.*

- We praise and thank you, O God, for the great acts of love by which you have freed us through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was acclaimed Son of David and King of Kings by those who scattered their garments and branches of palm in his path. We ask that you bless these branches and those who bear them, and grant that we may follow with perfect confidence Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.





Q: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,* who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Nicene Creed, which we profess on Festival Days, sought to defend the divinity of Christ against those who viewed him as a finite being who, now less than God, could not save humanity from sin and death.

In more contemporary language, we might say that Jesus enjoyed perfect communion with the divine presence that dwelled in him and fills all things, a communion he maintained even to the point of death on the cross. -Pastor Dan

In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

By intinction:


When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.





About today's music

In recent years Palm Sunday is also known as Passion Sunday. Especially for those who can't attend a Good Friday service, today's themes relating to the crucifixion help us remember the events of Holy Week between the triumphal entry of Palm Sunday and the celebration of Easter. This morning's postlude by Johannes Brahms (1833–1897) is an aural link to our Good Friday observance here at QALC, when it will join three additional chorale preludes on HERZLICH TUT MICH VERLANGEN ("O Sacred Head, Now Wounded," ELW 351). Brahms's setting of the chorale will join settings of the melody by J. S. Bach (1685–1750); by the uncle of Bach's first wife, Johann Christoph Bach (1642–1703); and a modern setting by American organist and composer Pamela Decker (b. 1955). These four brief, meditative pieces will be heard in alternation with the reading of the Passion according to John and the singing of the hymn as we journey to the foot of the cross. — *Cantor Kyle*


