In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.


By intinction:



About Today's Music

Today's Hymn of the Day, "Take Up Your Cross, the Savior Said" (ELW 667) began as a poem written by Charles Everest (1814–1877), who was only nineteen at the time of its publication in his ominously named collection, Visions of Death, and Other Poems. Everest was born in Connecticut and would later be educated, ordained, and serve in the Episcopal Church there. With a fair bit of alteration to the words, the hymn was one of only two American hymns included in England's influential Hymns Ancient and Modern of 1861 (the other was "You Are the Way," ELW 758). The text is used with a few different tunes, but the American folk melody known as BOURBON tends to predominate (the tune may have originated near Bourbon County, Kentucky, where the Cane Ridge Revival meeting took place in 1801, drawing perhaps as many as 20,000 people across the weeklong event). Although separated in origin culturally – and, likely, by a fair bit of Christian thought and theology – the text (by a future Connecticut Episcopal priest) and folk hymn melody (that may have Kentucky revivalist origins) come together well.

NEW FORUM SERIES BEGINS TODAY: "FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD?" - A series about evolution, nature, and suffering

TODAY: Human Evolution and the Creative Work of God

Dr. Cara Wall-Scheffler • 2/25 • 9 AM

How do paleoanthropologists think about the evidence for human evolution, and what can Christians take away from the wide range of data used to piece together our past? What is the balance between assumptions and testable hypotheses in the study of our evolutionary lineage, and what can we learn about God's creative mechanisms from studying the fossils and processes of our history?

Cara Wall-Scheffler has her PhD in Biological Anthropology from the University of Cambridge (UK). She is currently professor and co-Chair of the department of Biology at Seattle Pacific University. Her main research interest focuses on evolutionary tradeoffs throughout the human lineage. She is especially interested in the tradeoffs inherent in the mobility strategies of populations, and how male and female populations balance access to resources and reproduction. Her work on female hunting strategies has been published widely.

MARCH 10: Suffering and God, or Can God Suffer and to What End?

For over 1500 years, "official" church doctrine stipulated that God cannot suffer. Theologians led the way until seeds of a new perspective emerged in Martin Luther's theology of the cross. Pastor Dan will discuss the implications of affirming that God can suffer, for personal faith as well as planetary crisis.


