#### In the pew:



### **About Today's Music**

Today's Hymn of the Day, "Come Join the Dance of Trinity" (ELW 412) features a text by Richard Leach (b. 1953), a United Church of Christ pastor (1978–1999) and subsequent lay member of the ELCA and manager of an information systems consulting company. His hymns appear in many denominational hymnals and as texts for choral anthems and cantatas. This text won the 250th anniversary hymn contest held by Trinity Church on the Green in New Haven Connecticut in 2002. In a 2008 email to hymnologist Paul Westermeyer, Leach writes that dancing "has a very long association with the Trinity, going back to the eight-century theologians who used the word *perichoresis* to speak of the interdependence of unity and Trinity. 'Dance around' is a literal translation of the word, but its sense is 'interweaving,' and I use that in the hymn.'" Westermeyer notes that "what we get here, then, is the church in motion with a winsome welcome by and to the God of its being...." The text is matched to the English folk tune KINGSFOLD, collected by English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams and named by him for the town in Surrey, England where he heard the melody.

#### About the Nicene Creed

In contrast to the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed (written at a later date) emphasizes the full divinity of Christ in response to the emerging heresy that Christ, like all of us, had a beginning ("there was a time when he was not"). If Christ did not somehow share in the eternal nature of the Father, the thinking went, then how could he confer what he does not have—namely, immortality? The Nicene Creed, in turn, reflects the teaching of Paul that the eternal love of God burns so brightly in Christ that even death cannot separate us from it [Romans 8:38-39]. This is why we confess in the creed, "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God." — Pastor Dan
