G: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

In the pew:



When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.







Postlude At Easter-Tide Charles Villiers Stanford (1919–2009)

About the Music

The fifty days of Easter (which include the Ascension of Our Lord, observed this past Thursday) conclude today, the Seventh Sunday of Easter. Today's postlude, "At Easter-Tide," was composed by Charles Villiers Stanford (September 30, 1852–March 29, 1924), known for his extensive output of choral music, organ works, symphonies, and, to a lesser extent, for his operas. Although he is arguably eclipsed by his famous pupils (including Holst, Howells, and Vaughan Williams), Stanford is still well-respected as a composer and transformative agent in British music, and his sacred works are especially beloved within the Anglican and Episcopal traditions. Because the centennial of Stanford's death occurred just before Easter, his music is perhaps heard even more often than usual this spring. His organ piece, "At Easter-Tide," from a collection called *Six Occasional Preludes*, seems to capture both the sacred reverence and the joyous festivity of the Easter season through the lens of the late Romantic musical style.

Congregational Truth-Telling: Racist Pasts and Liberating Futures

Come and hear the story of Baltimore's Bolton Hill Memorial Episcopal Church from its rector Rev. Grey Maggiano, and let this story of truth-telling inform how your congregation can confront the racist and white

supremacist past of both neighborhood and congregation. Rev. Grey Maggiano, Rector of Bolton Hill Memorial Episcopal Church in Baltimore, Maryland, walked his church through a process of taking a hard and honest look at the church's racist beginnings. The church was founded by slave holders. That origin story led to tendrils of injustice that reached down through the years to the church's current life. After years of work, his congregation established a reparations fund and began to take action. He will tell their story and help us think about how to tell hard truths for the sake of liberation.

The church's website asks, ""Why, in a city that is more than 60% African-American, in a neighborhood that is almost 50% African-American, is our congregation predominantly white?" While acknowledging that the roots of this are multi-faceted and complicated, we also recognize that our parish's role as a leader in the segregation of our church, neighborhood and city for more than 100 years is a significant part of the answer."

Seattle was developed in a series of intersecting restrictive covenants and the city also practiced redlining. Christian congregations were often directly involved in the creation of these segregated neighborhoods. They have certainly been implicated in and affected by these histories. You may be in a suburb or a small town in Western Washington. How does the story of place and its interconnection with race and justice affect your current congregational life?

While Bolton Hill Memorial Episcopal Church found their way to a reparations fund, each journey may end in a different type of action. It's important to start that journey by asking what it means to inhabit a specific parcel of land. How did the congregation come to be there? What were the social costs? What is the legacy of history? What might a congregation do in the present to build a more just future?

This will be one of several talks on this broader topic throughout the year.
