When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us." $-Pastor\ Dan$





In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.



About Today's Music

Today's postlude is the most well-known piece written by French organist and composer Gaston Bélier (1863–1938), who enjoyed a long career as titular organist at the cathedral in Pontoise (about 28 miles northwest of Paris) for more than forty years. The word toccata is derived from the Italian word *toccare*, which means to touch. The organist's rapid-fire touch of the keys and pedals is the hallmark of this musical genre, and the French organist-composers of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries are especially known for their works—sometimes playful, often dramatic, and always masterful.
