The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."


The ministration of the Sacrament is given in two ways:

### By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands. Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in the wine chalice before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

### In the pew:

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available just inside as you enter the sanctuary. During distribution, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Dispose of the container in the narthex after worship.



### **About Today's Music**

Today's hymns reflect the Gospel reading from the book of Mark, helping to underscore themes of discipleship and what the cross means for us and for the world. Today's Hymn of the Day, "Take Up Your Cross, the Savior Said" (ELW 667) is matched with a tune named BOURBON (probably for Bourbon County, Kentucky, where the 1801 Cane Meeting revival was held). At the 10:30 service the hymn will be sung in canon ("in a round"), in keeping with the rural American shape-note tradition. "Take Up Your Cross the Savior Said" and today's Gathering Hymn (10:30), "You Are the Way" (ELW 758) were the only two American hymn texts included in the first edition of the influential English hymnal, *Hymns Ancient and Modern* (1861). Today, Hymns Ancient and Modern Ltd exists as a charitable trust, publishing hymnals, books, and periodicals on theological and liturgical topics—and hosting conferences, retreats, and other events (including The Church Times Cricket Cup, held in September since 1951 and, humorously, "fiercely contested by dioceses ever since"). — *Cantor Kyle*

#### FORUM NEXT SUNDAY: Music Suppressed by the Third Reich (*Entartete Musik*):

Led by Rev. John Michael Barich

Martin Luther once said, "I am not satisfied with him who despises music, as all fanatics do; for music is an endowment and a gift of God, not a gift of men".

The Nazis developed an ideal of music that was dictated by 'laws' of racial origin. The music they branded as being 'degenerate' in fact embraces a wide variety of styles, for their single-minded aim was simply to ensure the integrity and pre-eminence of German musical life as a whole. The idea of making music dependent upon a norm—especially a racial norm—is clearly, in our era of international music-making an absurdity. Are there tendencies present today to establish new criteria of worth based on other methods of evaluation? What conversations do we still need to be engaged in with respect to free speech and dialogue in the arts? What constitutes the significance for us today of the historical concept of *Entartete Musik?*


