Will You Let Me Be Your Servant ELW 659 ↑ Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven,

he is seated at the right hand of the Father,

and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.



The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

By intinction:


In the pew:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip the bread in the wine chalice before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat. You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available just inside as you enter the sanctuary.


Need Gluten-free bread or grape juice? These options are available on this individual elements table.

During distribution, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Dispose of the container in the narthex after worship.



About Today's Music

Not every hymn published in a hymnal comes from a studied poet, and not every fine melody comes from a professional composer. For example, the text and tune of today's Hymn of the Day, "Will You Let Me Be Your Servant" (ELW 659), were written by self-taught guitarist and avocational poet Richard Gillard. Born in England in 1953, Gillard moved to New Zealand by age three. Hymnologist Paul Westermeyer writes, "This hymn 'percolated' in its author 'for nearly a year,' and the third stanza 'lived on a scrap of paper in the bottom of my guitar case in my brother-in-law's home during a 1976 tour of England, Scotland, Europe, and Israel.'" The hymn was first published in a 1989 sampler for *Hymnal: A Worship Book* (1992), for the Brethren and Mennonite churches. – *Cantor Kyle*

FORUM TODAY: Music Suppressed by the Third Reich (*Entartete Musik*):

Led by Rev. John Michael Barich

Martin Luther once said, "I am not satisfied with him who despises music, as all fanatics do; for music is an endowment and a gift of God, not a gift of men".

The Nazis developed an ideal of music that was dictated by 'laws' of racial origin. The music they branded as being 'degenerate' in fact embraces a wide variety of styles, for their single-minded aim was simply to ensure the integrity and pre-eminence of German musical life as a whole. The idea of making music dependent upon a norm – especially a racial norm – is clearly, in our era of international music-making an absurdity. Are there tendencies present today to establish new criteria of worth based on other methods of evaluation? What conversations do we still need to be engaged in with respect to free speech and dialogue in the arts? What constitutes the significance for us today of the historical concept of *Entartete Musik*?

COUNCIL UPDATE ON THE WELCOME GARDEN

Background of this proposal: In May 2023, the Congregation (a) approved a conceptual plan for a re-landscaping project in the Triangle and front lawn areas and (b) authorized a Special Appeal to raise money for the project. Circumstances delayed the Special Appeal fundraising and, by necessity, the project. After considering and deciding not to engage in a larger Capital Campaign, and after a Listening Campaign to better understand the range of opinions within the Congregation about next steps, Council moved forward with an interim project to clean up the Triangle. Also, funds were donated to clean up the plantings along the McGraw side of our building.

Recent actions: The Church Council has been moving toward asking the Congregation whether to (a) formally approve the final project design for re-landscaping of our front lawn area and (b) authorize a Special Appeal to raise the money needed for what is now called the Welcome Garden project. We plan to call a congregational meeting for this purpose soon, but the timing is uncertain because we are waiting for updated cost figures and payment schedule.

In the meantime, please reacquaint (or newly acquaint) yourself with the project. A few project schematics are posted in the narthex. Others are along the Fellowship Hall walls. Council minutes provide detail on discussions and information₇ and Council members welcome your questions. There will be some formal opportunities and more information once we have full information and a firmer schedule.

Council Records: A reminder that Council Minutes, Pastor's Reports, and Financial Reports from each Council meeting are posted in the Members' Area of the QALC website. Records from the past year are also available in a large white binder in the church library, and each month's reports are posted on a bulletin board in the sacristy hallway (behind the narthex kitchen). To find records prior to a year ago, in paper or digital form, contact the church office. (Some of these documents may be password-protected. To open one, use the same PW as used for the Members' Area.) Also, feel free to contact Council Secretary, Jacqui Darroch (JEDarroch@yahoo.com) if you have questions about Council documents.
