



I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us." — *Pastor Dan*

In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

About Today's Music

Paul Manz (1919–2009), who was the cantor at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, MN for much of his career, is among the most influential American church musicians of the postwar era. Manz is usually credited with creating the concept of the *hymn festival*, in which scripture readings alternate with hymns that amplify or comment upon them. For Sunday morning worship as well as hymn festivals, Manz improvised hymn introductions and hymn-based postludes in the organ loft at Mount Olive; written out versions were initially published in the 1970s and 1980s, and he also performed them for release on vinyl records. Today's postlude, based on the Welsh melody CWM RHONDDA ("God of Grace and God of Glory," ELW 705), is among Manz's most well-known and popular hymn tune improvisations. Manz had a knack for injecting innovation into hymn melodies – yet without stretching the character of the hymn to a breaking point. Today's postlude is a prime example of Manz's approach.
