About this day: The Palm Sunday liturgy originated in the fourth-century Jerusalem practice of following the steps of Christ through the city and its environs. The Christian community gathered outside the city walls to the east, listened to the Gospel account of Christ's entrance, and then walked into the city waving palms. The significance of this liturgy is the entrance of the congregation into the worship of Holy Week. We hope you will be able to participate in our Good Friday service as we contemplate the crucifixion in word, song, and silence.

The congregation gathers outside for the procession with palms. Palm branches are distributed before the liturgy begins.

The Nicene Creed, which we profess on Festival Days, sought to defend the divinity of Christ against those who viewed him as a finite being who, now less than God, could not save humanity from sin and death.

In more contemporary language, we might say that Jesus enjoyed perfect communion with the divine presence that dwelled in him and fills all things, a communion he maintained even to the point of death on the cross. $-Pastor\ Dan$

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.


When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. The waste can go in the paper bag found in each pew.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.





About today's music

Today we begin our worship service with the time-honored Palm Sunday hymn, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" (ELW 344). This medieval hymn has a strong provenance as the work of Theodulf (ca. 760–821), who was the bishop of Orléans in what is now France. The hymn has been part of Christian worship with some variation of form and to different melodies since the ninth century (for nearly 1,200 years), and the English version is handed down to us from English priest and poet John Mason Neale (1818–1866). On that first Palm Sunday two thousand years ago, the "glory, laud and honor" given to Jesus as he entered Jerusalem probably included misplaced assumptions about imminent political change. Today, the praises we sing as Christ's church are to the One who will give his life for the world on Good Friday — not an earthly ruler, but instead a life-giving Redeemer whose "kingdom does not belong to this world" (John 18:36).


