The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."







About Today's Music

Today's Hymn of the Day is well-known across Christian denominations. Although sometimes associated with a different tune, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* pairs "Take My Life and Let It Be" (ELW 685) with the tune that the author intended. This hymn is an example of a collaboration between daughter and father. Frances Havergal (1836–1879) wrote the couplets that form the text in 1874, calling it a "Consecration Hymn" for its message of dedicating the entire self for the service of God. Quoting her, hymnologist Paul Westermeyer writes, "Four years after she wrote the hymn… she literally carried out the line 'Take my silver and my gold' by 'shipping off all my ornaments (including a jewel cabinet that is really fit for a countess) to the Church Missionary House." The tune, named PATMOS (likely for the island location of St. John's Revelation), was written by Frances's father, William Havergal (1793–1870), an Anglican priest who focused on writing music during a 13-year period when poor health prevented him from serving as a parish pastor. – *Cantor Kyle*
