I went to the musical 1776 a few nights ago where I learned some new things about how the Declaration of Independence came to be written. As I watched, I felt proud to be an American—to be part of a group of people who wanted freedom from tyranny, freedom to vote, freedom from an empire far away.

There were also moments in this play when I was horrified at some decisions made. At the last minute, the clause to abolish slavery was removed so that all of the representatives would sign the document. The most powerful song in the musical, "Molasses to Rum," reminds the audience how all the colonies were complicit in the selling of humans—not just the South.

As an American, I hold two realities. First, I rejoice in the wonder and aspiration of the United States of America. I am grateful for this country, and I love what it is striving to be. At its best, it is a country where freedom and liberty are supreme. It is a place where care is given to those arriving on its shores. It is a place where people can freely go to church and other places of worship (or not go at all). In short, the United States is a promise of what can be.

At the same time, I hold the truth of this country's sins. Enslaved men built the White House, the U.S. Capitol building, and others. Homes of former presidents, including George Washington's Mount Vernon and James Madison's Montpelier, were built by men "owned" by them. The land that we in the Northwest Washington Synod are living on was once land that belonged to Samish and Duwamish, Lummi, and Muckleshoot and many others. Japanese people were unjustly imprisoned during World War II. Sundown laws and redlining laws were written throughout this country. As a white woman, I know that I could not vote until 1919. For women of color, the right to vote did not come until later. People who are part of the LGBTQIA+ communities have been harassed and discriminated against, beaten up and killed in this country. And discriminatory practices and violence continue to this day. In short, the systems in this country have violated and harmed people since its inception.

This is what it means to be an American: to vote, to engage in civic society, to appreciate this country, to grieve past and present sins, and to truthfully stand up and speak when it falls short of its ideals.

But what about those of us who are American and also Christian? Unequivocally it means that as much as one might love this country, this is not where our ultimate allegiance lies. For we are part of the body of Christ that extends beyond the borders of any country. As Lutheran Christians, we know that we are named, chosen, and called by God through Jesus. We hold deeply the joy that we are freed from sin, and, because of this, we are called into radical love, acceptance, and welcome—far beyond being a citizen of any country. We are freed to live beyond racism, injustice, and bigotry. Martin Luther wrote that freedom is a gift from God, not just for our sake, or our country's sake, but for the sake of the world.

Tragically, there are those who want to distort this freedom. To somehow merge Christian and American identities. Rather than freedom, conflating religious authority with political authority leads to tyranny and marginalization—especially of minority groups. Christian Nationalism is neither patriotic nor is it faithful. You do not have to be Christian to be a "true" American. And you do not have to be American to be Christian. At its heart, it is idolatrous. As the First Commandment states, "You shall have no other gods."

Together, as faithful Christians, let us live into Jesus' words—into radical love, acceptance and welcome. Let us speak truth to power and stand with those without power. Let us follow Jesus, who commands us to love everyone as our brothers and sisters and siblings, including our fellow citizens, those of other belief systems, and those of other nations. Together, as faithful Christians, let us stand up and speak out against Christian Nationalism and any system that marginalizes, harms, and subjugates another. As Jesus announces in the gospel of Luke, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.'

For freedom Christ has set us free. May we live and dance and revel in the freedom of Christ.

Dear Members and Friends,

I have unfortunate news. Two weeks ago, Vannady Keo, our Children and Youth Ministry Coordinator, informed me that he needed to resign. He brought great enthusiasm to our ministry and spoke of how positive his experience has been with us. He realized, however, that he could not balance his responsibilities as a student with his employment at Queen Anne Lutheran, and that his education needs to be his priority.

In moments like these, it is easy and understandable to feel disheartened. This is why I turn to the Apostle Paul. who recognized that God can turn obstacles like imprisonment and even death into new opportunities. Drawing on the resources we already have, Barb and I have accordingly taken over Vannady's work by identifying service projects/fellowship opportunities for middle and high school-aged youth over the coming year. Church council, moreover, has affirmed our participation in Project Phoenix (formerly LYONS), which will yield even more opportunities for fellowship/service with Lutheran youth at neighboring congregations.

After solidifying opportunities for older youth at our church, I will temporarily take over the work Vannady started of establishing a young adult Bible study fellowship, given our proximity to SPU. I will also regularly be offering children's sermons during worship beginning on Welcome Sunday, 9/17.

There is, in short, much more to come. But we need your help. Please pray for our ministry, and if the Spirit is nudging you to volunteer (or nudging you to nudge someone else), we would absolutely welcome your/their participation. We will miss Vannady as a partner in our ministry, but there are new possibilities ahead and they will be our focus now.

FROM THE CANTOR

Happy September! Music ministry at QALC is gearing up this month. Here are some opportunities, and please do feel heartily welcomed to reach out to me if you have interest or if you have questions—I may not know about your interest unless you yourself get in touch by email, phone, or in conversation at church. Let me know!

QALC Choir

Starting September 14, we rehearse on Thursdays from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. in the music room (and usually also go upstairs to the nave). We like to keep things lighthearted, even as we dig into learning the music and concepts of good vocal production (at our rehearsals, running jokes are always appreciated). We sing most Sundays from September through Pentecost, but it's always fine to come sing with us for a shorter span—there are always extra choir folders prepared.

Pickup Choir

We'll have a couple of "pickup choir" opportunities between now and Pentecost as well. Just like our summertime pickup choirs, you can simply pop in, rehearse, and sing the same day's Sunday service. These pickup choirs will take place when there is no forum scheduled; the next pickup choir will be Sunday, October 1 at 9:30 a.m. for the 10:30 service.

Hand Bells

Let's try to expand the use of our beautiful hand bells! Want to ring for the introit at the beginning of the service? It's as easy as 1-2-3 (three bells, all numbered, with one or two bells per person). One barrier to wider use of hand bells is that typically a bare minimum of eight ringers is required. However, I recently found a collection of music for four ringers (two bells each) and piano. With just a few rehearsals we could offer one or more selections at one of our 10:30 services later in the fall, or during Advent. Older kids could have fun with this, too! Interested? Please let me know—I'll be asking around, but it's really helpful if you reach out to me.

Instrumentalists, Pianists, and ...?

Do you play an instrument? Would you be willing to lend your talents for a piano prelude or to accompany the choir? (Or is there an organist in the congregation I don't know about?) What about your kids? Let me know! Congregational hymns, parts of the liturgy, and choral pieces are all possible opportunities. Again, don't be shy—let me know!



"Monk by the Sea"

Our thanks to Pastor Dan for sharing the evocative painting "Monk by the Sea" by the German Romantic artist Caspar David Friedrich, now hanging above the fireplace in the narthex. Pastor writes:

Early in his career, the Lutheran pastor and theologian Paul Tillich spoke of developing what he called "proto-theology." This term draws from the experience Tillich had as a child, standing before (*proto*) the vastness of the Baltic Sea bordering Germany, where the line of the horizon symbolized to him the meeting of infinite with the finite.



As a child growing up on a farm in the Sacramento Valley of Northern California, I too encountered wide-open skies that inspired within me a sense of tremendous awe. This is what I love about valleys along with large bodies of water: they can inspire a sense of "God's grandeur" (to borrow a phrase from the Jesuit poet Gerard Manley Hopkins) among those who "stand before" them, overwhelmed by their majesty.

Caspar David Friedrich's painting, "Monk by the Sea," captures the experience beautifully. Notice how the horizon dwarfs the lone figure, a contrast many of us know that lies at the heart of the experience of the divine in and through nature. The Psalmist names it perfectly when he says that "[t]he heavens are telling the glory of God . . . how the firmament proclaims his handwork" (19:1). How do you respond to this painting? Are you the monk by the sea?

The Narthex Rotating Art program is a way we share with one another those things that enrich our faith and/or bring us joy. Be it a photograph, a painting, or a family treasure, if it brings you joy and you are willing to share its story, we would very much enjoy displaying it above the fireplace.

Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls: "Through this WELCA initiative begun in 2005, WELCA is committed to raising up healthy women and girls by:

- Educating women to care for themselves physically, spiritually, and emotionally.
- Sharing knowledge and experience in order to prevent women and girls from continuing today's health risks tomorrow.
- Advocating for more research, particularly to hasten the elimination of heart disease and stroke in our lifetime.

The bottom line is that heart health issues include physical, emotional and spiritual disease that are killing women and setting girls on the same path. And the growing reality is that we are all directly affected by these killers; women suffer in silence through the other health issues and complications that result from not attending holistically to heart health. The good news is that we can do something about it! We are making a difference one woman, one girl at a time."

From WELCA: "The 'Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls 5K Run, Walk 'n' Roll' at the Triennial Convention in Phoenix will not only give us the opportunity to support the WELCA health initiative, it will be our public witness to the Phoenix downtown community and city." Candy Mathes has been walking 2+ miles most days and makes a point of walking 3.1 miles (5K) about once a week to try to be ready for this event. The Fall LWR Ingathering will be November 3 & 4 at Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church (2500 NW 85th). If you can help loading boxes into 53' containers, let Rich know. Chapel Renovation Complete

It all started in January when Pastor Dan, Cantor Kyle, and Barb Bash asked the Worship & Music Committee to get the Queen Anne Lutheran chapel ready to use for Lenten worship. During the pandemic, it was used for storage and as the main entrance to the church, and it was badly in need of a facelift. As one thing led to another, it was cleaned up to use for Lent, and then more work was done over the summer. After several



months of effort, the chapel is clean, bright, and ready to be used again as a place for worship and contemplation. Here's what happened during the project:

The old carpet was cleaned for Lent, and then carpet tiles that were purchased several years ago were installed in the chapel, chapel hallway, and chapel conference room (aka the counters' room).

The piano was tuned.

New carpet was installed on the chapel altar platform.

All the purple upholstered chairs throughout the church were cleaned, and four of the chairs were reupholstered.

The chapel altar, lectern, baptismal font, and wood trim were refinished to match the furnishings in the sanctuary. These furnishings were used in the first permanent church building, which was constructed in 1921. You can see pictures of the church building and sanctuary in the Historical Documents section of the Members' Area on the QALC website. (See Barb Bash if you need the password to the Members' Area.)

Oak rail trim for pictures and/or votive lights was installed along the east chapel wall.

Barb managed to put the stroller together but then discovered it needed its tires pumped up like a bicycle. Peggy Morgan, who lives nearby, came through with a bicycle pump, but the two of them tried in vain to get it to work. Barb finally asked the chapel woodworkers, Jonathon and Cody, to help—and they did. While all this was going on, the mom and her two sweet kids played in the nursery and enjoyed leftover Oreos. With the three wheels inflated, the happy family thanked everyone and headed home to their first permanent housing in four years. Thank you, Jonathon and Cody!

If you haven't seen the refurbished chapel yet, please take a few minutes to check it out. We're excited to have this worship area available again.

...and the Chapel Door Is Adjusted

After the new carpet was installed in the chapel suite, Kyle and several others noticed that the chapel door would not close without a hard push. If you have ever needed to work on a door that no longer functions well, you know that, over time, small changes in hinges, sagging, adding carpet under threshold, painting the frame, and wood shrinking can all compound to affect how well a door closes (or whether it closes). The carpet installation was probably the final "nail in the coffin" that caused the chapel door to not close well, maybe because of slightly different new carpet thickness, or maybe because of several small issues compounded.

To get the door to close properly again Al Mangold tried several ideas, including scraping away some paint on the frame, sanding the door-bottom, grinding the metal threshold so it became thinner, and drilling out and replacing two of the three screws holding the metal threshold tight—including a screw apparently broken during the carpet installation. I think the chapel door closes better now than before the new carpeting. Thank you very much, Al !!!

Our Covid Protocols

Our news feeds and papers continue to cover the prevalence of Covid here and elsewhere. We look forward to new, targeted vaccines arriving in October, but also note news of the rise of yet another variant which may have the ability to evade our immunities. The exposures that occur occasionally from worship or other events are a good reminder that Covid has not gone away, there *are* still risks involved, and individuals need to be mindful of that. What follows are the procedures we have in place to respond to exposures.

How do I notify the church if I was at an event and then tested positive for Covid? As soon as you know there was an exposure, please text Pastor Dan on his cell, 253-230-9695. Leaving a message at the church office at 206-284-1960 and emailing both the office (admin@queenannelutheran.org) and Pastor Dan (pastor@queenannelutheran.org) are also useful, but the voice mail and emails are not monitored 24/7. Texting Pastor Dan will be most timely and effective.

How does the church notify those exposed, if someone has tested positive for Covid? Barb Bash has trained Pastor Dan and Cantor Kyle in how to send out an All-Church email notification, so that word can get out quickly to our faith community, even on a weekend. One of these staff members will send word out. When we can, we will work with event organizers to make sure we have notified all attendees. Members involved in the event who do not use the Internet will be informed by phone. The email will include a link to the Washington State Department of Health guidelines.

What do I need to know if I am hosting an event?

Because Covid has not gone away, we must still be mindful of the possibility that we will have to notify attendees after an event. For committees, it is often easy to remember who was present, but for other events, particularly when attendees may come from outside the congregation, **it is best practice to keep a list of attendees with their preferred contact information**, be it email or phone.

How do I decide whether to attend an event or worship?

For some, Covid symptoms can be mild. They may include headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, muscle pain, fatigue, fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, or loss of taste or smell. Other less-common symptoms include nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea. If you are experiencing *any* symptoms, however mild they may seem, and you have not tested yet for Covid, choosing to stay home from worship or an event is a caring response for yourself and others. Our church still encourages, but does not require masking, as we follow the state of Washington Department of Health guidelines and there is currently no masking mandate. It is now up to attendees at an event to decide whether they do so; you need to determine your own level of risk and your comfort with those risks. Deciding to attend a meal at church, where masks will be off, is similar to deciding whether to eat at a restaurant.
