The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."





In the pew:

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available just inside as you enter the sanctuary. When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Place the waste in the paper bag in your pew.

By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

About Today's Music

During the distribution of the Lord's Supper this morning we sing a melody that is familiar but words that are likely new to QALC, from the ELCA hymnal supplement *All Creation Sings*. The melody for "Loaves Were Broken, Words Were Spoken" is well-known to many of us—in fact, during this month of August we sing it every Wednesday for our services of *Holden Evening Prayer*. The tune is named JOYOUS LIGHT for the familiar words of the evening hymn that praise Christ as the light of life: "Joyous light of heavenly glory, loving glow of God's own face..." The text we sing during Communion this morning hearkens to the multi-week emphasis on Jesus as the "bread of life" in our Gospel readings. The author is Herman Stuempfle Jr. (1923–2007), who was a parish pastor and later a professor of preaching at Gettysburg Seminary, where he also served as dean (1971–1976) and president (1976–1989).
