You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.


When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.





About Today's Music

Today's Hymn of the Day is likely new to QALC. The text was written by Anglican parish rector William J. Irons and first published in 1873. The tune was written in 1993 by William Bradley Roberts (b. 1947) and given the name MISSISSIPPI because it was first sung (with a different text) at a conference of the Episcopal Church held in that state, which is also where Roberts was born. The text and tune were brought together for the hymnal supplement *With One Voice* (1995) and then included in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (2006). The poetry points to the resurrection promises of God given to us in Christ—and to all the saints before us—while the journeying melody helps tell the text's story. Sometimes it can take a little while to become comfortable singing a new hymn. I hope you'll "sing boldly" regardless! Alternatively, if initially the melody feels a little too elusive, humming along or simply listening as you meditate on the text are ways to participate. By stanza 3 you may find yourself joining in: "Life eternal! heav'n rejoices: Jesus lives who once was dead."

FORUMS IN NOVEMBER – OUR FIRST SERIES:

11/05 & 11/12 SCRIPTURE, TRADITION, & THE SUBORDINATION OF WOMEN

The voices and experiences of women have been subordinated for much of the Christian tradition. With the beginning of the second wave of feminism (i.e. the women's movement of the 1960s and '70s), feminist theologians and biblical scholars began to critique the justification for that subordination within Scripture and tradition. In these sessions **Dr. Lynn Hofstad** will lead an exploration of biblical passages that explicitly validate the subordination and exclusion of women, as well as traditional biblical interpretations and doctrine that have been used to reinforce biblical justifications.

Dr. Lynn Hofstad holds a Ph.D. in Systematic and Philosophical Theology from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA. She is an independent scholar whose scholarly interests focus on feminist theology, eco-theology, the doctrine of the atonement, and Lutheran theology.

FORUMS IN NOVEMBER – OUR SECOND SERIES:

11/19 CONFLICT IN GAZA: Historical Context

This talk aims to provide historical context for the current war in Israel/Palestine. What motivated the recent attack by Hamas, and what motives are driving the Israeli government's retaliation? Why have the victims in this war been mostly civilians? Ultimately, what is at stake for Israelis and for Palestinians in this war? Historical context can provide insight and empathetic understanding in response to these key questions.

Alissa Walter is an Associate Professor of History at Seattle Pacific University where her research and classes focus on modern Middle Eastern history. Her current book project, which is currently under review, is a history of daily life in Baghdad in recent decades: Contested City: How Ordinary Iraqis Navigated Life in Baghdad from Saddam Hussein to the American Occupation. Alissa earned her PhD in Middle Eastern history from Georgetown University.

11/26 CONFLICT IN GAZA: Media Narratives and Misinformation

The fast-paced news cycle coupled with demands from social media to "pick a side" have confused audiences trying to follow the events in Israel and Gaza. This talk aims to provide context behind popular circulating narratives and tools for detecting misinformation.

Sara Shaban is an assistant professor of journalism and communication at Seattle Pacific University. Shaban is a critical/cultural researcher focused on the intersections between media, social movements, and geopolitics in the Middle East. In 2022, she published her first book Iranian Feminism and Transnational Ethics in Media Discourse, a copy of which will be raffled at the forum.
