The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us." $-Pastor\ Dan$





Blessing of the Quilts and Kits





The ministration of the Sacrament is given in two ways:

In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.



About Today's Music

Today's Hymn of the Day, "Have No Fear, Little Flock" (ELW 764) might be remembered at QALC for its use at baptisms years ago. It is included in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* by way of *Lutheran Book of Worship* (1978) and was first published in *Five Hymns* (1973) and then *The Baptist Hymnal* (1975). The first stanza is by the composer of the tune, Heinz Werner Zimmermann (1930–2022), who used the Revised Standard Version translation of Luke 12:32 almost verbatim. The subsequent stanzas were written by Marjorie Jillson (1931–2010). The hymn uses influences from the jazz idiom to memorably set the text using skillful placement and repetition of rhythms. In *Five Hymns*, Zimmerman wrote that he "consider[ed] jazz and syncopated music to be the most representative idiom of [the twentieth] century" and wanted to make the idiom "fruitful for church music."
