The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

In the pew:



By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.





About the Music

Today's prelude includes settings of the hymn tune "Duke Street", best known to congregations with the words "I Know that my Redeemer Lives," by two distinguished Lutheran musicians and composers, David Cherwein (b. 1957) and Richard Weinhorst (1920-2010). The settings are neoclassical in style, influenced by the historic choral preludes of Bach and those of early 20th century composers including Hugo Distler.

The postlude, well-known to us as the Easter hymn "Thine is the Glory," is based on a chorus from George Frideric Handel's oratorio Judas Maccabaeus, by French composer Alexander Guilmant (1817-1911), written in the grand romantic style. Guilmant was the principal organist at the church of La Trinité in Paris and a professor at the Paris Conservatoire.
