The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.


When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.







About Today's Music

During the Christmas season we've heard three organ noels by French composer Louis-Claude Daquin (1694–1772), at our two Christmas Eve services and Christmas morning. Today, for the seventh day of Christmas, our prelude is an organ noel based on a Swiss Christmas melody set by Claude Balbastre (1724–1799), who was one of the most prominent French musicians of his time and served as organist at Notre Dame Cathedral. Today's postlude by J. S. Bach (1685–1750), one of his most famous organ fugues, echoes the melody of our Sending Hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," and has been nicknamed after the tune. However, Bach likely did not know the tune and the several notes that mimic ST. ANNE it are pure coincidence.
