The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

Holy Communion –

All who seek a taste of the new and forgiven life in Jesus Christ are welcome to receive the sacrament. We confess and believe that Christ, who fills all things, come to us in a special way through the Sacrament of Bread and Wine, and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ's real presence among us.

The ministration of the Sacrament is given in two ways:

In the pew:

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available just inside as you enter the sanctuary. When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Place the waste in the paper bag in your pew.

By intinction:

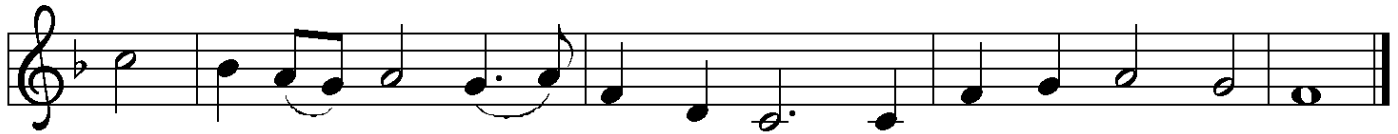
When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.







About Today's Music

St. James Music Press, an ecumenical church music planning resource, jokes that we are in the liturgical season of “Carbotide” with “High-Carb Sundays” because of all the repeated references to *bread* in the Gospel readings! And so likewise, in our Hymn of the Day, “What Feast of Love” (ELW 487), we “taste and see and sing” about “bread come down from heaven” and “sweet manna given.” When the hymn was first published, its author, Benedictine sister and professor Delores Dufner (b. 1939) paired it with GREENSLEEVES, the folk melody that is closely tied to the beloved Christmas carol, “What Child Is This?” Dufner writes, “By using this melody... I wanted my text to show the close relationship between the historical gift of Godself in the Incarnation, and Christ’s ongoing gift of self in the scriptural word and in the Eucharistic bread and wine.” How might singing this “December” hymn in August help us to contemplate “the bread of God... which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world” from today’s Gospel reading? Does the hymn reinforce connections between John 6:24-35, the incarnation, and the Eucharist for you? – *Cantor Kyle*
