The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

Blessing of the Quilts and Kits



P: God, our neighbors around the world are in need of hope. Your Spirit intercedes on their behalf, your whispers of hope bring them reassurance. Open our hearts and hands to feel your presence around us, in our neighborhoods and with others across the world.

G: Jesus, help us speak words of hope to our neighbors.

- P: God, we give you thanks for the pieces of fabric, thread, the sewing machines, and the items collected for the school kits, personal care kits, baby care kits and fabric kits. - P: God, we ask you to guide the staff and partners at LWR. May their voices and hands be a beacon of hope. Keep them safe. Keep them filled with your strength and perseverance. Be with those who pack and deliver these kits.
- **G**: Jesus, help us share a taste of hope with our neighbors.
- P: God, be with our neighbors who will receive these gifts. Whether or not we know their names or where they live, they are our neighbors, made in your image as we are, children of one humanity. We pray all this in the name of Jesus, God's loudest whisper of hope and healing to the world.

In the pew:



When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.



About Today's Music

Today's postlude is based on the melody of our Sending Hymn, "Awake, O Sleeper, Rise from Death" (ELW 452; the piece is brief to allow for the boxing of our Lutheran World Relief quilts and kits immediately after worship). The composer, Lutheran organist and cantor Paul Manz, was a master improvisor and notated many of the pieces he presented. He's credited with popularizing the concept of the *hymn festival*, in which hymns (perhaps related to a common topic or theme) are interspersed with scripture readings based on them—and a gathered assembly sings heartily. Manz served for many years at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis; he taught at Concordia University, St. Paul; he received numerous awards from various Lutheran organizations and seminaries and from the American Guild of Organists; and he received honorary doctorates from Northwestern University, Valparaiso University, St. Olaf College, and others. Manz is remembered as one of the most influential organists of the twentieth century.
