





The Generosity of Grace Pastor Dan Peterson

G: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.



The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us." — *Pastor Dan*

In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.


By intinction:

About Today's Music

Today's prelude and postlude for organ are based on our last and first hymns, respectively, at the 10:30 service. The prelude, featuring the melody known as SICILIAN MARINERS (ELW 545), draws from some of the earliest American organ music and some of the most recent: London-born composer, singer, organist, choirmaster, and teacher Benjamin Carr (1768-1831) moved to Philadelphia in 1793, where he composed the first song copyrighted under the new U.S. Constitution and became the most successful publisher of music in the new United States; Music educator, composer, and folk music enthusiast Lynn Koch (b. 1954) lives on a small farm in central New York serves as organist and choir director at McGrawville Baptist Church; and David Lasky (b. 1957) is an organist, composer, and music professor who serves at St. Cecilia's Church in Leominster, Massachusetts. This morning's postlude is based on one of the most beloved Lutheran chorales, NUN DANKET ALLE GOTT (ELW 840), adapted as a triumphant march by German composer Sigfid Karg-Elert (1877-1933).
